High School Student Points of Emphasis

Student Parking:

All students will park in the west student parking lot (no hang tag required)

Closed Campus:

Closed campus means students are not permitted to leave the school grounds during the school day without following the proper procedures to sign out. Students are not permitted to leave school property for lunch. This policy is in place for the safety and security of all students.

Cell Phones and Headphones/Earbuds

CELL PHONES

*Cell phones have become a **huge distraction** for students. In order to avoid disruption of the educational environment and protect students' right of privacy, student use of cell phones or personal communication devices (PCDs) is **restricted to before and after school hours and during a student's assigned lunch period.** Students shall have no expectation of confidentiality with respect to their use of cell phone/PCDs on school premises/property.*

Any cell phone or electronic device visible or in use without appropriate authority during school hours other than identified above will be confiscated. Failure to comply with a request to hand over the cell phone will result in an automatic suspension for insubordination.

If a phone or electronic device is confiscated it will be turned over to the building administration and will be returned to the student's Parent or legal Guardian.

Headphones / Earbuds

Headphones/Earbuds

Students will be required to have headphones/earbuds for educational purposes. In order to avoid disruption of the educational environment or distractions to student learning opportunities, student use of headphones/earbuds is restricted to before and after school hours, during a student's assigned lunch period and when approved by a staff member for educational purposes. Only with a staff members permission or direction can these devices be used at any other time during a school day or during a class period. Any headphone/earbuds devise visible or in use without appropriate authority during school hours will be confiscated. Failure to comply with a request to hand over the device will result in an automatic suspension for insubordination. If a device is confiscated it will be turned over to the principal.

Backpacks and Bags

PURSES/TOTE BAGS

Student safety is a priority and to maintain their safe educational environment, backpacks and duffle bags are not permitted in classrooms.(P.E. Class is an exception) Students are to use their assigned lockers for storage.



TOBACCO PRODUCTS

Possession of any tobacco product, including cigarettes, cigars, chewing tobacco or tobacco snuff or any look-a-like cigarettes, e-cigarettes, vapes, cigars, tobacco snuff, lighters, or matches is prohibited on school property or at any school sponsored events on or off campus. This would include students going to and from the school bus regardless of whether they are on school property. Students who violate this rule are subject to up to three (3) days of suspension. The penalty is: first offense – one (1) day suspension. Second offense – three (3) days of suspension.

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES/DRUGS, AND ALCOHOL

Use and possession – Students who are in possession of drug-related paraphernalia or who use, possess or are under the influence of controlled substances, drugs or alcohol on or near (adjacent to) district property during school hours or at any school sponsored activity either on or off campus, are subject to immediate suspension and/or expulsion.



New Change Michigan Law

YOUTH TOBACCO ACT (EXCERPT)

Act 31 of 1915

***** 722.642.amended THIS AMENDED SECTION IS EFFECTIVE SEPTEMBER 2, 2019 *****

(3) Subject to subsection (6), a minor shall not do any of the following:

(a) Purchase or attempt to purchase a vapor product or alternative nicotine product.

(b) Possess or attempt to possess a vapor product or alternative nicotine product.

(c) Use a vapor product or alternative nicotine product in a public place.

(d) Present or offer to an individual a purported proof of age that is false, fraudulent, or not actually his or her own proof of age for the purpose of purchasing, attempting to purchase, possessing, or attempting to possess a vapor product or alternative nicotine product.

1st offense Civil infraction \$50 fine possible classes 16 hrs of community service
2nd offense Civil infractions \$50 fine possible classes 32 hrs of community service
3rd offense Misdemeanor \$50 fine possible classes 48 hrs of community service

Sexting and Social Media

Sexting is sending sexually explicit messages, photos, or video via cell phone, computer, or any digital device.

Sexting includes photos and videos containing nudity or show or simulated sex acts. It also includes text messages that discuss or propose sex acts.

The analysis, which was published in the Journal of the American Medical Association, showed that more than one in four teenagers reported that they'd received a sext, defined by the study as a sexually explicit image, video or message that is sent electronically.

THE MICHIGAN PENAL CODE (EXCERPT) Act 328 of 1931

Criminal Penalty for Sending Nude Photos in Michigan

According to the Michigan Penal Code, [Section 750.145c](#), three sexting related actions can be punished under **child pornography statutes**.

Any person who persuades, induces, entices, coerces, or otherwise allows a minor to engage in a sexual abusive activity such as sexting could face up to **20 years in prison** and fines of up to \$100,000. If a teenager were to persuade a girlfriend or boyfriend to take and send an explicit photograph, he or she could be punished under this statute.

Anyone who distributes or promotes any child sexually abusive material could face up to **7 years in prison** and a fine of as much as \$50,000. If your child was involved in sending sexually explicit photos via text, he or she could be punished under this statute.

Finally, anyone who knowingly possesses child sexually abusive materials can be punished by a **4 year prison** sentence, along with a fine of up to \$10,000.

Attendance Policy

ATTENDANCE PER SEMESTER

Students absent from class for eleven (11) or more days in a semester will be considered truant. Any student absent from class for eleven (11) or more days will automatically receive a letter grade of “F” for the class on their transcript.

Students exceeding the attendance policy will have the opportunity to earn that class credit by taking the final exam and scoring a 70% or higher. If a student receives a 70% or better on the final exam, the student **will** be awarded that credit for graduation through the credit recovery program.

School related absences, court ordered absences, and death in the family absences or absences related to illness or a hospital stay will not count toward the eleven (11) days. Documentation for all situations should be turned into the office and kept in the student’s file. Administration will have the final say on the determination of excused or not for all absences.

▶ Getting Involved (2018–19, 509 students)

- 86% (438 students) participated in an extracurricular activities and were successful in the classroom.
- 14% (71 students) chose not to participate in any extracurricular activities.
- 90% of the students that struggled in school last year were not involved with extracurricular activities.

Student Responsibilities

General Care

- Battery charging
- Storing devices
- Carrying devices & charger
- Storage of school-related content only

Acceptable Use

- Only school-appropriate content (inside and outside of school)
- Teacher directed use of music, games and sound in classroom
- Apps and system installed by Dundee should not be tampered with or removed
- Syncing of data and software updates only occur with Dundee school account; no personal accounts and apps
- Follow Dundee Acceptable Use Policy

Safety and Security



- Everything is monitored
- The device and the account belong to the district (i.e. monitoring email, web use)
- Filter and Firewall in place
- Constant monitoring against threats
- Handbook and Board policies in place
- Digital Citizenship
- Students are able to access G Suite Apps from home, regardless of internet access.



Dundee Digital Driver's License

Learn to be a Dundee digital citizen!

- To increase ownership, responsibility, and digital safety, all students in the 1:1 program will complete the online course
- Topics include: Acceptable Use, Care of 1:1 devices, digital safety, and how to be a Dundee digital citizen
- Directions will be provided to students
- Students will print the certificate to show DDL has been earned

Parent Involvement



- Pay the \$30 fee for insurance
- Talk to your student about internet safety / Assist in completing Digital Driver's License
- Watch your student in action: doing homework, submitting work to a teacher, collaborating with a classmate


