From The Superintendent's Desk...

Just as our 2018 - 2019 school was wrapping the Iowa Department of Education unveiled a new tool that helps communicate how well our school is performing as compared to other schools in the state of Iowa. It should come as no surprise that we are accomplishing great things at The Andrew School. We are excited to introduce you to what the state is calling, "The Iowa School Performance Profile."

The Iowa School Performance Profile is a tool that depicts how public schools are performing across the state. The web-based tool was developed to meet both federal and state requirements for publishing online school report cards. Most importantly, it serves as a great data piece that schools and families can use to drive school improvement efforts. The website includes:

- Scores on standardized assessments
- Designations based on school performance
- Tools to compare schools to one another
- A wealth of academic and school culture data

One way that the tool helps stakeholders know how well a school is performing is by giving each school a designation of "Exceptional, High-Performing, Commendable, Acceptable, Needs Improvement, or Priority." The designations are based on data such as proficiency rates, growth scores, climate and culture surveys and more.

In this most recent release Andrew Elementary was identified as Commendable, ranking it in the top half of school across the state. Andrew Middle School was designated as Acceptable, which places it on par as compared to all other middle schools in the state of Iowa. According to the data, one of our strongest areas in the elementary is our proficiency scores, which significantly exceed the state average. Our growth scores stand out the most in our middle school data.

Of course, this report does not tell the entire story of what makes any school a great place for kids, but it does help us sift through the wealth of data that is available to us. At The Andrew School, we aspire to be one of the highest performing schools in the state. We are eager to use this report to set goals, focus in on specific areas we can improve in, and continue to learn and grow every day. Changes for the 2019-2020 School Year

As the end of the school year wraps up and we look forward to the new school year ahead, we have quite a few staff changes to share with everyone. Although it is sad to see people we have made personal connections with leave, it also brings excitement to see new faces on board for next year. We look forward to these new employees adding positive energy and fresh ideas to help make our school the best it can be.

To start off with, all three specials teachers (Physical Education (PE), Music, and Art) will be new next year. Angie Read is moving from her 4th grade position to teach PE and work with at-risk students. Angie is really excited for her new position and is thinking of specific ways to increase physical activity in the classrooms, not just in PE. We hired Nick Riedesel to teach Middle School Math and to provide TAG services to students. Nick is a recent St. Ambrose graduate and has a math background from working at Mathnasium. 

A Visit To Lakehurst Dam In Maquoketa, Iowa

The middle school students had the opportunity to visit the Lakehurst Dam in Maquoketa this May! While at the dam, students learned about the historic floods that took over Maquoketa and much of Eastern Iowa. The employees showed our students how the dam operates through a look at the powerhouse and lifted one of the gates for students to see just how powerful rushing water can be! They even provided a lunch of hot dogs, chips, juice and cookies for all of our students and teachers!

With the help of the Hurstville Interpretive Center, students identified microorganisms living in the Maquoketa River to test the quality of the water based on what different creatures were living in the river. Students also tested the water chemically through a series of tests and determined that the water here in Jackson County from the river is pretty good with just the right amount of nutrients needed!

After we finished testing the water, students and teachers got to spend the rest of the time canoeing on the river. We had an amazing time and are thankful for the partnership between the employees from the dam and the employees at the Hurstville Interpretive Center. Thank you!

Have you ever experienced a leadership day at Andrew Community School District? If you came to Andrew on Friday, May 10, you would have participated in a fun-filled afternoon. Our theme for this day was “We Are Growing Leaders at Andrew”.


