# **AHS Introduces New Phone Policy**

As with all new technology, electronic devices (cell phones, laptops, tablets, etc.) have proven to be beneficial while in the appropriate setting, but school is often not the appropriate time to use these devices. The administration at Alliance High School sent out a series of surveys for the staff to gather information on the benefits and downfalls of allowing electronic devices in the school setting.

The new policy for the 2019-2020 school year is as detailed below:

Electronic devices are not permitted for use during the school day, which includes study halls, in the hallway and in restrooms. The only time devices are allowed is at the students' assigned lunch time and in the main lobby or study commons during their study hall time. Prior to leaving the study hall, all devices must be turned off and out of sight.

If a student is caught with an electronic device, they will be asked to give it to the faculty member. There are two tracks for disciplinary actions:

#### Track 1 - The student gives the device to the faculty member when asked.

- 1st: Verbal warning and phone returned by administration at end of day
- 2nd: Twilight School and phone returned by administration at end of day

- 3rd: Twilight School and administration holds phone until parent picks it up
- 4th: Two days of SIL and administration holds phone until parent picks it up
- 5th+: Principal's discretion

Track 2 - The student refuses to give the faculty member the device when asked

- 1st: Out of School Suspension (OSS) 1 day
- 2nd: OSS 3 days
- 3rd: OSS 5 days with principal hearing
- 4th+: OSS 10 days with expulsion hearing

At Alliance Middle School, students are not permitted to have their electronic devices. All devices should be silenced and placed in their lockers at all time.

The district wants to encourage the use of technology in an appropriate setting, but the classroom is not the time nor place for students to be distracted by the devices. The policies in place will allow the students to learn and grow using the approved technology without the added distractions of personal electronic devices.



# \$1.9 Million Awarded in Scholarships

Alliance High School hosted the annual Senior Scholarship Night on May 7 with 42 soon-to-be graduates receiving more than \$1.9 million in local scholarships.

The Alliance High School Foundation gave over \$105,000 to select students bringing their total number of scholarships to over \$1.4 million since its founding.

This year there were five new scholarships awarded: the AHS Foundation Coastal Pet/Stout Family Scholarships for Career Tech Students, the AHS Foundation Class of 1968 Scholarship, the Frank Mancini Scholarship, the AHS Foundation Reighart Scholarship and the Steve Lab Auto Tech Professionals Scholarship.

For many of the students, they received full tuition scholarships through two local programs. The Investment Alliance Scholarship was awarded to 13 seniors who have chosen to attend the University of Mount Union in the fall. The recipients are Seth Stevens, Adam Hale, Allison Waggoner, Brandon Mazzei, Jarek Leonard, Cameron Cox, Gabriel Baker, Gavin Geir, Madison Serrano, Leeah Dulaney, Jessica Pisoni, Anna Zumbar and Alexandra Cox. The AllianceWorks Scholarship provides graduating seniors who completed a career and tech program at AHS with a two-year, full-tuition scholarship to Stark State. This year, the recipients of the Alliance Works Scholarship are William Kinser, Dominic Bertolini, Siearra Nagle, Merisa Howell and Kylee King.

# Alumni Spotlight: Howard Frazier

A member of the class of 2018, Howard Frazier, has found success at John Carroll University during his first year of college.

"My first year was exciting and full of new experiences," Howard said. "I met a bunch of awesome people from all over the country."

College can often be a major adjustment period for students, but for Howard, it was an opportunity to learn independence and to take control.

"College definitely places a lot more of the impetus on the student because living away from home, you're sort of forced to be more independent," he said. "But I think the newfound independence is a good thing. It forces you to 'buckle-down' in a sense and take control of your time."

Howard is grateful for the experiences he had at Alliance High School that helped to prepare him for his transition to college. Being able to take AP and College Credit Plus courses allowed him to transfer in more credits than his classmates at JCU and skip many of his intro-level classes.

"I think that the teachers at AHS do a great job of introducing students to the increased rigor of the work at the college level," he explained. "There's always going to be an adjustment, but they helped to make that transition as smooth as possible."

One of the hardest obstacles Howard had to overcome in his first year was time management. The amount of free time in college can be a "double-edged sword," as he put it. He had to learn to map out his days to ensure he stayed on track and completed his work. He found it easier to stay on track during the football season when he had less free time. Becoming acquainted with Google Calendar also helped him to manage his time.

Howard offered a word of advice for the class of 2019: "Heading into their freshman year of college, I would tell students to not be overwhelmed by the academic side of the college experience. It's a chance to meet, and essentially live with, friends that you'll have for a lifetime. The diversity and



opportunity for broadening experiences you have are super exciting, as well."

### Len Dawson Field Receives Much Needed Updates

After much deliberation this year, Len Dawson Field is in the process of being updated to better meet the needs of the Alliance City Schools athletic teams.

The updates, which started on April 22, include a synthetic turf field, new track and four new LED light fixtures installed around the field. The new turf surface will provide the high school football team with a safe practice field and a great playing field for the JV football team that aligns with the fields other districts in the

EBC play on. The field will also be used as a secondary location for middle school football games and as an alternative site for the AHS soccer teams.

Along with being a viable playing and practice field, the new turf is safer and will decrease the number of sports-related injuries that occur when playing on a sod field, the type of field Len Dawson previously had.

The previous track was in desperate need of replacement. Al-

liance was unable to host meets this track season due to the poor condition of the track. The AMS and AHS athletes will now have a brand-new track to use that will allow them to host meets once again during the 2019-2020 academic year.

"So far, the project is going well and is on schedule," said Nick Cowles, director of operations.

This has been a big project and it is expected to be complete by August 1, well before the start of the next academic year.

"We appreciate the support that we've received for the project and we are very excited that we can give our students an athletic venue to be proud of and use for many years to come," Cowles said.

The Alliance City School District is proud to offer state of the art facilities for students, and updating Len Dawson is just one of the ways the district can provide the best opportunities for all.

# **Administration Changes for 2019-2020 School Year**

Alliance City Schools recently approved changes to the administrative positions at a number of buildings.

A new assistant principal position has been approved for Alliance High School. Tina Arbitter, former principal of Success Academy, will be taking on the newly created position at AHS.

Derrick Showell will be the new lead teacher at Success Academy upon the approval of the Board of Education at the June BOE meeting.

At Alliance Middle School, the dean of students position and the coordinating position for the International Baccalaureate program have evolved to become grade level principal positions. Andrew Toth, the current IB coordinator, will be taking over one of the grade level principal positions. The second grade level principal position will be filled by Matthew Bobola upon board approval at the June BOE meeting.

Gregory Gemberling, the long-time educator and dean of students at AMS, will be taking over the position as director of adult education at the Alliance Career Center following the retirement of Debra McKee.

The administrative structure of the elementary schools will be changing for the 2019-2020 academic year to ensure equal opportunity for all students in the district. Michelle Balderson will step into the newly created position of primary elementary principal. She will oversee both Rockhill and Parkway. Current principal, Cory Muller, will remain as the building principal at Parkway.

"With this move, we hope to ensure equal programming and opportunities for all students in first through third grade while providing additional support for teachers, support staff, students and parents," said Superintendent Jeffery Talbert.

Wendy Hubbard will be the building principal at

Rockhill upon board approval at the June BOE meeting.

"While all the discussed positions are new, they do not add to the overall staffing number," Talbert said. "We have repurposed the positions to add support in the necessary areas." The goal of the Alliance City School District is to prepare the students for life, college and careers and the addition of these positions will allow the teachers and the administrators to prepare the students to the best of their abilities at each of the school buildings.


