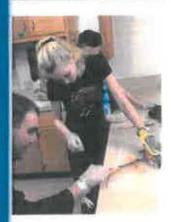

ALTON CENTRAL'S SCOOP Into the woods for a new perspective

and 5, eighth grade studentu from Alten Control School ventured onto the traffs at Knight's Pond and Mount Caverly to explore the local enviroument, its history, and the connections that come from experiencing an area first-hand and with a purpose, Starting with Tom Wessel's book. Reading the Forested Landscape, explorations becam in accial studies. class, developing an undecetanding of evidence that a forest provides to its history that one might commonly overlook. Stonewalls and wolf trees took on new meaning as students took up their pans and notabooks, and wondered about the shoup farms that once dotted Alica's landscape. "My vision has changed for the area around me," writes Millie Snow. "There is a story here that has been building for generations. which I am now a part of" Exaurining rock flagures. occupiend trees, and bessi scars helped them make connections to glacial activities, past weather events, and the interactions between forces in nature. Perching on stubbly rocks, ensconced in a stand of trees that rivaled those once labeled "King's Woods," sparked discussions about colonial New Hampshire and how English laws affected its natural commosition. Historical connec-

tions were reinforced by

ALTON - On Oct 4 the idea that only three things can affect forest composition - mil. topography and forest disnirbance. Students made connections by noticing how the "ley of the land" and the soil composition. affected both canogy and ground cover, how both human and natural forces can create age discontinuity, and how all of these things can affect species development and forest history.

Through our travels, Language Arts was also a primary focus as students explored the idea of nature writing as conceptualised by Heury David Thoman in his journal writing when he escaped to the wilderness of Walden. In its most besic form, nature writing means to observe nature and write about it - much like the very definition of the words themselves. However, it is more than just literally observing. It is also about forming a compection with nature and taking the time to reflect not only on your place within it, but on your place within the world and life itself. Thoreau did this, and students had the opportunity to read some of his journal writing and learn not only about his observations and connections with nature but his thoughts on the act of taking the time to reflect and connect in this way on a daily basis. One of the most important insights he gives to us is

taking the time to stop and be present, to truly notice the things that we often take for granted. That was an emphasis for the students on this trip - to spend time in their natural surroundings in a way that they hadn't done before. This is a local area that many of them have been to before with their own families. but the seal was for them to have a new experience and to take it in with new eyes - to really see things on a deeper, more meeningital level - to interact with the natural surroundings of their local town in a way that they ordinarily might not get the chance to. As Perrin McLeod wrote, he listened to "the miniscule sounds of water droplets slapping the pond after the fish exploded out of it in search of insects to feed on. The soft buzz of miniature bugs...the distant hum of traffic... the everyday zip of life. All of these sounds, while present, have never been present with me." The resu has been gone for many years now, but students tried to channel him in their throughts as they walked through the traffe around Enight's Pond on those two October days.

From the STEM perspective, the students emiored two "stories" of the area. The first of these was one in which much water saturated the area, causing a great deal of erosion and moss growth due to the moisture. The trees were mostly hemlock and very sparse at the bottom. The other story was something from the imagination. The small hollows at the base of the trees looked like something from a movie or a magical place. Students

learned about appraclating their surroundings as they used their creativity and "scraps" of nature to build fairy houses. What a wondarful way to demonstrate a respect for the outdoors and possibly create long-lasting traditions about visiting the mythical beings of the ontdoors. Through this activity students demonstrated open-mindedness and a willingness to try something new. They also created sound mans as they found a coay seat where they could observe their surroundings with just their ears. Daing words or drawings, students identified the sounds they heard from all directions.

Trust and tree identification was an activity received well by all. Stndents blind folded partners and guided them through the woods to a tree of their choice. This same tree was then to be located by the partner after being returned to their starting point. Although this was disorienting for students, they had specific directions to follow and shoulders to lean on. There was no diebotomous key to halp students identify a trae. Perhans it was the taxture of the bank, the

chromosonce as they hugged it, or maybe a cholor root they felt at its base. This activity did not just address trust but focused on biodiversity, reinfurced other stops where students observed fungt, wild adibles, and sythesos of weathering.

Throughout their adventures, students were encouraged to use all of their segmen, and to make connections. hetween their experiences on the trail and what they meant to them. Their responses were impresaiva. Ben Bremer shared that "through nature and historical learning. my ayes have opened to all that nature is" and how we can use it for "advice, guidance, and windom," Noelle Asserts Houned the hundscape to "a painting almost. It seems as though you could just reach out and grab the leaves, dip them in the crisp, clear, incandescent water, and paint on the clear blue sky. You can paint whatever is on your mind because Nature will not judge."

Students returned to ACE with new perspectimes and a broader understanding of what it means to have a sense of place. They, like Tom Wennels, can now say that, "...when I wander through the forests and fields that surround my home, I am not just a tourist passing through, but a part of the landscape - a partner in its dialogue. Through this relationship I continue to gain respect and reverence for the land, its history, its changes, and its well-being. It is this kind of relationship that ... needs to be shatered more widely in our human community."

Alton Central students dive deep

ALTON - On Friday, Oct. 18, Alton Central School students in Derek Pappaceno's seventh and eighth grade class, Diving the Depths, had the opportunity to go to Ocean Discovery Day at UNH. The team gained new information about how UNH explores and helps oceans. They took away this new information and are now planning to apply it in doing beach-cleanups and other helpful activities that are beneficial to the ocean.

They visited several of the exhibits, including dissecting Portuguese Squid, whale tracking, and a leason on Horseshoe Crabs. Did you know that a Great Bay Oyster will filter about 30 gallons of water each day. There also was an exhibit about what sea animals sound like underwater, which





was very interesting. The information that the students learned and documented will help them better understand and appreciate the oceans so that even small town Alton students can make an impact on helping the oceans.

While they were on





the field trip they got to learn about different kinds of robotics. For example, they got to learn about Ben, an automated boat that can also be remote controlled. It maps the sea floor and tracks everything it goes over. It has 10 computers that send the data it finds back to a control center. There is also a smaller boat that runs off a battery, named the Z boat. It can only go five hours without recharging and has three different computers to send data. It is mainly used for testing the technology that will be used on the more expensive Ben. Boats like these help

people better understand what lays right beneath their feet, the ocean.

The group is very grateful that they had the opportunity to learn about the ocean through real-life experiences. In their class, the students teach and work together to research the ocean and teach their classmates about their own knowledge. Earlier this fall. they did a survey to other students and staff at Alton Central School to see what they knew about oceans, the sea life, and how it's affected by pollution. The survey found that most of their peers know little about the ocean.

They are working diligently and learning more about leadership skills to apply to school and even their home lives.

The newly formed team aspires to visit Jenness Beach this academic year and potentially do a trash cleanup. With the collected trash, they would like to create a sculpture of marine-life to promote awareness for the trash-infected oceans. They applied for a grant and are hoping to use this for a beach cleanup day with the Blue Oceans Society, based out of Portsmouth.

On Wednesday, Nov. 1, the program coordinator and educator, Rebeca Murillo from the Blue Oceans Society came to the classroom to show them what a beach cleanup would look like and explain what Blue Oceans Society does. They learned about the trash and microplastic that the Blue Oceans Society finds in their monthly beach cleanups.

Almost every Friday, the students have participated in a shipto-shore conversation with the staff on the E.V. Nautilus. The E.V. Nautilus is an exploration vessel that maps and studies the ocean. The Nautilus has its own webpage, which you can visit at nautiluslive.org for more information. The group at ACS has learned a lot about sealife and ocean mapping because of their experience at UNH Ocean Discovery Day and their collaboration with the R.V. Neutibre.

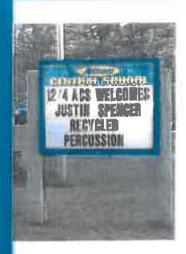

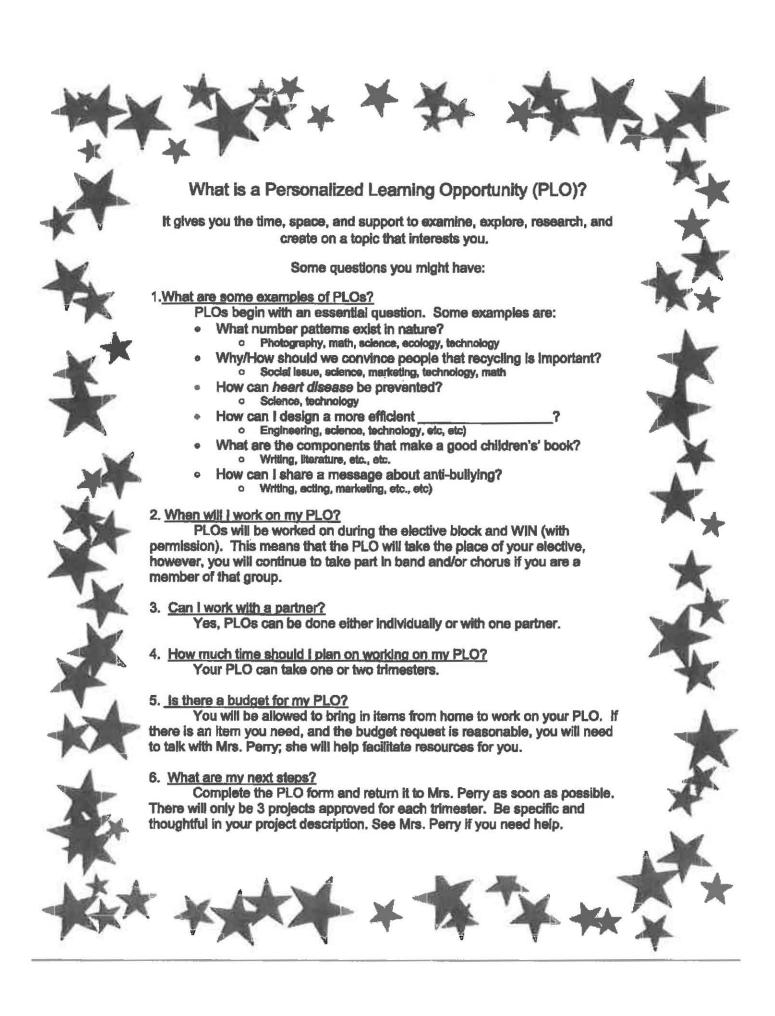
Students interested in submitting a proposal for a PLO must:

