- We went from 776 FTE kids to 1420 FTE kids.
- We went from less than 100 staff members to over 200.

College Place High School Partners with Amazon for Computer Science Courses

College Place High School has been selected as an Amazon Future Engineer (AFE) school - a partnership between Amazon and Edhesive to improve access to computer science education in communities currently underrepresented in the technology field. This is all thanks to Mr. Matthew Hunter, the Computer Science teacher at CPHS who reached out to Amazon in the fall to see if the school would qualify for the AFE program. Hunter stated "My main reason for doing this was seeing the amazing work my female students were doing in my classroom. I wanted to offer them and all students even more opportunities in the STEM field."

According to the Bureau of Labor statistics, by 2020 there will be 1.4 million computer-science-related jobs available and only 400,000 computer science graduates with the skills to apply for those jobs. Many students eager to fill that gap and obtain a high paying job in technology do not have access to computer science in their high schools. Often schools want to offer these courses to their students but do not have access to curriculum and/or teacher support materials.

Amazon and Edhesive are partnering to address this gap by sponsoring teachers and administrators who demonstrate this need and are committed to bringing computer science to their school with access

to content such as: Computer Science,

AP Computer Science Principles, or AP Computer Science A courses. This

Superintendent Payne stated "I was very impressed with the process and received overwhelmingly positive feedback from multiple references for Mr. Aguilar. Robert has a lot of energy for what we are doing here at College Place High School and we look forward to having him be part of our team."

Mr. Aguilar graduated from Walla Walla High School in 2001. He attended the University of Washington and graduated in 2003 with a Bachelor of Arts in History. Mr. Aguilar then completed his Master's in Education from the University of Washington and went onto receive his Administrative Credentials from the University of Washington.

Mr. Aguilar is currently a Vice Principal at Heatherwood Middle School with the Everett School District. Prior to that he was a Vice Principal and Athletic Director at Cascade High School in Everett. Mr. Aguilar also worked for the Lake Washington School District, where he taught US and World History and was the Drama Elective teacher at Redmond Junior High School.

Mr. Aguilar's wife Jessica, also has ties to the area as she attended Whitman College and graduated in 2005. They have two sons, Alexander 4 and William 2, and a daughter Steph born in May. In his spare time, Mr. Aguilar enjoys CrossFit, or playing with his kids at a local park.

Mr. Aguilar states, "I am very excited to be returning to the Walla Walla Valley and look forward to serving the community of College Place, working with our students, staff, and families to prepare our kids to thrive in a 21st century global economy and contribute to their communities with character and integrity."

Mr. Aguilar will begin his contract with College Place Public Schools on July 1, 2019. Mr. Kasenga will continue to act as the interim principal at CPHS until the end of the school year.

Crisis Team at CPPS

College Place Public Schools recently formed a Crisis Team to tackle many of the social emotional needs that arise in our schools on a daily basis. Staff from each school and the District Office are members of this critical team. The goal is to support students and staff in times of crisis and distress and to provide



additional support for school counselors.

Part of becoming a team member, began with a training called Youth Mental Health First

Aid. The course teaches school staff, how to help adolescent students who may be experiencing a mental health issue, addiction challenges, or who may be in crisis. The course introduced common mental health challenges for youth, reviewed typical adolescent development, and taught our team a 5-step action plan for how to help young people in both crisis and non-crisis situations. College Place Public Schools send 13 staff members to this training so that we could expand our district's capacity in all buildings to focus on kids and their learning.

FIRE Team at Davis

At Davis, we say, "All **Dragons** Breathe Fire." And no one breathes more FIRE than our 5th grade FIRE Team Members! This team is made up of nearly 30 students who represent a diverse cross section of our student body. They are kids who have demonstrated incredible aptitude for

College Place Public Schools Hires New Superintendent



The College Place School Board voted unanimously on Monday, May 6, 2019 to offer Mr. James (Jim) Fry the position of superintendent at College Place Public Schools. By approving his contract, Mr. Fry will begin his new position on July 1, 2019, taking the reins from Superintendent Payne who will be leaving the district after 18 years of service.

Mr. Fry currently serves as the Assistant Superintendent of Clarkston School District, where he

began serving as the Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Executive Director in January 2012. Mr. Fry has served as a leader in every level of a school system from teacher to principal to district office administrator. He has both small and large school experience including areas of HR, teaching and learning, and bargaining.

In a statement from Mr. Fry, he said "I am extremely blessed and humbled to be coming to College Place as the Superintendent. My wife Angie, and our four boys are very excited to call College Place home. My 22 years in education and educational leadership have prepared me for this step and I am grateful to the College Place School Board for entrusting me with this responsibility. It is one that I don't take for granted."

"I can't wait to get there and get to know the staff, students and community and become a part of the legacy that is College Place Public Schools. My philosophy is to love people and show growth. That is what I intend to do in College Place."

District speech and language pathologists, special education teachers and general education teachers are receiving on-going professional development in how to use and implement this program with our students.


