Amber Cundiff is the daughter of Don and Judy Cundiff. She is active in Science Club, National Honor Society, and FCCLA.


These students are selected by the teaching staff for their outstanding work and attitude during school.

National Honor Society

Every spring the best of Commerce students become eligible for induction in the National Honor Society. Students must have at least a 3.0 GPA in order to apply. Students must also fill out a packet containing information such as clubs and organization, leadership roles, citizenship activities and information to help a committee of teachers select students who should be allowed to join this group. Students may not apply until the spring of their Sophomore year. Students may also apply during their Junior year if they were not selected the first time.

Students must work during the time they are a member gathering service points in order to stay in this elite group. Students may get these points by doing community service projects such as working with Head Start or school service projects such as helping a teacher with a bulletin board or reading to elementary students.