Measuring Success: One Standard at a Time

Alton Central School utilizes a comprehensive set of standards to ensure that every child receives a rich and rigorous education. As children develop and apply skills through classroom activities and projects. teachers can assess the level of understanding and mastery.

The new report card highlights all subject areas which are divided into skills that the students are responsible for learning.

Using a complete and allinclusive list of standards, parents and students will receive accurate and detailed information about progress.

By monitoring the concrete skills and expectations found on the report card, we will know how best to support and advance each and every child.

The Grading System

- 4=Demonstrates understanding and application beyond grade level
- 3=Consistently demonstrates understanding and application at grade level
- 2-Demonstrates a general understanding but Is inconsistent with application
- 1=Has yet to demonstrate an understanding at grade level
- / = Skill/Concept Not Yet Assessed

Student progress in grades K-4 will be evaluated using a 1 to 4 scale. At the end of each trimester, children will be assessed on benchmark skills that have been identified for that time period rather than evaluating mastery based on the end of year. Teachers will consider not only what a student knows, but the case with which they can apply the skills to new and authentic learning situations. Our goal is for each child to achieve at least a '3' in their subject areas.



Work habits and social skills, such as being cooperative, following expectations, problem solving, treating others

with respect, perseverance, staying on task, and completing homework (grades 3-4) are important personal traits to internalize and strengthen. These areas are aligned to the social thinking program that is utilized at the school which fosters and supports inter- and intra-personal skills.

A Format for Partnership

Standards-based report cards provide detailed information about how a child is advancing in each subject. Parents will be able to determine whether their child



needs extra assistance in certain areas or when they need to be challenged. By using clearly defined standards, teachers and parents can work together to ensure that their child succeeds. Together at the first conference, parents and the teacher will create a student goal.

Individual Student Goal

individual student goal may address academic, social, or emotional area. Older students will encouraged have imput into their goal development to foster personalization and self-advocacy. The teacher will monitor the progress each trimester and report to the parents via the report card.

Following Progress From Grade to Grade

The K-4 report cards were designed to show a progression from the early learning years to a deeper understanding of skills and content. Every effort was made to keep the language constant while adding details and depth from year to year. Science and Social Studies reflect an emphasis on problem solving and critical thinking. Opportunities for children to explore, discover, predict, and apply will be a tremendous benefit to them as they make their way through school and beyond. 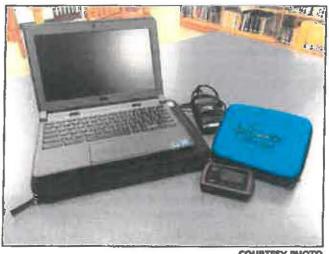
Alton Central announces new technology initiative

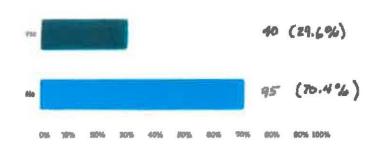

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AT BOARD MEETINGS

The primary purpose of School Board meetings is to conduct the business of the Board as it relates to school policies, programs and operations. The Board encourages residents to attend Board meetings so that they may become acquainted with the operation and programs of the schools. All official meetings of the Board shall be open to the press and public. However, the Board reserves the right to meet and to adjourn or recess a meeting at any time. The Board also reserves the right to enter non-public session at any time, in accordance with the provisions RSA 91-A:3. The Board reserves the right to omit public comment when deemed appropriate.

In order to assure that persons who wish to appear before the Board may be heard and, at the same time, it may conduct its meetings properly and efficiently, the Board adopts as policy the following procedures and rules pertaining to public participation at Board meetings:

- 1. The agenda will reflect two times during the meeting for public input at regularly scheduled board meetings. Speakers will be allotted three minutes per person unless extended by approval of the Board with a total time limit of thirty minutes for all speakers. The first public input topics will be restricted to those subjects stipulated in the meeting's agenda or agenda as revised by a vote of the board. The second public input will open to any topic concerning Alton Central School or other ancillary topics as permitted by the Chairperson. The intent of these limitations included in the policy are not designed or intended to limit its access to it school board.
- Consistent with RSA 91-A:3, Policy BEDB, and the laws pertaining to student and family privacy rights, the Board will not place any matter on the public agenda that is to be properly discussed in a non-public session. Complaints regarding individual employees, personnel or students will be directed to the Superintendent in accord with Policies KE and KEB.
- 3. All speakers are to conduct themselves in a civil manner. Obscene, libelous, defamatory or violent statements will be considered out of order and will not be tolerated. The Board Chair may terminate the speaker's privilege of address if the speaker does not follow this rule of order.
- 4. The School Board encourages citizens to public participation during public input. Questions will be received in writing by the School Board during regular meetings. The Board Chair or designee will respond to submitted questions no later than the next school board meeting.
- 5. When there has been a presentation to the board, the public in attendance of the meeting will be able to ask questions of the person presenting. A reasonable amount of time will be allotted for this and will be monitored by the Board Chair.

Purpose:

To provide the Board with an opportunity to receive directly any concerns, desires, or hopes of the citizens of the community.

Procedure:

- A. Persons wishing to be heard state their names and the issue(s) they wish to be heard on.
- B. Persons try to speak directly to the issue, as briefly -- and fully -- as possible.
- Persons try to be specific about what they want acted upon -- if that is the case
 -- by the Board.

Ground Rules:

- A. The Chairman of the Board conducts public input.
- B. The Chairman indicates how much time will be allowed for public input.
- C. The Chairman will call on those wishing to be heard.
- D. No discussion of individual personalities (good or bad) is permissible in public session. This means students, teachers or any other individuals.
- E. The Board or the Superintendent (or his/her representative at the meeting) may ask questions -- for the purpose of clarification.
- F. The Board will make no decisions during Public Input.
- G. Where Board action is indicated, it will be taken up under New Business on the agenda.
- H. Any person whose conduct is disruptive or disorderly will be ordered to cease and desist from such behavior. Should their behavior continue, they will be removed from the meeting room.

Persons appearing before the Board are reminded that members of the Board are without authority to act independently as individuals in official matters. Thus, questions may be directed to individual Board members, but answers must be deferred pending consideration by the full Board.

Buildings and Grounds Minutes

March 7, 2018

In attendance: Pam McLeod, Kathy O'Blenes, John MacArthur, Chuck Norwood, Pam Stiles

- Michael Wentworth from Siemens presented a heating system plan for ACS. He explained that the highest priority is addressing the needs of Boiler Room #1.
 - a. Plan includes:
 - i. Installing new piping, valves, pumps, and alerting system
 - b. The pneumatic system no longer works.
 - c. Recommends a digital control system
 - i. Energy savings
 - ii. Provides for later expansion
 - iii. Will provide a rate of return cost savings analysis
 - iv. Recommends addressing the need asap (summer, 2018)
 - v. Should take approximately 5 weeks to complete
 - vi. Recommends adding on front end web server to provide alerts and data (BACnet servier). This could tie into other boiler systems in the future. It could also monitor hvac/fire/smoke/cameras.
 - SAU 72 is a member of the National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA) which provides cost outs and purchasing contracts.
 - i. Committee recommends drafting a policy to allow for purchasing contracts.
 - e. Total cost of the project: \$83,748 (to be confirmed)
- The Underground Storage Tank meets compliance.
- Field Upgrade: Kathy acquired the names of several companies in the area that install field irrigation. Chuck will put together an RFP for irrigation to include sod. The goal is for the bid process to be complete by the end of April so that the Buildings and Grounds Committee can move forward with some decisions at the May meeting.
- 4. Well bids have come in at: \$27,500 (James Gray), \$26,232 (Gilford Well), and \$33,328 (Thomas Well). The specifications called for 1000' and 45 gpm.
- Gym update: Kathy, John, and Pam met with Chip to discuss possible ways to revitalize the gym. Items include paint, lighting, bleachers, sound barriers (to cover pipes), and floor skimming.
 Chip is putting together numbers and it will be ready for review at the May meeting.
- 6. Chuck will check to see if the stamps on the trusses in the 1988 wing and the art/music area show use of a flame retardant material. The SAU received information that a spray used on wood trusses in the 1980s could possibly weaken the wood. He will investigate and report back prior to the May meeting.

