

## **Alcohol, Drugs, and Other Controlled Substances**

In this day and time, alcohol and other forms of drug abuse have grown to major proportions in our society. The school setting is not exempted from this phenomenon. Therefore, it is vital that educators and parents continually explore ways to institute programs that encourage a drug-free lifestyle for their students/children. It is to that end that this program is created to provide the appropriate action plan to address and nurture a drug-free environment for the entire Grayson County School community.

All coaches of the athletic teams, student organization advisors, the School Board, and the administrators of Grayson County School District recognize that the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs seriously impairs the health, safety, education, and future success of students engaged in that use. It is also recognized that, while the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs is a potential problem for all students, those students engaged in interscholastic athletics, extracurricular/co-curricular activities, and those with permits to drive a motor vehicle onto campus are often viewed by fellow students as holding or enjoying positions of notoriety and are confronted by unique pressures and health risks that make them particularly vulnerable to the harms presented by that use. Because of the potential notoriety derived from athletics and extracurricular/co-curricular participation, and on-campus driving privileges, these students also potentially impact or influence the attitudes and actions of the other members of the student body. Finally, in order to deal effectively with these special pressures, health risks and other potential risks, we believe it is imperative to adopt a mandatory Alcohol and Drug Safety Policy for Athletes and Students Who Participate in Competitive or non-competitive Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Activities, as well as those students that drive a motor vehicle on to campus governing the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs by student participants in the Grayson County School District.

The program consists of three components:

- I. Education and Prevention Plan
- II. Alcohol and Drug Safety Policy for Voluntary Participants, Athletes, and Students Who Participate in Competitive or non-competitive Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Activities at the middle and high school level, as well as students that hold a valid on-campus parking permit
- III. Evaluation of KIP Survey data.

### **EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PLAN**

A. Each semester experienced and professional substance abuse educators shall conduct at least one (1) educational seminar on alcohol and drug abuse. These seminars shall be accessible to all Grayson County students but shall be required of all athletic team and organizational members, as well as those students that hold a valid on-campus parking permit.

B. Grayson County Schools shall receive educational resources in alcohol and drug awareness from the local Regional Prevention Center and/or District resources such as Community Education, Family Resource and Youth Services Center, school nurse, etc. These resources will be available to all coaches, teachers, and staff. The educational resources will enable coaches, organization advisors, teachers, and staff to have a keen awareness of drug and alcohol abuse signs and symptoms.

- C. The Grayson County School District encourages the participation of Grayson County parents with the Grayson County Anti-Drug Coalition who addresses alcohol and other forms of drug abuse.<sup>1</sup>
- D. All student organizations shall be encouraged to foster a drug- and alcohol-free lifestyle. Voluntary random drug testing and educational seminars will be encouraged. Students who strive to be drug/alcohol-free will obtain many long-lasting benefits of choosing such a lifestyle. Any offense by a voluntary participant shall be reported to his/her parent with discipline administered based on the guidelines of policy.
- E. A teen leadership conference shall be encouraged annually for club sponsors, coaches, students, and athletes. The purpose of this conference is to train junior and senior leaders and their sponsors/coaches to become student mentors who maintain a drug/alcohol-free lifestyle.

### **ALCOHOL AND DRUG SAFETY POLICY FOR VOLUNTARY PARTICIPANTS AND ATHLETES**

ALL STUDENT ATHLETES, TEAM & ORGANIZATION MEMBERS, STUDENTS THAT HOLD AN ON-CAMPUS PARKING PERMIT, VOLUNTARY PARTICIPANTS, AND THEIR PARENTS OR LEGAL GUARDIANS MUST READ THE FOLLOWING POLICY AND MUST ACKNOWLEDGE, IN WRITING, THAT THEY HAVE READ THE POLICY, UNDERSTAND THE POLICY, AND AGREE TO BE BOUND BY THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS CONTAINED IN THE POLICY.

#### Statement of Purpose

This policy is intended to support the comprehensive educational policies and programs of Grayson County School District in educating students and their parents or legal guardians about the dangers inherent in the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs. The policy is further intended to provide incentives to Grayson County students who voluntarily choose to participate in the Grayson County School Athletic and Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Teams and Organizations, and students that drive to school to avoid such use and to strive for effective rehabilitation when such use has occurred. This policy is not designed to be used, nor shall it voluntarily be used in any manner, to provide a source of information for law-enforcement agencies or for the prosecution of the student or to limit the student's participation in the school's activities, other than the limitations imposed by this policy. Without a specific written authorization from the tested student or parent, if the student is under eighteen (18) years of age, no test results of any student shall be released to any person other than is required by law or lawfully issued subpoena or court order.

