

# Bomber Track





## "Inclusion at Wakefield is Working"

Think of the challenges that students face everyday — then multiply those challenges many times. This is the situation that Kenny Bratcher and Casey Cooper face everyday. Kenny and Casey are a special part of the Wakefield student body. These students, who are mentally and physically handicapped, are part of the process called inclusion. Inclusion is when special students are included in the regular classrooms as much as possible. At Wakefield, this process is made possible by: Jill Newmeyer and Linda Pearson, paraprofessionals and Mary Tate, I.M.D.

One of the goals of the inclusion program is to bring Kenny and Casey out of isolation and into the world of the public school room. Kenny and Casey's social skills have improved since they entered the program due to increased interaction. On the other side of the coin, this program also provides an opportunity for students to become comfortable and sociable with handicapped people. Wakefield stu-

dents have come to respect Kenny and Casey and will do anything to help them, and as a result they have learned more about physically challenged people.

As part of the inclusion program Kenny and Casey are involved in doing some important jobs around the school. Kenny vacuums the wood shop everyday and cleans windows. Casey cleans the erasers and stocks the workroom refrigerator with pop. Both of the students cut out newspaper for the Community Club, clean desk tops and chalk trays, pick out letters for the announcement board in front of the school, and pick up trash after home football games.

Every Thursday Kenny and Casey leave school after lunch to have some fun and practice their social skills. With the assistance of Jill, Linda, and Emily (student volunteers) the boys load the Suburban and travel to Clay Center to join other students in a game of bowling. This activity helps to improve the students' physical strength

and provides practice for their league bowling game.

Both students have interests that make them unique. Kenny enjoys all types of music and participates in the Wakefield school band by playing percussion instruments. He knows sign language and enjoys wood working activities. Kenny's love of sports shows through his participation in Special Olympics where he received a silver medal in the 30 meter walk and a ribbon in the softball throw. Casey loves country music and Harley Davidson motorcycles. His interest in track and field is shown through his participation at the Special Olympics where he received a gold medal in the 10 meter assisted walk (this is where Casey uses his crutches to complete the race) and a ribbon in the softball throw.

Yes, the inclusion program at the Wakefield school is working for the benefit of Kenny, Casey and the entire school.