- An Infrastructure grant for \$66,100 has been submitted to the state to replace exterior safety/fire doors at the school. The district should receive notification of status by the beginning of April.
- 8. The custodial crew has been working on making upgrades to the building in the form of painting, lighting, refinishing and rehanging doors, and some updates to bathrooms. This is part of the "Shine" initiative.

Good afternoon Pam,

This email is in response to your email regarding the hazards of school board member use of social media, and whether such use by a quorum of a board would implicate meeting issues under RSA 91-A, the State's Right-to-Know law. The short answer is YES.

Board member use of Facebook and other social media sites/applications is subject to the same general standards concerning meetings and records as any other mode of communication (email, telephone, text, in person, etc.).

Under 91-A:2, I, a "public meeting" occurs whenever a quorum of a public body (including not only the board, but any board advisory committees as well) convenes "whether in person, by means of telephone or electronic communication, or in any other manner such that all participating members are able to communicate with each other contemporaneously,... for the purpose of discussing or acting upon a matter or matters over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power" (referred to in this email as "jurisdictional matter"). Sequential communications (email strings), can also constitute a meeting.

Personnel, students, officials, budget, building, curriculum, co-, extra-, or sponsored activities, policies, buildings, all constitute jurisdictional matters for a school board. Indeed, it would be hard to conceive of an issue relating directly or indirectly to a school district that would not constitute a jurisdictional matter.

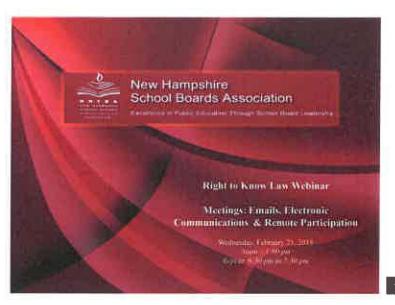
If the elements of a meeting are present, then all of the requirements of public meetings apply (notice, minutes, presence at a location where the public can attend, etc.).

Given the above, board members should be extremely cautious engaging in any social media discussion of school matters. While one board member hosting a page on his/her own without board authority would not in and of itself constitute a meeting, comments/replies/postings on the page by any other board members greatly increases the risk of an inadvertent – but illegal - meeting.

I hope the above adequately responds to your question. For further information, I have attached a copy of a power point presentation I did as part of a webinar last month titled "Meetings: Emails, Electronic Communications & Remote Participation." Although the content deals most specifically with emails, the discussion applies equally to any form of electronic communication which allows for two-way communication. Introduction

All power residing originally in, and being derived from, the people, all the magistrates and officers of government are their substitutes and agents, and at all times accountable to them. Government, therefore, should be open, accessible, accountable and responsive. To that end, the public's right of access to governmental proceedings and records shall not be unreasonably restricted.

New Hampshire Constitution, Part 1, Article 8: "Accountability of Magistrates and Officers; Public's Right-to-Know" (Emphasis Added).



RSA - 91-A

Right to Know Law Basics

Introduction

91-A, puts into statutory form the public's right of access to government, including the "reasonable restrictions" contemplated by Part 1, Article 8.

The two core areas of right of access under 91-A are "meetings" of "public bodies", and access to "governmental records".

The statutory definitions of those three words/phrases, along with a few others, are key to understanding the breadth of 91-A as it applies generally to school boards, and more specifically to their emails and other electronic communications.

Right To Know Law Basics Key Definitions

"Public body" - Includes "Any ... governing body, board ... school district, [or] school administrative unit, ... or any committee, subcommittee, or subordinate body thereof, or advisory committee thereto." 91-A:1-a, VI.

"Advisory committee" – includes any "committee ... or other like body whose primary purpose is to consider ... issues designated by the [public body] so as to provide such [body] with advice or recommendations concerning the formulation of any public policy ... that may be promoted, modified, or opposed by such authority." 91-A:1-a, I.

Right To Know Law Basics Key Definitions

"Meeting" – means the convening of a quorum of the membership of a public body ... whether in person, by means of telephone or electronic communication, or in any other manner such that all participating members are able to communicate with each other contemporaneously,... for the purpose of discussing or acting upon a matter or matters over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction, or advisory power." 91-4:2, 1.

NOTE: For this presentation and 91-A. "email" or "electronic communications" will include all forms/platforms of digital or electronic communication technology and media, e.g., text messaging, instant messaging, group chats, social media, etc., irrespective of whether ordinary usage of that platform normally includes contemporaneous exchanges.

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Right To Know Law Basics Key Definitions

"Governmental Record" – includes "any information created, accepted, or obtained by, or on behalf of, any public body, or a quorum or majority thereof. ... in furtherance of its official function." 91-A:1-a, III

This webinar presentation will focus on the "meeting" implications of board emails and electronic communications, although the governmental records concerns with respect to such communications are as complex and important.

Where Technology and the Open Access Law Collide

From those definitions, it should be clear that email and other electronic communication among board members, can easily implicate both the governmental records and open meeting provisions of the 91-A.

So, where are the intersections between electronic communications and the Right to Know Law?

The answer is more nuanced than almost any other concerning application of 91-A.

Or, more simply stated, it depends.

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"Meetings"

Prong #1 - Quorum

1. A quorum of the body convenes -

In almost all matters, a school board quorum is a majority of the then sitting members. RSA 21:15

A couple of caveats/pointers:

- If a board/committee member has a conflict on a matter, and has recused (should recuse) him/herself, then quorum is based upon the remaining membership.
- Define the core membership of any standing or ad hoc advisory committee. This does not preclude additional, active, participants, but it at least helps with the determination of how 91-A applies in a situation (who is responsible for the committee's charge).

Style 8

Right To Know Meetings

As quoted above, RSA 91-A:2 establishes a three prong test for whether a board communication (of whatever medium or form) should be deemed a meeting. A meeting occurs when:

- 1. A quorum of the body convenes;
- In any manner in which they can communicate contemporaneously;
- For the purpose of discussing or acting upon something over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction or advisory power.

On the issue of emails and other electronic communications, it is the second prong that is the most problematic and distinct from other encounters/communications.

Prong #3 - Jurisdiction

 For the <u>purpose</u> of discussing or acting upon something over which the public body has supervision, control, jurisdiction or advisory power.

Almost any matter which directly or indirectly relates to the school or school district will likely fall within the school board's "jurisdiction", even when it doesn't.

NOTE: 91-A:2, I excludes from the definition of "meeting", "chance, social or other encounter not convened for the purpose of discussing or acting upon [jurisdiction] matters" provided that "no decisions are made regarding such matters."

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Prong #3 - Jurisdiction

3. Jurisdiction continued...

For example: what if a quorum of the board discusses the possibility of the board taking up a resolution on DACA?

For most New Hampshire school districts DACA would have at best an indirect connection to the statutory powers and duties of the board/district. Is DACA a matter within the "supervision, control, jurisdiction or advisory power" of a small town, New Hampshire school board?

Probably not, but the power to make the resolution itself - is!

In other words, don't get caught up on the "jurisdiction" language. If board is talking about a subject as board business, then it probably meets the "jurisdiction" threshold.

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Prong #2 - Contemporaneous Communication

Convenes in <u>any manner</u> in which they can <u>communicate</u> contemporaneously

It is this prong that seems to present the most difficulty for public officials when identifying the intersection of the meeting provisions of 91-A with emails or other electronic communications.

Assume a board member sends an email to all of the other board members regarding a matter within the "jurisdiction" of the board.

- Does that constitute a meeting?
- · Even if none of the other members respond?
- What if a community member sent it to the board? The Superintendent?

Prong #2 - Contemporaneous Communication

2. Contemporaneous communication - continued...

If a board member sends an email to all of the other board members regarding a matter within the "jurisdiction" of the board, but none of the other members respond, is it a meeting?

At least one N.H. Superior Court Judge thinks so. In *Porter v. Town of Sandwich*, (Carroll Cty. Super. Ct., Do. #212-2014-CV-180), the Judge ruled that the "ability" to communicate contemporaneously was the key factor rather than whether such communication actually occurred.

This is not the prevailing view among school and municipal attorneys, and at least one other Superior Court judge, but that decision highlights the ambiguity.

RSA 91-A:2-a - Just to Be Clear

Taken on its own, the three pronged meeting definition of 91-A:2, I would seem to open the door to all sorts of misinterpretations which had the effect of public bodies effectively and improperly conducting business outside of public meetings.

- But I only sent my email to one member (who then forwarded it to another, who sent it to another, etc.);
- I knew that three of the four recipients were at work, so they couldn't communicate "contemporaneously" even if they wanted to.
- We were only batting some ideas around, we knew we had to vote at the meeting;
- It was only a straw poll.

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RSA 91-A:2-a - Just to Be Clear

Those misinterpretations — intentional or not - and others like them, led to the passage in 2008 of 91-A:2-a, which includes two paragraphs together serving as the "don'ts" reverse side of the coin to 91-A:2's "do's" relative to meetings.