In order to accomplish its purposes, this policy establishes a program of education and counseling to deter the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs and provides for suspension and termination of participation in the Grayson County School Athletic or Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Team or Organization, or revoking of the student's on-campus parking permit when deterrence is unsuccessful. To determine compliance with the policy, it provides a testing program to identify student participants who are unlawfully using alcohol and other drugs. For these students, the policy provides incentives for rehabilitation through possible reinstatement to the specific athletic team or organization involved, or re-issue of the student's parking permit.

<sup>1</sup> The Coalition is established in conjunction with the regional Prevention Center. This partnership is instrumental in helping to effectively reduce substance and alcohol abuse among our students. The central purpose of the Coalition is to provide parents with necessary information regarding alcohol and drug abuse. Through the Coalition many parents and community members are trained to become future presenters of these efforts for new Grayson County parents as this program is renewed each fall.

Consistent with these purposes, the policy also seeks to achieve the following objectives:

- 1) To protect Grayson County students who participate in athletic or extra curricular/co-curricular teams or organizations and students that drive on-campus from impairing their health, safety, education, and future success through the unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs;
- 2) To protect Grayson County students who participate in athletic or extra curricular/co-curricular teams or organizations and others against whom they compete from potential injury during athletic competition or while driving a motor vehicle, which might result from the unlawful use of drugs;
- 3) To protect Grayson County students who participate in athletic or competitive extra curricular/co-curricular teams or organizations, or students that drive a motor vehicle on to campus from the potential stigma of unsubstantiated allegations of unlawful use of alcohol and other drugs; and
- 4) To assure students, parents, guardians, teachers, and the community that the health, safety, education, and future success of the student participants are the primary concerns of the Grayson County School District and its teams and organizations, and student drivers.

#### **B. Implementation, Review, and Evaluation**

All student participants and their parents or legal guardians must attend one of the scheduled mandatory informational forums at which the students and their parents or legal guardians must sign the "Student and Parent/Guardian Consent to Perform the Urinalysis for Drug Testing" form and be advised of the voluntary surveys for program evaluation before the student shall be permitted to try out for any team or organization, or be permitted to drive a motor vehicle on to campus at Grayson County High School.<sup>2</sup> A Substance Abuse Prevention Committee shall be created by the Board with the approval of this policy. The Committee shall consist of: (1) the Grayson County High School Principal; (2) the Grayson County Middle School Principal; (3) the Athletic Director (AD); one non-coaching teacher representative appointed by the two Principals; (4) Director of Community Education; (5) a school nurse. Appointed members' terms shall be for one (1) school year, and members may be re-appointed.

The Committee shall establish procedures as needed to implement the policy fairly and efficiently. In addition, the Committee shall review and evaluate the effectiveness of the Alcohol and Drug Safety Policy on an annual basis. The evaluation shall include, but shall not be limited to, the effectiveness of the comprehensive educational and counseling program, procedural safeguards, and the list of drug substances tested. The Committee shall not have access to any of the test results. Their purpose is limited to procedures and evaluation of the policy.

<sup>2</sup> The Principal shall have the authority to excuse the parent or legal guardian from attendance upon good cause shown.

## Applicability

This policy applies to all students who choose to participate in Grayson County School District Athletic Teams and Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Teams and Organizations, or drive a motor vehicle on to campus, which are voluntary extracurricular activities at the middle and high school level.

## Testing Program

In order to accomplish the purpose of this policy, each student participant on each Grayson County School Athletic and Extra Curricular/Co-Curricular Team and Organization, and those students that wish to drive a motor vehicle on to campus shall be required to participate in a program of substance abuse testing. Testing shall be accomplished by the analysis of urine specimens obtained from the student participants. Collection and testing procedures shall be established, maintained, and administered to ensure (a) randomness of selection procedures, (b) proper student identification, (c) that each specimen is identified with the appropriate student participant, (d) maintenance of the unadulterated integrity of the specimen, and (e) the integrity of the collection and test process, as well as the confidentiality of test results. Specific testing procedures are located in the Appendix.

## **Substances Screened/tested**

Student participants' urine specimens will be tested for the following:

Any other abused, illegal, or banned substances as shall be banned by the Board

Positive test shall result in the following sanctions:

### **Sanctions**

First violation:

a)The student participant may choose to be suspended for 20% of the remaining consecutive interscholastic and/or extra/co-curricular events. <sup>3</sup> If necessary, the suspension shall carry over to the student's subsequent participation on another team and/or organization to the following season. If this student holds a GCHS parking permit, driving privileges will be suspended for 1 month. (see 1a.) OR The student may elect to participate in a substance abuse early intervention program. Such program must be chosen by the Grayson County School Board or an equivalent program approved by the Grayson County School Board. If the student chooses an Early Intervention Program other than the one chosen by the School Board it will be at the student's expense (see 1b.)

