#### School Launches Thrillshare

This summer, Cove School is undergoing two major technology upgrades simultaneously. First, the school is upgrading and changing platforms for its core database—the Student Information System. The transition from the old system, Schoolmaster, to the new, Synergy, has been underway for months and is expected to be completed on June 24. Secondly, the school is revising its website and social network presence through the use of Thrillshare.

Thrillshare manages all online interactions between Cove School and stakeholders. It allows the school to craft a unique identity across web, mobile, social media, and alerts with a single, simple-to-use tool. Thrillshare helps the entire staff manage communication across all devices and social networks people use today. Thrillshare lowers the technical barrier so that anyone at the school can share information. Through Thrillshare, staff can simultaneously post information to the school website, Twitter, Facebook, the Cove Leopard Mobile App, via text message, or even via voice message. Of course, a staff member can also choose just one or any combination of platforms to communicate. To make this effort effective; parents, students and other stakeholders will need the Cove Leopard App on their mobile device.

As part of this effort, the school has just launched a new website which aligns with it's mobile app. The mobile app will soon be available at Google Play and the Apple App Store. I encourage you to visit our website where you will soon find links to download our app or just search for Cove Leopard App. Once you download the Cove Leopard App, you will have real-time access to newsfeeds, updates, event calendars, lunch menus, sports schedules, and more right on your phone! According to recent research data, nearly twice the number of Google searches were from mobile devices last year. The world has gone mobile and now so has Cove School District!

#### Charter Lottery: 56% Acceptance Rate

On June 3rd, Cove Charter School conducted its annual lottery for enrollment of new charter student applicants. 56% of the applicants were immediately admitted with the remaining 44% placed on waiting lists. According to the Charter agreement, the school has a self-defined capacity of 306 students and is now expecting to open in the fall with 290 (95% of capacity). Following the lottery, only four grade levels have a remaining waiting list: Kindergarten, 1st, 7th, and 8th. Until October 1, students may apply to fill any vacancy which may exist and the school will also admit students from the waiting list as openings may occur. Cove School does not accept out-of-district enrollment of students after October 1st each year.

#### Cafeteria Project Update

Cove School District is preparing to request bids for the cafeteria project pending a few hoops from local government planning and permits. It is anticipated that the construction will begin during the summer with the intent to have the new facility open for the 20-21 school year.

During construction, it is anticipated that some existing parking will not be accessible and a portion of the elementary playfield will be partitioned and closed. It is also anticipated that some summer activities may be relocated to the high school football field although the south little league baseball field will remain in operation. Please be patient next year as we work to bring lasting improvements to the campus.

#### **Board Member Elections**


Cove School District congratulates and welcomes newly elected Board Member Hannah Johnson. Running unopposed, Hannah Johnson was elected to position #1. Also running unopposed, Steve McLean was re-elected to position #3. These terms begin on July 1 and run through June 30, 2023. Positions 2, 4, and 5 will next face elections in May of 2021.

#### Budget Hearing: June 18

Cove School District Budget Committee approved the proposed budget with minor adjustments last month. The next step is for the Board to hold a public hearing scheduled for June 18th at 6:30 PM. It is expected that the Board will adopt the budget following any additional modifications they may make that same evening. Increased revenues and careful management over many years has allowed the Board to take on capital improvements without soliciting additional funds from the local taxpayer. #### SuperView

On May 8 around 25,000 students, teachers and parents showed up at Portland's Tom McCall Waterfront Park dressed in red demanding smaller class sizes, more social services for students, and generally more money. They



Nearly non-existent is the cry for smaller class sizes in Eastern Oregon. When money was tight, schools in this region kept focus on the primary instructional mission and no school superintendent or school board would allow class sizes to grow—because the community would not stand for it! As the scope of services schools provide becomes broader and strays further from the primary purpose of schools, lack of resources has become a real-world problem for many Oregon schools east of the Cascades. Conversely, while schools in Portland are complaining because they have only one mental health counselor per 400 students, most Eastern Oregon Schools don't have any on staff. Most Eastern Oregon Schools do not have a health clinic, provide free meals for all students, or place an athletic trainer or counselor in every school. These are commonplace on the west side of the state—the side which does not have enough money in their school budgets. I don't argue that these services are not needed, I just wonder how and when it became the schools' responsibility to provide these support services for free. Schools are about teaching and learning. As schools take on more and more of the feeding, clothing, transporting, mental health services, health care, and policing of children, the purpose of school becomes redefined and broadened—that can be an expensive proposition. ~ Earl Pettit



Language Arts, and Zane Larvik, who read 675 books. Have a great summer break! ~Mrs. Wright




1st Grade Visited Rovey's Farm





# A Final Note from the Music Room

March marked the beginning of the contest and festival season for the high school performing groups. Cove was fortunate to enter several contests this year. Contests provide groups with an evaluation and give an opportunity for a professional to compare their performance against other groups and give a rating based on a scale of excellence. An evaluation is important to understand an ensembles strengths and weaknesses.



Many festivals also provide opportunities for clinics and workshops that allow students to interact with professionals and experts in certain areas of music performance.