- Paragraph I mandates that a board's deliberations upon jurisdictional matters only occur in a public meeting (unless falling within one of 91-A:2, I "non-meeting" categories – a little more on that later).
- Paragraph II specifically prohibits the use of outside communications, including "sequential communications" to circumvent the spirit and purpose of 91-A.

The Bottom Line

Taken together, 91-A:2, I and 91-A:2-a make it pretty clear:

<u>Discussion</u> or action on official/jurisdictional matters should only occur in a properly held meeting.

This does not mean that any mention of a jurisdictional matter outside of a meeting is improper.

First - only deliberation and action are prohibited. An email on a purely administrative matter concerning the topic would not be (e.g., identifying the topic in order to schedule a meeting to deliberate upon it).

Second - a meeting requires a quorum - e.g., two members (of a 5+ member body) can legitimately discuss board business between themselves, but each should be careful not to pass any information from that discussion on to another board member.

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Sequential Communications

While use of the sequential email to accomplish business which should otherwise occur in a meeting might be a 21st century development, but really is just a new-fangled extension of what is known in some areas as a "walking quorum".

"Walking quorum" - a series of meetings, telephone conferences, or some other means of communication such that groups of less than a quorum are effectively meeting and can arrive at a consensus or understanding regarding governmental business that, collectively, would constitute a quorum. <u>See, e.g., State ex rel Newspapers Inc. v. Showers</u>, 135 Wis. 2d 77, 92, 398 N.W.2d 154 (1987).

Right To Know Law Basics Meeting Requirements

If/when the elements of a meeting are present relative to board communication, then — unless and to the extent a basis exists for a non-public session - the Right to Know law requires:

- · Posted notice (24 hours, absent an emergency);
- Availability for the public to attend (subject to 91-A:3);
- · Board deliberations and decisions in public;
- Physical presence at the location specified in the meeting notice (unless 91-A:2, III applies – more on that later); and
- . Appropriate minutes.

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Right To Know Law Basics Non-Meetings

When a meeting is not a meeting

"Non-meetings" - 91-A:2, I carves out four specific categories of communications which, notwithstanding meeting the criteria above, are excluded from the definition of "meeting". Only three apply to school boards, they are:

- · Strategy and negotiations regarding collective bargaining;
- Consultation with legal counsel (must include ability for contemporaneous communication); and
- Circulation of draft documents.

NOTE: The concept of a "non-meeting" is not to be confused with non-public sessions under 91-A:3, which are beyond the scope of this presentation.

Electronic Communications Best Practices

- Most importantly, leave discussion and deliberation of official matters for a public meeting;
- > Never use email/texts to express ideas, concerns, opinions, etc. on jurisdictional issues or matters;
- Don't use "reply all";
- Whenever possible, the Superintendent or central office should be responsible for communications which are appropriate for the entire board;



Emails and other Electronic Communications

Best Practices Pitfalls

Electronic Communications Best Practices

- > Use BCC for all recipient addresses (other than perhaps your own, or an administrator (helps limit intentional or inadvertent use of "reply all");
- Use a district provided email address for all electronic communications including district business, such communications are "governmental records" (see attachments "Government Management of E-mail; What's in Your Municipality's In-box and NHBSA Training Document: School Board Use of Electronic Communication").
- Use caution with what you say in electronic communications both as to content and tone. Remember such communications are subject to the same public disclosure as a formal letter.

Electronic Communications Pitfalls – Slippery Slopes - Violations

- Simultaneous e-mails sent to a quorum of a public body by a member discussing, proposing action on, or announcing how one will vote;
- Forwarding to a board member an email received from another board member regarding a jurisdictional matter;
- > Straw polls or communications seeking "a sense of the board";



Electronic or Remote Participation of a Board Member at a Meeting

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Electronic Communications Pitfalls – Slippery Slopes - Violations

RSA 91-A:1-a, III - "Governmental Records"

- As with hard copy letters, and whether sent or received through a district account or a board member's personal or business account, an email, etc. will be considered a governmental record if it contains information that is:
 - created, accepted, or obtained by, or on behalf of, any public body, or a quorum or majority thereof, or
 - . the school district, and
 - · which is in furtherance of its official function.
- Think hard before forwarding constituent emails or complaints.

Remote Participation in Meetings

RSA 91-A:3, III provides two allowances for remote, electronic or telephonic board member participation in a public meeting:

- In an emergency, when less than a quorum may be physically present at the noticed meeting site; and
- When a quorum is present on-site, and individual circumstances warrant a member's remote participation.

While the circumstances that would support each type are different, many of the "meeting" rules are the same.

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Remote Participation in Meetings



In contrast to nuanced analysis of when board emails constitute a public meeting, the remote participation sections of 91-A are generally clear and simple.

Remote Participation in Meetings

RSA 91-A:2, III (a) - Remote participation by one member

- An individual member* can participate electronically only when attendance in person is not reasonably practical;
- The reason that attendance is not reasonably practical shall be stated in the minutes of the meeting;
- A quorum must be present at the physical location;
- If an emergency meeting is not justified and a quorum cannot attend in person, the meeting should be re-scheduled.

NOTE*: More than one member may participate remotely, provided a quorum is physically present at the meeting location.

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Remote Participation in Meetings

RSA 91-A:2, III (b) - Remote participation by a quorum

- "Except in an emergency, a quorum of the public body shall be physically present at the location specified in the meeting notice..."
- An emergency means "immediate action is imperative, and the physical presence of a quorum is not reasonably practical within the time requiring action." This definition is slightly different, but consistent with, the "emergency" definition found in 91-A:2, II regarding meeting notices.
- The determination of emergency is made by the presiding officer, and the facts supporting that determination must be stated in the minutes.

Remote Participation in Meetings

RSA 91-A:2, III - Majority Decision

The introductory sentence of paragraph III states:

- "A public body may, but is not required to, allow one or more members of the body to participate in a meeting by electronic or other means of communication..."
 - Clearly, the decision to permit remote participation of fewer than a quorum is a majority decision.
 - But because the quoted language is introductory to all of paragraph III, including the "emergency" meeting language of (b), a majority may overrule the chair's determination to hold an emergency meeting remotely.

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Remote Participation in Meetings

Provisions Applicable to Both Types of Remote Participation

RSA 91-A:2, III (c) - Open and Audible

- > The "discussions" of all meeting participants must be contemporaneously "audible or otherwise discernible" to each other, and to members of the public present at the location of the posted meeting (this applies to emergency meetings as well).
- Each member participating remotely must identify those present at the location from whence that member is participating.

Remote Participation in Meetings

Provisions Applicable to Both Types of Remote Participation

RSA 91-A:2, III (e) - Member Present - Roll Call Required

- Any member participating remotely "is deemed to be present at the meeting for purposes of voting."
- "All votes taken during such a meeting shall be by roll call vote."

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Remote Participation in Meetings

Provisions Applicable to Both Types of Remote Participation

RSA 91-A:2, III (d) - Meeting Procedures Required

- ➤ All meetings allowing remote participation shall comply with "all of the requirements of [91-A] relating to public meetings, and shall not circumvent the spirit and purpose of this chapter..."
- Non-public sessions are permitted, but must also adhere to the requirements of 91-A:3.

Remote Participation in Meetings

Practical Considerations

- > Telephone call using a speaker phone.
 - Ensure the public in attendance can hear both sides of the phone conversation; the speaker on board member's cell phone is not likely to be sufficient.
 - May require people speaking at the meeting to identify themselves so the member on the phone knows who is speaking.
 - Would not allow for the remote member to share documents without additional technology.

Remote Participation in Meetings Practical Considerations

> Skype or Other Video Conference.

- If the board can see the remote member(s), the public should be able to see the same screen image;
- In most meeting rooms this would require more than one screen;
- May require hooking amplified speakers to ensure the public can hear;
- Technology needs should be planned ahead of time, ideally before the determination to allow the remote participation.

The New Hampshire Department of Education (NHDoE), Bureau of Special Education, has reviewed the data collection and reporting process for Indicator 11, Timeliness of Evaluations. Based on this comprehensive review, the NHDoE will retain the State compliance rate of 77% for 2007-2008 for Indicator 11, as reported in the Annual Performance Report (APR) submitted to OSEP on February 1, 2009. This data continues to serve as the basis for the District Data Profiles and District Determinations for 2007-2008.

For the 2008-2009 Annual Performance Report (APR), due February 1, 2010, the NHDoE will determine the rate of compliance for Indicator 11, Timeliness of Evaluations, based on the count of days from parent consent to evaluate to the eligibility date. This count must be within 45 days of receipt of parent consent to evaluate to the eligibility date, unless there is evidence of written consent agreed upon by the parties to extend the evaluation for no more than 15 days.