<sup>3</sup> Events include games, public performances, scheduled competitions, meetings. Any questions as to whether or not the activity is an "event" shall be decided by the school principal.

(1a.) Participation consists of practicing, dressing-out, traveling with, or receiving recognition with or for the activity(s) in which the student is involved before reinstatement to the team or organization, or re-issue of the parking permit after a first violation, the student participant must receive an assessment or evaluation for chemical dependency and provide verification of an assessment by a qualified mental health professional. The evaluation provider will be selected by the district. When available, the district shall utilize in-district, trained and/or certified specialist or a provider from the list of approved evaluation providers recommended by the Regional Prevention Center. Prior to readmission to the team or organization or re-issue of the parking permit, the student must submit to a new drug test at the student's expense, administered in accordance with the same procedures utilized for random drug testing. The testing professionals currently under contract must conduct all subsequent drug tests. A positive result shall be treated as a second violation.

(1b.) If the student chooses to participate in an Early Intervention Program, upon completion of this program the student must submit to a new drug test at the student's expense, administered in accordance with the same procedures utilized for random drug testing. A positive result shall be treated as a second violation.

If a student who has chosen to be suspended is reinstated to the team or organization, or re-issued a parking permit following a first violation, the student's participation in another team or organization shall not be restricted solely because of the existence of the first violation, as long as the student has completed the period of suspension and was appropriately reinstated to the prior team or organization, or re-issued a parking permit. If the student elects not to seek reinstatement to a team or organization, or re-issue of the parking permit after the first violation (either because of the student's own election or the season concluded prior to the expiration of the student's own suspension), the student is still required to serve the unexpired portion of the suspension before the student can be eligible for any other activity. A student serving a suspension for one activity may try out for a second activity if the student provides a negative drug test result from the testing professionals currently under contract at the student's expense. If the student successfully makes the team/organization, prior to participation, the student must serve the unexpired portion of the previous suspension. The student must complete all forms required for participation on another team/organization, and the student must submit to a new drug test administered in accordance with the same procedures utilized for random drug testing. A positive result shall be treated as a second violation.

It will be the responsibility of the parent/guardian to fully cooperate with the district appointed testing professionals to provide legal medication verification in the event a student tests positive for prescription or prescription-type medication(s). The parent/guardian must provide proof of a previously authorized prescription in the name of the tested student. Refusal to provide medication verification within 24 hours will result in a positive drug test action.

#### Second violation:

- a) The student participant shall be suspended for the 40% *of the remaining* consecutive interscholastic and/or extra/co-curricular events. If this student holds a GCHS parking permit, driving privileges will be suspended for a period of 1 semester. If necessary, the suspension shall carry over to the student's subsequent participation on another team or organization, or the issuing of a parking permit and/or to the following season. Before reinstatement to the team/organization after a second violation, the student participant must successfully complete recommendations that resulted from the chemical dependency assessment as evidenced by a written statement to that effect issued by a qualified chemical dependency professional. Prior to readmission to the team or organization, the student must submit to a new drug test at the student's expense, administered in accordance with the same procedure utilized for random drug testing. A positive result shall be treated as a third violation.
- b) If a student is reinstated to the team or organization, or re-issued a parking permit following a second violation, the student's participation in another team/organization shall not be restricted solely because of the existence of the second violation, as long as the student has completed the period of suspension and the required chemical dependency program and was appropriately reinstated to the prior team or organization, or re-issued a parking permit. If the student elects

not to seek reinstatement to a team or organization, or the re-issue of the parking permit after the second violation (either because of the student's own election or because the season concluded prior to the expiration of the student's period of suspension), the student is still required to serve the unexpired portion of the suspension before the student can be eligible for any other activity. A student serving a suspension for one team or organization or with a revoked parking permit may try out for a second activity if the student provides a negative drug test result from the testing professionals currently under contract at the student's expense. If the student makes the team, prior to participation, the student must serve the unexpired portion of the previous suspension. The student must complete all forms required for participation on another team or organization, or those required for a parking permit if seeking on-campus driving privileges, and the student must submit to a new drug test administered in accordance with the same procedures utilized for random drug testing. A positive result shall be treated as a third violation.

