

FROM MR. SPANGENBURG, SUPERINTENDENT...

Dear Andover School Family and Community Members,

We have settled into the new school year and the routines that come with it, and I am very excited to tell you about what is happening in the district. Besides the new staff that I mentioned in our previous newsletter, students entered the building this September and were greeted with more new laptops, i-pads, Elmo digital projectors, and Epson projectors that will assist teachers and students and enhance instruction and learning. This technology is state of the art and is helping prepare our students for careers and work they will do in the future. In addition to the above items, we also have new music and band equipment that will enhance the music programs, classroom furniture in some rooms, and equipment for the technology classroom.

We are excited that Literacy West has joined us to start the STEAM Opportunities and Recreation (SOAR) program which is being funded by the 21st century grant that our district received this year. They are off to a wonderful start and this program will benefit our students, families, and community members. Please check the Andover website at www.andovercsd.org to find out what activities and events they are planning such as afterschool programs, family fun nights, field trips, parent education classes, and other community events. After school activities offer STEAM curriculum which ties all subjects together. STEAM is defined as: Science & Technology, interpreted through Engineering & the Arts, all based in Mathematical elements.

Students in grades K-8 are continuing to use i-ready, an assessment and diagnostic program that assists, guides and monitors learning in the areas of reading and math. The data from the last two years shows great gains for students in both areas. Students have already taken their first benchmark assessment this year allowing teachers to quickly find our students' strengths and weaknesses. Teachers will use this data to create learning targets for each student. For parents of students in Grades K-6 your child's first i-ready assessment indicating their current level will be placed in their report card which will be handed out during Parent Conferences on Monday, November 13.

On September 26, we finally received approval on the two gym renovation projects from the State Education Department. On October 6, we met with the Kinley Corporation, the contractor who was selected by bid to do the work, to develop the timeline for the project. Because the new bleachers will not be in until end of January we have decided to wait until near the end of basketball season to start the work in the gym. The project will be completed over the course of three months with the painting completed during February break and the floor completed over April break. When the gym is completed, in addition to having new bleachers, we will have a new sound system, scoreboards, wall padding around the entire gym, LED lights behind the backboards, shot clocks,

paint throughout the entire gym, floor design, and an upgraded fire alarm system throughout the entire building. The current logo on the floor will be painted on the wall next to the student section.

At the same time we are planning for these smaller capital projects, we are working with Clark Patterson Lee, our architectural firm, to submit the necessary paperwork to the State to begin the \$6.7 million project that was approved by the voters at the May 16, 2017 budget vote. Renovations in this capital project include a new science wing, masonry repairs, generator upgrade, art room upgrades, painting of the front of the building including the pillars and dome, new lights in the front and rear parking lots, pavement repairs, storm drainage, upgrades to the athletic fields, ventilation systems, outdoor basketball restoration, adding additional walkways outside of the school building, and repairs at the bus garage. I will keep you posted on the status of these projects.

As I write this letter, I am reminded that the leaves will fall and sometime shortly after that or even while some leaves are still on the trees, snow will come. With the change in the weather comes the potential for school closing. Please review our school closing and delay procedures which are posted in this newsletter. You can also find these procedures in the student handbook. Closings and delays will be announced on various radio and television stations, as well as through School Messenger, the district's notification system. Closing or delaying the opening of school is one of the most challenging decisions we make and I want to ensure you that we consider many factors such as weather prediction reports, road conditions, student and staff safety, and the need for many of our students to have a warm environment and nutritious meals, as well as working parents schedules in the decision.

The week of October 23-27 is School Board Recognition Week. In recognition of our Board members' service to the Andover Central School District, community and our students, please take time to thank each of our Board of Education Members for their time and dedication to our district: Monica Dean, President, Michele Calladine, Vice-President, Cindy Baker, Pat Howland, Jr., and Brian Perkins.

In closing, I am excited about the wonderful things that are happening in the district as we continue to educate ACS students and make Andover the best little school district in America. We must all work together to support student learning and help our children achieve their dreams and reach their full potential. Please feel free to call me or stop into my office anytime. I welcome your input and involvement.