- 1. During these last several weeks there has been a heightened focus on school safety. On March 2, Chief Heath and our SRO, Kristen Guest, completed a walk through assessment of the school. Their only point of note was a back door from the stage that leads to the hallway of the art classrooms that did not lock from either side. John is addressing that with Chuck. Kristen and I attended two different workshops; one on rural preparedness and the other on developing a risk assessment (with John and Jim). As a follow-up to the workshops, Kristen and I met with the Alton safety committee to discuss how we could best implement some of the practices and procedures that were shared during these state wide meetings. Staff professional development, upgrades to our emergency bags, and resources to review were all discussed with the school committee. We also shared an idea with the group regarding a new app which would make it easy and convenient for our students and parents to contact the local police and school representatives if they have concerns that need to be shared. Alton CARES - Contacting Alton Regional Emergency Services – would be fashioned after the Safe2Tell app which was developed by the state of Colorado and Wyoming. Kristen is working with high school students (we anticipate getting several middle school students involved as well) and we are beginning an investigation of how to move forward. Data suggests that early interventions to and reporting of potential situations has a significant impact on preventing tragedies. On March 15, Chief Heath, Officer Guest, John, Bob Cullison, and I met to discuss how we can work with the town to promote the highest level of safety possible at our schools. We are currently discussing how we might be able to increase the SRO presence at both facilities; I will keep you updated as progress is made in this area.
- 2. We are moving forward with curriculum in a number of areas. John, Jen, Denise, and I are meeting with vertical teams to discuss curriculum development, resource needs and sharing of strategies that have proven to be successful. We are also making progress on piloting two potential science programs. Trainers have been brought in to work with the staff, materials have been received and distributed, and we will be looking for feedback from the teachers by mid-May.
- 3. On March 28, Howard Muscott, Director of the NH Center for Effective Behavioral Interventions and Support, spent the day at ACS working with staff on strategies for behavior management. Dr. Muscott will be with us four more times before the end of the school year as a result of feedback from the professional development survey. He will be focusing on behavioral interventions that work (punitive versus positive interventions), forming relationships, and what to look and listen for when intervening.
- 4. On March 16th, it was a true pleasure to attend the second Showcase of Excellence assembly for the entire school. The energy and the pride that filled the gym was exciting! Students shared classroom projects, middle schoolers who have been building computers and programming games with original music highlighted their progress, and our youngest children displayed their knowledge of reading and math. I also enjoyed meeting with some of our eighth graders who are

taking part in PLOs (Personalize Learning Opportunity). We talked about setting goals, mastery of skills, timelines, and needed resources. The projects are moving forward and are allowing students to explore topics of special interest to them.

5. At this writing we are preparing for the visit from the Excellence in Education committee. There is an excitement in the air and we are very much looking forward to "showing off" all that Alton offers to its students on a daily basis. Our staff is to be commended for putting in the extra effort to prepare for April 2. It will be a pleasure to report out to you at the May meeting regarding the feedback that we received from the committee.

Principal's Report to the School Board April 9, 2018

It has been a super busy over the past few weeks here at ACS! Alton Central School celebrated the conclusion of Trimester 2 with a Showcase of Excellence assembly on March 16, 2018. All grade levels were represented at the assembly. Pre-K students sang all about colors using sign language, Spanish and English! Our kindergarten students sang about sight words and did the "Macarena" to math. Second students presented facts from a recent field trip to Prescott Farms. There were several slide shows highlighting Performance Based Learning projects, National Junior Honor Society Events, the "Potential Energy" elective, and our RISE basketball team. Grades 4-8 chorus also performed a song that they are preparing for an upcoming concert. At the conclusion, the Potential Energy students were awarded with certificates.

One additional highlight came from two of our students currently in the "Computers Inside Out" elective class here at ACS under the direction of Dr. Naim Syed. Hayden Mellon demonstrated "Skyscraper Mystery" which is a video game he from created from scratch using coding through the Unity platform. Also, Spencer Hogan developed the intense background music for the videogame. Students and staff were absolutely mesmerized by their creations. They were truly impressive!

In PreK, Mrs. Rees and Kelly MacPherson have begun their evening Pyramid Model Parenting Series: Positive Solutions for Parents. They have reported that seven families are participating in this six-week series on Wednesday evenings from 5:30-7:30. It has been a reported that so far it has been a powerful experience for all for both parents and facilitators.

Kindergarten has been focusing on the changing seasons and talking about spring! Last week they were lucky to have a parent, Mrs. Wood. come into Mrs. Knott's classroom to teach about how maple syrup is made. Students were able to taste both maple sap and the finished product maple syrup. They were also able to have a taste test between real maple syrup and the "store bought" kind and then graphed their results. Mrs. Wood also brought in some of the tools used to collect sap from the trees so students got a chance to see and explore these tools. There was even a small piece of a maple tree students were able to practice tapping. It was an exciting hands-on learning experience. Also in kindergarten Mrs. Leblanc's class went on a nature walk looking for signs of spring, gathered some seeds and planted them. They are anxiously awaiting to see what will grow!

Third Grade is working on their wax museum projects and have set April 20th as the date for their wax museum. Parents, second grade, and administrators are invited to come in from 8:30-9:00 to view the students. Students are looking forward to this project. They have already selected their person and are hard at work. Fourth grade has opened their seed business, <u>Future Gardens</u>. They are accepting orders through April 13th. They use this business as a project based learning, covering both economics and math standards.

Before testing, third and fourth grade sent home blank notes to parents requesting families to write a letter or words of encouragement for each day of testing to their child. This is done without the students knowing. Then in the morning before the test, teachers put one letter on their desk for them to read. They love it and parents have had fun coming up with these notes. If students don't return anything from their parents, we find teachers and different staff members to write a quick word of encouragement.

In seventh grade, students concluded their focus on economics with research projects comparing the reasons for wealth or poverty in two countries. Next on the agenda is an exploration of medieval Europe and feudalism.

Currently, seventh grade STEM is making CO2 powered cars to race and collect data with Mr. Macduff. This data will be used to calculate a rate of speed and convert that rate from ft/sec into MPH. Seventh grade Math students are currently working on geometry and are learning about the different angles, supplementary, complementary, and adjacent. Soon they will be moving to volume and surface area of cones and pyramids. Mr. Pappaceno's 7th and 8th grade elective will be at UNH for an underwater robotics competition with their ROV's on Friday April 13th!

Eighth graders have chosen their Power of One activities and will begin preparations to put their ideas into actions. These include a "Meme Day" to benefit the Downtown Boxing Gym Youth Program, a softball tournament to raise money for the David Ortiz Foundation and Limbs for Life, a barbecue to show support for those in foster care, and seven other activities! In class, their studies have moved on to the expansion of the United States through purchase, negotiation, and war. They have also begun to gather information through class discussion and projects that will help them to rewrite the "Three Witches" scene from Shakespeare's *Macbeth* to analyze and demonstrate the reasons for the American Civil War. In math, students are finishing up their chapter on the Pythagorean Theorem and moving onto the Transformations chapter. They will start with translations, then reflections, rotations, and end with dilations. Algebra is working on the geometric unit of transformations. They are taking an assessment on dilation using "Shrinky Dinks" and drawing a geometric shape on the coordinate plane, transferring that shape to shrink paper, shrinking it down, drawing the smaller shape on the coordinate plane, and finding the scale factor between the two.

For the third year in a row, 8th graders in the ACS band traveled to Boston's historic Symphony Hall to sit in on an open rehearsal of the Boston Symphony Orchestra on Thursday, March 29th. Afterwards, the students were able to take part in a private guided tour around the entire facility. Boston Symphony Hall is considered the third best venue in the world for its acoustics and students were able to experience this with some of the best players in the world performing for them!

Finally, I would like to thank the entire ACS community (students, staff, parents, board members, community members... really everybody) for their support and hard work through the "Edies" process! The school is absolutely beautiful and our entire school is beaming with pride and excitement. Between all the wonderful things that go on here daily at ACS to the recent "spruce ups" building-wide, the displays of student work, bulletin boards, artwork, and our wonderful student tour guides, we have truly made our school a showcase. Win or lose, this is a proud day for ACS to be selected as a finalist! Thanks again to all and we will absolutely keep you posted once the Edie's Team has made their choice.

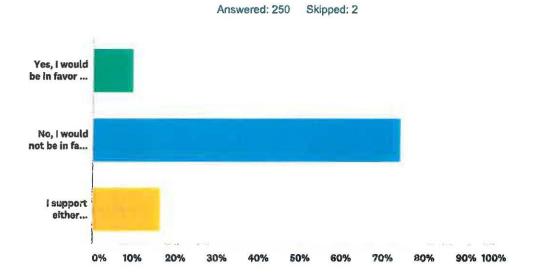

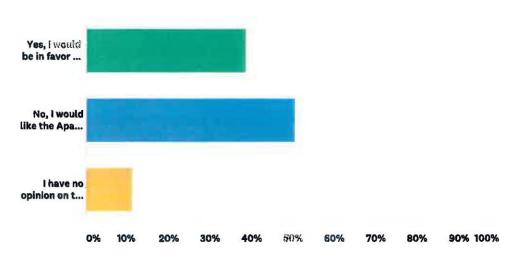

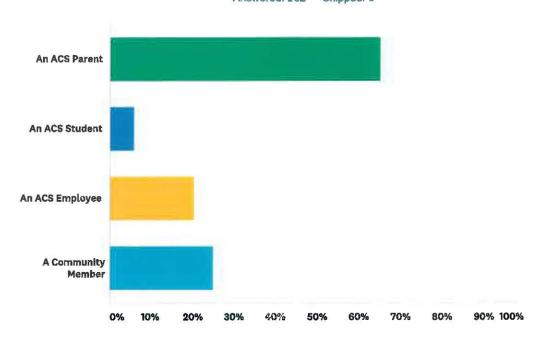

SAU 72 RESPONSIBLE USE POLICY

The SAU 72 and Alton Central School provides access to a comprehensive collection of technology resources for employee and student use. These technology resources are to be used for educational and school related business purposes only.

