


SENIOR SENIOR, we're on the bus! This was the opinion of the senior class as they drove their school open at the Homecoming pep rally.

The WHS Lady Panthers basketball team at the Mississippi Cross Country meet had their picture taken for a plaque.










ticipate again next year, maybe with a few more guys.










Cheerleading