#### Third and additional violations:

The student participant shall be suspended for a period of one (1) calendar year from the date of the most recent test that yielded positive results. If this student holds a GCHS parking permit, driving privileges will be suspended for a period of 1 year. The student participant must successfully complete recommendations that resulted from the chemical dependency assessment as evidenced by a written statement to that effect issued by a qualified chemical dependency professional. After completing the one (1) calendar year period of suspension, students will be retested before beginning the next season for which s/he is eligible.

- 3) Any offense by a voluntary participant shall be reported to his/her parent, with discipline administered based on the guidelines set forth by this policy.

#### **Notice to Participants**

Prior to participation for any team or organization, or the issue of a student parking permit each year, the Grayson County School District shall provide all students choosing to participate with teams or with student organizations, and student drivers and their parent or legal guardian with a written copy of this policy at one of the mandatory informational forums. Each student that chooses to participate with teams or with student organizations, or drive a motor vehicle on to campus, and a parent or legal guardian of that student shall be required to sign a statement indicating that the student and the student's parent or legal guardian have read this policy and acknowledge that the student and the parent or guardian have read this policy, understand the policy, and agree to be bound by the terms and conditions contained in this policy.

All student participants and at least one (1) parent or legal guardian are to sign the following "Student/Guardian Consent to Perform Urinalysis for Drug Testing."

### Student/ Guardian Consent to Perform Urinalysis for Drug Testing

THE UNDERSIGNED STUDENT AND THE STUDENT'S PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGES THAT THEY HAVE READ AND UNDERSTAND THE FOREGOING POLICY AND AGREE TO AND ARE BOUND BY THE TERMS & CONDITIONS CONTAINED IN THE POLICY.

THE UNDERSIGNED UNDERSTAND THAT THIS CONSENT IS EFFECTIVE FOR ALL TEAMS/SPORTS/ORGANIZATIONS/ON-CAMPUS DRIVERS/IN WHICH THE STUDENT MAY PARTICIPATE FOR THE ENTIRITY OF THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR. THE UNDERSIGNED UNDERSTAND THAT ONCE ENROLLED IN THE TESTING POOL THE STUDENT AGREES TO REMAIN IN THE TESTING POOL FOR THE ENTIRE SCHOOL YEAR.

THE UNDERSIGNED HEREBY PERMIT THE LAB SELECTED BY THE GRAYSON COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT TO PERFORM DRUG TESTING OF THE STUDENT'S URINE AND RELEASE THE RESULTS TO THE *PRINCIPAL OF THE SCHOOL*

*THE UNDERSIGNED AGREES TO COOPERATE WITH THE SCHOOL APPOINTED HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS IN THE EVENT A PRESCRIPTION MEDICATION IS IDENTIFIED THROUGH THE DRUG TESTING PROCESS BY PROVIDING PROPER MEDICATION VERIFICATION* (Valid prescription in the student's name)

ANY REFUSAL BY A STUDENT PARTICIPANT TO BE TESTED SHALL BE TREATED AS A VIOLATION, AND THE APPROPRIATE SANCTIONS WILL BE ASSESSED. (See Sanctions)

### **APPENDIX**

The testing program shall be conducted as follows:

- 1) Prior to participation with a team or organization, the student participant and a parent or legal guardian of the student participant must read this policy and must **ACKNOWLEDGE, IN WRITING, THAT THEY HAVE READ THE POLICY AND PROCEDURES, UNDERSTAND THE POLICY AND PROCEDURES, AND AGREE TO BE BOUND BY THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS CONTAINED IN THE POLICY AND PROCEDURES.** The student participant and a parent or legal guardian of the student participant must also sign the "Student/Guardian Consent to Perform Urinalysis for Drug Testing" form and be advised of the evaluation process through participation in voluntary surveys before the student will be permitted to enroll for participation with any team or organization or apply for a student on-campus parking permit.
- 2) Immediately prior to giving a urine specimen, each student participant shall complete both a "Medical History Form" (which shall include disclosure of all prescription drugs currently taken) and a "Consent to Test and Chain of Custody" form. The forms shall identify the student participant only by a confidential number and shall be placed in a sealed package, which shall be forwarded to the testing laboratory along with the urine specimen. .
- 3) The testing professionals approved by the Board shall determine which student participants are to be tested by computerized random drawing of names from among all student participants during the entire school year.
- 4) The collection of urine specimens and the scientific analysis of the collected specimens shall be conducted by trained professionals selected by the School Board. The School Board may seek the advice of the Regional Community Prevention Center to assist in the selection process.
- 5) Collection procedures for urine specimens shall be developed, maintained, and administered by the testing Professionals in an effort to minimize any intrusion or embarrassment for each student, ensure the proper identification of students' specimens, minimize the likelihood of the adulteration of a urine specimen, and maintain confidentiality of test results. To that end, the procedures must require:
- 6) The collection of urine specimens for the initial test and the random testing shall be conducted on Grayson County School premises. If a test result is found to have been adulterated, the student may be required to be retested.