The ACS Responsible Use Policy outlines appropriate use and prohibited activities when using all technology resources and electronic devices as defined by school administrators. Access to the networks and to the information technology environment within the District is a privilege and must be treated as such by all users of the network and its associated systems.

Every employee and student is expected to follow all of the rules and conditions listed, whether at home or at school, as well as those given verbally by SAU 72 administrators and/or teachers, and to demonstrate responsible citizenship and ethical behavior at all times when using school/district equipment.

Examples of unacceptable uses of ACS computers that are expressly prohibited include, but are not limited to the following:

- 1. Accessing Inappropriate Materials Accessing, submitting, posting, publishing, forwarding, downloading, scanning or displaying defamatory, abusive, racially offensive, obscene, vulgar, profane, sexually explicit, sexually suggestive, threatening, discriminatory, harassing and/or illegal materials.
- 2. Illegal or Prohibited Activities Using the ACS computers, networks or Internet services for any illegal activity or in violation of any Board policy or school rules, including "cyberbullying" and other harassing or discriminatory conduct. The school unit assumes no responsibility for illegal activities of students while using school computers.
- 3. Violating Copyrights Copying, downloading or sharing of any type of copyrighted materials (including music or films) without the owner's permission (see Board policy). The school district assumes no responsibility for copyright violations by students/staff.
- 4. Copying Software -- Copying or downloading software without the express authorization of the Technology Department is prohibited. Unauthorized copying of software is illegal and may subject the copier to substantial civil and criminal penalties. Alton Central School assumes no responsibility for illegal software copying by students/staff.
- 5. Non-School Related Uses Using the school district's computers, networks or Internet services for non-school related purposes such as private financial gain, commercial, advertising or solicitation purposes, or for any other personal use not connected with the educational program or assignments.

- 6. Misuse of Passwords/Unauthorized Access-- Sharing passwords, using other user's passwords, or accessing/using other user's accounts.
- 7. Malicious Use/Vandalism-- Any malicious use, disruption or harm to the ACS computers, networks and Internet services, including but not limited to hacking activities, creation/uploading of computer viruses, or subverting web filters, firewalls or any other security measures.
- **8.** Unauthorized Access to Blogs/Social Networking Sites, etc. Accessing blogs, social networking sites, etc. without specific authorization from the supervising teacher is prohibited.

No Expectation of Privacy

SAU 72 computers remain under the control, custody and supervision of ACS at all times. Students/staff have no expectation of privacy in their use of school computers, including but not limited to: email, stored files or internet activity.

Pursuant to the Electronic Communications Privacy Act of 1986 (18 USC 2510 et seq.), notice is hereby given that there are no facilities provided by this system for sending or receiving private or confidential electronic communications. System administrators have access to all mail and will monitor messages. Messages relating to or in support of illegal activities will be reported to the appropriate authorities.

Compensation for Losses, Costs and/or Damages

SAU 72 and Alton Central School reserves the right to seek for compensation for any losses, costs or damages incurred by the student/staff for violations of Board policies and school rules while the student/staff is using school owned computers, including the cost of investigating such violations. ACS assumes no responsibility for any unauthorized charges or costs incurred by a student/staff while using school computers.

ACS families will be given the option of purchasing insurance to cover the cost of any damages; families who do not have insurance will be responsible for the full cost of repairing or replacing.

Student Security

A student is not allowed to reveal his/her full name, address, telephone number, social security number or other personal information on the Internet without prior permission from a teacher. Students should never agree to meet people they have contacted through the Internet without parental/guardian's permission. Students should inform their teacher if they access information or messages that are dangerous, inappropriate or make them uncomfortable in any way.

Network Security

The security of ACS computers, networks and Internet services is a high priority; staff must notify the technology director immediately regarding problems. Any student who identifies a security problem must notify his/her teacher immediately. The student shall not demonstrate the problem to others or access unauthorized material. Any user who attempts to breach system security, causes a breach of system security or fails to report a system security problem shall be subject to disciplinary and/or legal action in addition to having his/her computer privileges limited, suspended or revoked.

Students/staff may not propagate computer worms or viruses, distribute quantities of information that overwhelms the systems, or use a District network to make unauthorized entries into any other resources accessible via the network.

Additional Codes of Conduct

- 1. Laptops are loaned to students/staff as an educational tool and are only authorized for use consistent with the school's mission.
- 2. Students/staff are responsible for the proper care of laptops at all times, including costs associated with repairing or replacing the laptop.
- 3. If a laptop is lost or stolen, this must be reported to the Technology Department immediately; a theft should also be reported to the local police.
- 4. The Board's policy and rules concerning computer and Internet use and all other policies and rules apply to use of laptops at any time or place, on or off school property. Students/Staff are responsible for obeying any additional rules concerning care of laptops issued by the school.
- 5. Violation of policies or rules governing the use of computers, or any careless use of a laptop may result in a student's/staff's laptop being confiscated and/or a student only being allowed to use the laptop under the direct supervision of school staff. The student/staff will also be subject to disciplinary action for any violations of Board policies or school rules.
- Parents/guardians will be informed of their child's login password. Parents/guardians are responsible for supervising their child's use of the laptop and Internet access when in use at home.
- 7. The laptop may only be used by the student to whom it is assigned.
- 8. Laptops must be returned in acceptable working order at the end of the school year or whenever requested by school staff.

SCHOOL DISTRICT INTERNET ACCESS FOR STUDENTS

The School Board recognizes that technological resources can enhance student performance by offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, facilitating communications with parents/guardians, teachers, and the community, supporting District and school operations, and improving access to and exchange of information. The Board expects all students to learn to use the available technological resources that will assist them in the performance of their education. As needed, students shall receive lessons and instruction in the appropriate use of these resources.

Students shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District's technological resources primarily for purposes related to their education. Technology resources include but are not limited to: computer hardware, operating system software, application software, stored text and data files, e-mail, local databases, externally accessed databases, DC-ROM, recorded magnetic or optical media, clip art/digital images, digitized information, communications technologies, and stand-alone workstations. Students are hereby notified that there is no expectation of privacy on district computers, computer files, email, internet usage logs, and other electronic data.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that prevents access to visual depictions that are obscene or pornographic and that the operation of such measures is enforced. The Superintendent or designee may disable the technology protection measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research, educational or other lawful purpose.

The Superintendent shall establish administrative regulations and an Acceptable Use Agreement that outlines student obligations and responsibilities related to the use of District technology. He/she also may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. Inappropriate use may result in a cancellation of the student's user privileges, disciplinary action, and/or legal action in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulations.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide copies of related policies, regulations, and guidelines to all students. Students shall be required to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood the District's Acceptable Use Agreement.

SOCIAL MEDIA POLICY

The Alton School Board recognizes the value of social media platforms in promoting community involvement and collaboration. The purpose of any official district social media platform shall be to further the district's vision and mission, support student learning and staff professional development, and enhance communication with students, parents/guardians, staff, and community members. As such, the Superintendent is authorized to establish social media websites and platforms in furtherance of the District's values, goals, and mission.

Definitions

"Social media" means any online platform for collaboration, interaction, and active participation, including, but not limited to, social networking sites such as Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, LinkedIn, or blogs.

"Official district social media platform" is a site authorized by the Superintendent or designee. Sites that have not been authorized by the Superintendent or designee but that contain content related to the district or comments on district operations, such as a site created by a parent-teacher organization, booster club, or other school-connected organization or a student's or employee's personal site, are not considered official district social media platforms. Unauthorized pages will be considered as personal pages.

Guidelines for Content

All content on the District's Facebook page must relate to education, curriculum, instruction, school-authorized activities and athletics, school or district news or general information relating to work, activities and accomplishments of the District and its staff, as representatives of the District.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that official district social media platforms provide current information regarding district program, activities, and operations. Official district social media platforms shall contain content that is appropriate for all audiences. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that official district social media platforms are regularly monitored.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that copyright laws are not violated in the use of material on official district social media platforms.

Establishment of Regulations

The Superintendent or designee will establish administrative regulation, guidelines and protocols for official district social media platforms to ensure the appropriate and responsible use of these resources and compliance with law, Board policy, and regulation.

Student Use of Social Networking Sites

First and foremost, students are encouraged to always exercise the utmost caution when participating in any form of social media or online communications, both within the Alton community and beyond.

Students who participate in online interactions must remember that their posts reflect on the Alton community and, as such, are subject to the same behavioral standards set forth in the Student Handbook and Responsible User Policy.

The District will not require, compel or request that any student provide his/her personal or private social media account information with relation to any District social media website.