MRS. CORNELL'S CURRICULUM CORNER...

Dear Andover Family,

Can you believe it is already October? Every morning while I drive into Andover, I count my blessings. I am thankful for being able to work in such a beautiful part of the country, for the ability to work with and for a strong supportive community, and most importantly how fortunate I am to be working with your child to make sure everything ACS is doing is good enough for them. It is my passion that the whole child is being educated while making sure we are doing what is best and right for them!

As the 2017-2018 school year begins to speed up, I wanted to take this opportunity to discuss the importance of our NYS academic standards. These standards were designed and written to help ensure that all students are prepared for success in college and the workforce. Standards provide a clear direction for learning for teachers, parents, and students. The ELA standards build upon each other as your child climbs through the grade levels, whereas the Math standards build on concept/skills in order to accomplish multi-step problems and critical thinking problem solving skills. By having such clearly defined standards our teachers are able to instruct with a strong understanding of what the students are expected to learn by the end of year. Throughout the past year and continuing this school year our teachers have created explicit learning targets for their lesson(s). Learning targets are visible to the students throughout the lesson and referred to at the beginning, middle, and end of the lesson(s). These learning targets are developed from a standard and offer students the ability to understand what they are expected to learn and/or perform for that particular lesson (i.e. "I can ask and answer questions about the text"). As a result, the students naturally take ownership over their own learning through intrinsic engagement. Having clearly defined goals helps families and teachers work together to ensure that students succeed. They also will help your child develop critical thinking skills that will prepare him or her for college and the workforce. Below is an example of a 5th grade Art learning target with student work:



Lastly, I am excited to share that our SOAR After School Program has started! Students K-8 have been staying after school to partake in STEAM activities along with a variety of additional learning opportunities. Make sure your checking the website for upcoming events for not only students, but families and community members as well. Andover Central School District has been very busy planning and scheduling a variety of great opportunities for ALL! Stay tuned and get active with ACS!

Upcoming events for the month of October will include:






School age children who regularly eat with their families, at least four times a week, have fewer behavioral problems and are more likely to perform better in academics than students who dined with their families three or fewer times per week.






THIS AND THAT...

HOMECOMING RESULTS:

The Homecoming parade and bonfire were awesome to watch. The weather held off just enough to get both events in and the bonfire was one of the most magnificent sights ever.

All of our teams played hard and represented Andover with great pride during the soccer games. Both of our modified teams lost tough games. Our two varsity teams were very impressive. Our boys' varsity team beat Whitesville 5 to 1, and our varsity girls' varsity team won 4 to 0. The boys' and girls' played one of their best games together for Homecoming Weekend. Great job, kids.

Of course the Homecoming week ended with our annual Homecoming Dance which also was a great success. It was a wonderful way to start the school year off for our kids, school and community.

Varsity boys' soccer team:

The varsity boys' soccer team were runners up this year in the Belfast "Kick-Off" tournament. Our boys won the first game over Hinsdale 4 to 2 and lost a close game to Belfast in the championship game 3 to 1. All-tournament team members from Andover were Chris Calladine, Tanner Button and Hunter Greene.

During the regular season we now have an overall record of 8 wins and only 4 losses. Three of those losses were by one goal (each loss was 2 to 1). With four games left in the regular season we should have a very nice overall record entering the sectionals. With two hard fought losses to Fillmore (again both games were 2 to 1 defeats) it looks like we will not win the county championship, but we should make a good run for the sectional title again this year. We have made it to the finals in sectional play each of the last three seasons, winning it two years ago.


Varsity girls' soccer team:

The varsity girls were also runners up in the Belfast tournament this year. Our girls won the first game 6 to 1 over Belfast, but lost to a very strong Fillmore team 2 to 0 in the championship game. Emily Kelley, Emma Terhune and Emily Wahl were selected to the all-tournament team.

During the regular season our girls have an overall record of 9 wins and 2 losses. We are also ranked as of this newsletter as the #1 seed for sectional play. It looks like our girls have a great chance of going very deep into sectional play, looking for their third sectional title in four years. Wouldn't that be something?