7) Collection procedures for urine specimens shall be developed, maintained, and administered by the testing Professionals in an effort to minimize any intrusion or embarrassment for each student, ensure the proper identification of students' specimens, minimize the likelihood of the adulteration of a urine specimen, and maintain confidentiality of test results. To that end, the procedures must require:

The collection of urine specimens for the initial test and the random testing shall be conducted on Grayson County School premises. If a test result is found to have been adulterated, the student may be required to be retested.

8) All scientific analyses of the collected specimens shall be conducted by the testing professionals. Each specimen shall initially be tested by the testing professionals using a highly accurate immunoassay technique ("EMIT"). Initial positive results must be confirmed by gas chromatography/mass spectrometry ("GC/MS"). If the initial presumptive positive result is not confirmed by the GC/MS technique, the test shall be deemed to be negative. Only after the GC/MS confirmation shall a test result be reported as positive.

9) A portion of each urine specimen given by each student participant shall be preserved by the testing laboratory for a minimum of six (6) months.

12) Written confirmation of all positive test results shall be forwarded by the laboratory to the testing professional(s). The designated testing professional will contact the Principal, who shall notify the appropriate persons including the student, and the parent(s) or legal guardian(s) of the student participants tested. The testing professionals or laboratory shall not provide test results verbally. All tests are confidential and shall be maintained by the testing Professionals under the strictest security.

13) The test results forwarded to the Principal shall indicate that the results were confirmed by the GC/MS and shall indicate the name of the individual for whom the test results are being reported; the type of test indicated on the custody and control form; the date and location of the test collection; the identity of the persons or entities performing the collection and analysis of the specimens and reporting test results; the verified results of the controlled substances test; and, if positive, the identity of the controlled substance(s) for which the text verified positive. Test results shall be forwarded to the Principal in a manner to ensure that the Principal cannot determine that any test was a presumptive, positive test unable to be confirmed by GC/MS.

14) In the event that a student participant's urine specimen produces a positive result (after the GC/MS confirmation), the Principal shall meet with the student participant and the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) to disclose and discuss the test results. At this meeting, the Principal shall advise the student participant and the student's parent(s) or legal guardian(s) of further procedural rights under this policy.

15) Any student participant who has tested positive, or the student's parents or legal guardians, may contest the test result by informing the Principal within seventy-two (72) hours of receipt of notice of the positive test result. The student and parent shall be entitled to present any evidence they desire to defend the charge of violation on this policy prior to implementation of sanctions. The Principal may require written documentation (such as a doctor's statement) of any evidence the student may wish to present that the student feels may have affected the test results. Failure to present written documentation to support the student's defense of the case shall result in the student being subject to the sanctions provided in this policy for a positive test result. Further laboratory analysis shall be conducted with the student participant's remaining urine specimen preserved by the testing laboratory and shall be conducted at the student participant's expense.

The final determination of the student participant's eligibility shall be made at the school level by the Principal.

- 16) Any refusal by a student participant to be tested shall be treated as a violation, and the appropriate sanctions will be assessed. The student's parents or legal guardians shall be notified by the Principal of the refusal and sanction. Violations shall be deemed to accumulate throughout the student participant's involvement in all teams and/or organizations.
- 17) Surveys conducted for the evaluation of the program are voluntary. A Student cannot be penalized for not participating in the surveys.
- 18) If a student is eighteen (18) years of age or will turn eighteen (18) years of age during the school year, the student must agree to release all test results to the student's parents or legal guardians.
- 19) One (1) year after the student turns eighteen (18) years old or one (1) year after the student's graduation, whichever is later, all records in regard to this policy concerning each student participant shall be destroyed, and at no time shall these results or records be placed in the student participant's academic file or be voluntarily turned over to any law-enforcement agency, or used for any purpose other than those stated herein. For students who transfer into the GRAYSON COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT or otherwise do not fulfill the requirements for graduation, the records of that student shall be destroyed one (1) year after the student turns eighteen (18) years old.  
All voluntary student participants and at least one (1) parent or legal guardian-if the student is under the age of eighteen (18)--are to sign the "Voluntary Participant Consent to Perform Urinalysis for Drug Testing" form.

### **VOLUNTARY PARTICIPANT CONSENT TO PERFORM URINALYSIS FOR DRUG TESTING**