Written parental release is required before posting of student photographs in Districtsponsored social media.

Employee Use of Social Networking Sites

The Alton School District respects the right of employees to use social media and networking sites, as well as personal websites and blogs, but it is important that employees' personal use of these sites does not damage the Alton School District's reputation, its employees, or its students or their families. Employees should exercise care in setting appropriate boundaries between their personal and public online behavior, understanding that what is private in the digital world often has the possibility of becoming public, even without their knowledge or consent. The Alton School District strongly encourages all employees to carefully review the privacy settings on any social media and networking sites they use and exercise care and good judgment when posting content and information on such sites.

If an employee maintains or participates in an ASD-sponsored online community that extends to persons who are parents, or other constituents, he/she must exercise good judgment about any content that is shared on the site. Staff members should not discuss or reveal a student's personal information or problems, or invite a student to do the same. The employee must uphold the district's Responsible Use Policy and avoid making defamatory statements about the school's employees, students, or their families.

Additionally, employees should adhere to the following guidelines, which are consistent with the Alton workplace standards on harassment, student relationships, conduct, professional communication, and confidentiality. The employee may not:

- Make statements that would violate any of the Alton policies.
- Disclose any confidential information regarding the Alton School District or confidential
 information obtained during the course of his/her employment, about any individuals or

- Engage in, post, share, or otherwise disclose sexually explicit or suggestive messages/pictures/videos, sexual banter, jokes, innuendos, or behavior with students.

- Advocate or encourage students to use alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or other illegal substances.
- Engage in peer-like communication with students.
- Identify themselves as representatives of the Alton School District in their personal electronic communication.
- Access social networking websites for personal use during school hours.

The Alton School District can require employees to disclose login information for accounts or services provided by virtue of the employment relationship or for devices or online account paid for, or supplied by, the employer.

Limitation of Public Comments

Official district social media platforms shall be used only for their stated purposes and in a manner consistent with this policy and administrative regulation. Comments to ASD-sponsored sites, such as blogs, online forums, and social media sites, are welcomed and encouraged.

Official district social media platforms may not contain content that is obscene, profane, offensive, sexually explicit, inappropriate, inflammatory, libelous, or so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on school premises, violation of school rules, or substantial disruption of the school's orderly operation. The District reserves the right to reject or remove comments for any reason.

For the privacy of users and their families, all postings to ASD-sponsored sites will be publicly available on the Internet and therefore publicly accessible without limitation or protection of any kind. Users must consider how much personal information to share, with the understanding that this information may be linked to an individual's name and published on the Internet.

By posting a comment or other material to an ASD-sponsored site as outlined above, the Alton School District has the right to re-use, display, modify, reproduce, publish, or distribute with permission from the originator.

Staff or students who post prohibited content shall be subject to discipline in accordance with district policies and administrative regulations.

The User agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Alton School District, its employees, and successors and assigns against any damages, losses, liabilities, judgement, cause of action, costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs), arising out of any claim by a third party relating to any material the user has posed on an ASD-sponsored site.

Privacy

The Superintendent or designee will ensure that the privacy rights of students, parents/guardians, staff, Board members, and other individuals are protected on official district social media platforms.

Students, parents, staff and members of the public are hereby given notice that the District reserves the right to and will monitor all District social media websites. As such, there is no expectation of privacy for information posted on, sent to or received by the District's social media websites.

NHSBA Note, September 2014: Only change is an addition of a Legal Reference, RSA 275:72. Content of the policy has not changed. RSA 276:72 prohibits an employer from requesting or requiring that an employee or prospective employee disclose login information for accessing any personal account or service through an electronic communication device. Additionally, RSA 275:72 prohibits an employer from taking or threatening to take disciplinary action against any employee for such employee's refusal to comply with a request or demand by the employer that violates this statute. Employers are still allowed to adopt and enforce lawful workplace policies governing the use of the employer's electronic equipment, including policies regarding Internet use, social networking site use, and electronic mail use.

The User agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Alton School District, its employees, and successors and assigns against any damages, losses, liabilities, judgement, cause of action, costs or expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs), arising out of any claim by a third party relating to any material the user has posed on an ASD-sponsored site.

Privacy

The Superintendent or designee will ensure that the privacy rights of students, parents/guardians, staff, Board members, and other individuals are protected on official district social media platforms.

Students, parents, staff and members of the public are hereby given notice that the District reserves the right to and will monitor all District social media websites. As such, there is no expectation of privacy for information posted on, sent to or received by the District's social media websites.

NHSBA Note, September 2014: Only change is an addition of a Legal Reference, RSA 275:72. Content of the policy has not changed. RSA 276:72 prohibits an employer from requesting or requiring that an employee or prospective employee disclose login information for accessing any personal account or service through an electronic communication device. Additionally, RSA 275:72 prohibits an employer from taking or threatening to take disciplinary action against any employee for such employee's refusal to comply with a request or demand by the employer that violates this statute. Employers are still allowed to adopt and enforce lawful workplace policies governing the use of the employer's electronic equipment, including policies regarding Internet use, social networking site use, and electronic mail use.

Category R

SCHOOL DISTRICT INTERNET ACCESS FOR STAFF

The School Board recognizes that technological resources can enhance teacher performance by offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, facilitating communications with parents/guardians, teachers, and the community, supporting District and school operations, and improving access to and exchange of information. The Board expects all staff to learn to use the available technological resources that will assist them in the performance of their education. As needed, staff shall receive training, lessons and instruction in the appropriate use of these resources.

Staff shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District's technological resources primarily for purposes related to their education. Staff are hereby notified that there is no expectation of privacy on district computers, computer files, email, internet usage logs, and other electronic data.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District computers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that prevents access to visual depictions that are obscene or pornographic and that the operation of such measures is enforced. The Superintendent or designee may disable the technology protection measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research, educational or other lawful purpose.

The Superintendent shall establish administrative regulations and a Responsible Use Agreement that outlines staff obligations and responsibilities related to the use of District technology. He/she also may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. Inappropriate use may result in a cancellation of the staff member's user privileges, disciplinary action, and/or legal action in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulations.

In the event that an employee leaves the District and is in possession of a device that was purchased with District funds, the following will apply:

- 1. If the device was purchased with a grant, the device will remain with the District.
- 2. If the employee is leaving the District after having the device for one year, the device will remain with the District.
- 3. If the employee is leaving the District after having the device for two years, he/she may purchase it with administrative approval from the District at 75% of its purchase price;
- 4. If the employee is leaving the District after having the device for three years, he/she may purchase the device with administrative approval from the District at either 50% of its purchase price or a price negotiated by the Director of Technology and approval of the Superintendent as adjusted for reasonable depreciation.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide copies of related policies, regulations, and guidelines to all staff. Staff shall be required to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood the District's Responsible Use Agreement.

SAU 72 RESPONSIBLE USE POLICY

The SAU 72 and Alton Central School provides access to a comprehensive collection of technology resources for employee and student use. These technology resources are to be used for educational and school related business purposes only.

The ACS Responsible Use Policy outlines appropriate use and prohibited activities when using all technology resources and electronic devices as defined by school administrators. Access to the networks and to the information technology environment within the District is a privilege and must be treated as such by all users of the network and its associated systems.

Every employee and student is expected to follow all of the rules and conditions listed, whether at home or at school, as well as those given verbally by SAU 72 administrators and/or teachers, and to demonstrate responsible citizenship and ethical behavior at all times when using school/district equipment.

Examples of unacceptable uses of ACS computers that are expressly prohibited include, but are not limited to the following:

- Accessing Inappropriate Materials Accessing, submitting, posting, publishing, forwarding, downloading, scanning or displaying defamatory, abusive, racially offensive, obscene, vulgar, profane, sexually explicit, sexually suggestive, threatening, discriminatory, harassing and/or illegal materials.
- 2. Illegal or Prohibited Activities Using the ACS computers, networks or Internet services for any illegal activity or in violation of any Board policy or school rules, including "cyberbullying" and other harassing or discriminatory conduct. The school unit assumes no responsibility for illegal activities of students while using school computers.
- 3. Violating Copyrights Copying, downloading or sharing of any type of copyrighted materials (including music or films) without the owner's permission (see Board policy). The school district assumes no responsibility for copyright violations by students/staff.
- 4. Copying Software -- Copying or downloading software without the express authorization of the Technology Department is prohibited. Unauthorized copying of software is illegal and may subject the copier to substantial civil and criminal penalties. Alton Central School assumes no responsibility for illegal software copying by students/staff.
- 5. Non-School Related Uses Using the school district's computers, networks or Internet services for non-school related purposes such as private financial gain, commercial, advertising or solicitation purposes, or for any other personal use not connected with the educational program or assignments.

- **6. Misuse of Passwords/Unauthorized Access--** Sharing passwords, using other user's passwords, or accessing/using other user's accounts.
- 7. Malicious Use/Vandalism-- Any malicious use, disruption or harm to the ACS computers, networks and Internet services, including but not limited to hacking activities, creation/uploading of computer viruses, or subverting web filters, firewalls or any other security measures.
- **8.** Unauthorized Access to Blogs/Social Networking Sites, etc. Accessing blogs, social networking sites, etc. without specific authorization from the supervising teacher is prohibited.

