I wanted to reach out and make you all aware that we are having our Flu Shot Clinic here at school on Oct 18, 2022. Permission forms have already been sent home and needed to be returned to the school by Sep 23, 2022. If you have not received this form and would like your child to participate, please reach out to Kerry or Deb in the main office.

We are working on having a COVID-19 vaccination clinic here at school as well, but the details are in the early stages right now; I hope to have more information to share in the near future.

I would like to thank all of you who have supplied the school with the needed medical paperwork allowing the nurse to care for your child. If you have not yet turned in your child's paperwork, please do so as soon as possible. This information includes the Annual Health History & Update; prescribed medications including the doctor's orders; the Parental Permission to Treat form allowing administration of the medication; and any needed shot records for your student.

Dear Families,

October is bullying prevention awareness month at MBES. One learning objective for this month is for students to learn the importance of unity and coming together as a class (or group), a school, and a community to prevent bullying.

What is bullying? According to the American Psychological Association, "Bullying is a form of aggressive behavior in which someone intentionally and repeatedly causes another person injury or discomfort." In order to be classified as bullying, the 3 P's must be present - Purpose (intentional), Pattern (repeated), and Power (imbalance).

In addition to classroom and guidance lessons, everyone is encouraged to wear orange on Unity Day, Wednesday, October 19th, 2022 to visibly show your support for kindness,

acceptance, and the inclusion of others, and convey the message that no child should ever experience bullying.

Teaching and Learning in the Spotlight



What is Title I? Title I was first enacted as part of the 1965 federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act that sought "to provide all children significant opportunity to receive a fair, equitable, and high-quality education, and to close educational achievement gaps."

(Maine Department of Education)

A majority of students do well with general classroom curriculum and instruction, but regular instruction does not always meet the needs of all students, especially our students who experience socio-economic disadvantage. Title I funding helps us meet the needs of all students' at the individual and schoolwide level.

- Individual Learning Support: Each day at Marcia Buker School, students who are struggling in reading and math get focused, individualized instruction from our talented Title I Intervention Team—Rebecca Cassidy, Deb Burke, and Tina Wood. Classroom teachers, Title 1 educators, and the Multi-tiered System of Supports (MTSS) Team work together, using multiple data points, to identify students who can benefit from Title 1 intervention. Students receiving Title I services are monitored closely to ensure that they are making progress. The gains students make with Title I instruction are often profound.
- Schoolwide Learning Support: Title I funds are used to supplement the regular program with
 instructional materials and professional development that the local budget does not provide; to
 engage families in their children's education; and to support extended learning activities, such
 as Family Night and summer reading programs.

How is the Title I program funded? The federal government funds Title I programs in schools where the overall family poverty level meets certain percentage criteria. In Maine, a school community's poverty level is determined partly by the percentage of students who qualify for free or reduced price

meals on the Household Application for Free and Reduced Meals that is sent home at the beginning of the year.

If school meals are free now, why is the state still using the F&R Meal Application?

The State of Maine has made regular school breakfast and lunch free to all students, but this is only true for a few states so the F&R application is still in use. The federal government does allow other ways to determine income levels, but the Free and Reduced Meals application remains a good way to obtain the needed information, especially for households that do not already receive other state or federal assistance. This is why we repeatedly ask families to complete that application! We have had a great return on the forms this year! On behalf of our students, thank you!



World Languages

Dear RSU 2 Families,

Hola, Konnichiwa, Bonjour!

We are Sachiko Clough and Chris Milliken, your World Languages teachers at the elementary school level. We would like to take a moment of your busy day to introduce ourselves. We look forward to the 2022-2023 school year with your students, and we hope that World Languages find their way back to your homes in some small way.

Every child in grades kindergarten through 5 receives World Language education once a week for 30 to 50 minutes, depending on grade level. Our program is designed to expose elementary students to the sounds of French, Japanese and Spanish at an early age. Research supports this exposure because at a young age the brain is most receptive to learning new sounds. To that end, our program includes play, games, skits, and songs that allow our students to try on a different language. This is not about mastery but rather exposure to other languages and cultures. World language mastery begins in middle school.

The benefits to your child of our program include:

- 1. Developing a better understanding of self through the understanding of other cultures and customs
- 2. Familiarity with the sounds and patterns of world languages
- 3. Learning the basics of global geography
- 4. Enhanced awareness of English through the comparison with other languages
- 5. The reinforcement of general literacy skills through French, Japanese, and Spanish

We look forward to an exciting year with the students of Marcia Buker School, and we always welcome feedback and communication with parents and guardians!






