The Utah State Board of Education provides three main ways to identify bullying: if it is causing distress or harm, if it is an unfair imbalance of strength, and whether or not it is repeated over time. All of this is included in everyday bullying, though most bullies won't be going over this in their heads, making it seem simpler and less harmful. It turns out that these empty thoughts are more dangerous. How would you compete with such mindless actions?

Bullying is a widespread problem, mostly in schools or other public areas occupied by teens or children. This is why Chris Hollyfield, a motivational speaker, actor, and business owner, came to Helper Middle School. Chris gave an inspirational speech, stating, "Be yourself," and, "Follow your dreams," as well as some pointers on how to handle bullying. He was able to delight the students effectively. Although, most of this was forgotten after *Foreign Figures* arrived!



When first arriving at Helper Middle as sixth graders, students are taught

awareness of bullying by the school's counselor, Mrs. Vasquez. This is somewhat a hard topic to understand and explain. Bullying is mostly confused with teasing or joking. The difference isn't all that easy to spot. Sometimes, even when it's right in front of you, you still can't identify it. Or rather, they are so small that nobody notices the action. Little things, such as ignoring others, not involving others, simple gestures, or spreading rumors. Some people don't understand that doing nothing is also a sign of bullying. And bullying can be found in the greatest of friendships. If a group of people always signals out one person to do something such as fetch the ball or being "it" in a game of tag, it can be categorized as bullying. Even if the bullies themselves don't realize it. As long as it is repeated, it can be seen as an offense.

The following may help us identify bullying. If you are feeling emotional unrest, it might be bullying.



If you feel threatened physically or emotionally, it might be bullying. If the teasing is becoming a constant, it might be bullying. You need to be aware of your feelings, be able to identify your feelings, empathize with the feelings of others, speak up if you are feeling vulnerable or if you see that someone else is feeling vulnerable. It is always okay to seek help from an adult. It may be embarrassing to ask for help, but no matter who you are or where you come from, there are always people willing to help.