No Expectation of Privacy

SAU 72 computers remain under the control, custody and supervision of ACS at all times. Students/staff have no expectation of privacy in their use of school computers, including but not limited to: email, stored files or internet activity.

Pursuant to the Electronic Communications Privacy Act of 1986 (18 USC 2510 et seq.), notice is hereby given that there are no facilities provided by this system for sending or receiving private or confidential electronic communications. System administrators have access to all mail and will monitor messages. Messages relating to or in support of illegal activities will be reported to the appropriate authorities.

Compensation for Losses, Costs and/or Damages

SAU 72 and Alton Central School reserves the right to seek for compensation for any losses, costs or damages incurred by the student/staff for violations of Board policies and school rules while the student/staff is using school owned computers, including the cost of investigating such violations. ACS assumes no responsibility for any unauthorized charges or costs incurred by a student/staff while using school computers.

ACS families will be given the option of purchasing insurance to cover the cost of any damages; families who do not have insurance will be responsible for the full cost of repairing or replacing.

Student Security

A student is not allowed to reveal his/her full name, address, telephone number, social security number or other personal information on the Internet without prior permission from a teacher. Students should never agree to meet people they have contacted through the Internet without parental/guardian's permission. Students should inform their teacher if they access information or messages that are dangerous, inappropriate or make them uncomfortable in any way.

Network Security

The security of ACS computers, networks and Internet services is a high priority; staff must notify the technology director immediately regarding problems. Any student who identifies a security problem must notify his/her teacher immediately. The student shall not demonstrate the problem to others or access unauthorized material. Any user who attempts to breach system security, causes a breach of system security or fails to report a system security problem shall be subject to disciplinary and/or legal action in addition to having his/her computer privileges limited, suspended or revoked.

Students/staff may not propagate computer worms or viruses, distribute quantities of information that overwhelms the systems, or use a District network to make unauthorized entries into any other resources accessible via the network.

Additional Codes of Conduct

- 1. Laptops are loaned to students/staff as an educational tool and are only authorized for use consistent with the school's mission.
- 2. Students/staff are responsible for the proper care of laptops at all times, including costs associated with repairing or replacing the laptop.
- 3. If a laptop is lost or stolen, this must be reported to the Technology Department immediately; a theft should also be reported to the local police.
- 4. The Board's policy and rules concerning computer and Internet use and all other policies and rules apply to use of laptops at any time or place, on or off school property. Students/Staff are responsible for obeying any additional rules concerning care of laptops issued by the school.
- 5. Violation of policies or rules governing the use of computers, or any careless use of a laptop may result in a student's/staff's laptop being confiscated and/or a student only being allowed to use the laptop under the direct supervision of school staff. The student/staff will also be subject to disciplinary action for any violations of Board policies or school rules.
- 6. Parents/guardians will be informed of their child's login password. Parents/guardians are responsible for supervising their child's use of the laptop and Internet access when in use at home.
- 7. The laptop may only be used by the student to whom it is assigned.
- 8. Laptops must be returned in acceptable working order at the end of the school year or whenever requested by school staff.

STUDENT WELLNESS POLICY

Introduction

The Alton School District (the District) recognizes the importance of promoting the physical well-being of students and staff. Scientific research indicates a positive relationship between adequate nutrition and physical activity as they relate to academic success. Poor nutrition and lack of physical activity can place students at a higher risk for diseases such as diabetes, obesity, and other health ailments. Federal and state laws mandate that school districts provide students with healthy food choices while in school, whether the students are obtaining food and/or beverages from the Food Service Program, school stores, vending machines, snack bars, fundraisers, or other sources.

The District will provide students and families with educational opportunities regarding healthy choices in nutrition. Educational opportunities will include formal academic instruction in health, physical education family and consumer science and science classes. Other opportunities could include individual counseling by school nursing personnel, dietary direction by athletic coaches and an explanation of food choices provided by the school food service. While healthy food choices brought from home are encouraged, food for individual consumption is excluded from this policy.

Nutrition

All foods available during the school day will meet or exceed the district's nutrition standards, as required by the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act (HHFKA) of 2010. Such offerings will meet or exceed the regulations and guidance issue by the US Secretary of Agriculture as applicable to schools. Schools in the district will offer food choices that are nutrient dense per calorie, have low fat and low sugar content, are of a moderate portion size, and include a variety of fruits and vegetables. Foods should be served with consideration towards variety, appeal, taste, safety and packaging to ensure that students will participate in consuming high quality meals. Students shall be provided with adequate time to consume meals in accordance with the New Hampshire Department of Education Minimum Standards Section 306.11. During the school day, the New Hampshire School Nutrition Guidelines will apply to the school lunch and breakfast programs, all food and beverages sold in vending machines, school stores, classroom parties/celebrations, communal snacks, meetings, fundraising activities that exceed the three allowable exemptions per school, or any school sponsored activities on school grounds.

Physical Activity

The purpose of the District's physical activity policy is to promote daily participation in physical activity for all students. The goal is to promote and maintain physical fitness and to provide students with the opportunity to gain the knowledge and skills needed to understand the short and long term benefits of physical activity. Physical activities

offered may include, but are not limited to, recess periods, physical education classes, walking programs, the integration of physical activities in to the academic curriculum and after-school programs, including intramurals, interscholastic athletics, and physical activity clubs.

The District recognizes that sixty (60) minutes of moderate to vigorous daily exercise is a reasonable goal for students. The goal may be accomplished through a combination of the following:

- 1. A sequential physical education program;
- 2. Time in the elementary school day for supervised recess with physical activities encouraged;
- 3. Opportunities and encouragement for students to initiate and voluntarily participate in before-and after-school physical activity or programs, such as intramurals, clubs, etc; and
- 4. School support for community recreation, youth sports programs, and agencies that complement physical activity programs.

Wellness Committee

The District shall establish a District Wellness Committee (DWC) with representation from parents, students (at grade levels where appropriate) food service, the school board, building administration, school nurses, classroom teachers, and health/physical education teachers that will meet monthly and report to the administration and school board as appropriate.

The DWC will encourage compliance with all nutritional, wellness, and physical activity components of this policy The DWC will publicize activities, events, and programs that support healthy lifestyle, nutrition education, and physical activity. These activities could include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Quarterly outreach to parents/guardians that provides tips for living healthy, active, and nutritionally sound lifestyles through websites, school newsletters, etc.:
- 2. Providing resources and programs that provide parents/guardians with strategies to support their children;
- Adopting a student reporting system, such as Fitnessgram Program, that annually
 illustrates a student's physical growth and is practiced in all physical education
 classes and serves as the tracking mechanism to monitor student growth and
 progress;
- 4. Ensuring that student/parent/guardian handbooks contain specific reference to this policy; and
- 5. Developing and sharing a list of healthy snacks and party ideas.

Evaluation

An annual review of performance will be conducted based on District policy.

Salary

Salaries will be recommended by the Superintendent to the Alton School Board based on performance.

Payroll

All employees will be paid bi-weekly. Direct deposit is made available to the employee.

Professional Development/Leave

All requests for up to three (3) professional days shall be pre-approved by the Superintendent. Additional days may be approved at the discretion of the Superintendent.

All personnel included in this handbook will be reimbursed up to \$2,000 for professional development that has been pre-approved in My Learning Plan (MLP) by the Superintendent or his/her designee.

All courses including graduate courses, workshop or seminars must be job related.

Employees will be reimbursed for daily meal expenses related to their professional training. Contact the Business Administrator for the rates based on the per diem GSA.gov portal.

Travel reimbursement will be for actual mileage at the federal rate per mile from the school or home whichever is closer to the workshop site. Rooms and meals must be reasonable and follow all district policies.

Professional Dues/Fees

Personnel may use professional development monies to pay for re-certification / licensing fees or professional organization dues as approved by the Superintendent.

Retirement

All full time employees thirty-six (36) hours or more are required to be members of the NH State Retirement System.

Health Insurance

The School District will offer a single, two-person or family health plan with a 14% co-pay by the employee. The co-pay will be paid through payroll deduction.

Health Insurance Buy Back

The District agrees to pay \$2,000 to any employee who does not elect to participate in the District's Health Insurance program upon evidence of a certificate of insurance. The buy-back will be paid in two equal installments in December and May.

Dental Insurance

The School District will pay one hundred (100) percent of the complete cost of a single person coverage, ninety-five (95) percent for two-person coverage and ninety (90) percent for family coverage for employees. The employee will pay the remaining percentage through payroll deduction.

COBRA Plan

Employees at the end of their employment may elect to continue coverage up to 18 months following their termination. Coverage will be at the employee's expense.

Sick Leave

Sick leave will accumulate at the rate of 1.5 days per month, September - June, cumulative to a maximum of one hundred-ten (110) days. The Board agrees to reimburse the employees who have accumulated over the maximum of one hundred-ten (110) days at a rate of \$125.00 per day for excess sick days.

Other Leave

Two (2) emergency days, three (3) personal days and up to three (3) bereavement days are available. Additional time may be granted upon written request to the Superintendent. Personal days may not be used to extend school calendar vacations unless pre-approved by the Superintendent.
