Assistant Superintendent retires

On June 30, 1987, Dean Oberhelman retired from his job as assistant superintendent for USD 379. He has been with the district for 21 years.

Before coming to Clay Center, Oberhelman taught and coached at White City and Chapman. He served as high school counselor at Salina and was director of secondary curriculum for the Salina schools.

Since 1966, Oberhelman has worked in curriculum development and personnel selection for the Clay Center schools.

"Dean Oberhelman, working with building administrators, has set up a strong teacher selection program for the district. He has recruited, interviewed and recommended for employment an outstanding teaching staff for Clay County," Superintendent Charles Stuart said. "His work with personnel and curriculum provided a very solid base upon which the school district has been built."

Oberhelman has been very active in the field of education as well as in the community. He has been the president of the Kansas Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development and the Kansas Educators Club. He has also been on the State Advisory Committee for Vocational Education. In Clay Center he has been president of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club.







ferently.



Coach Wiemers went on to say he was pleased with the teams practice sessions this year.


They had a willingness to learn and to take direction. Their characters will help them down the road in a career," Wiemers said.





Pam Ficke was the only player who participated at the state level this year.


"She played probably her best tennis of the year. She played some long matches and the mental and physical stress of a day's competition is really draining," Smith said.



"This year we ran at the bottom half of the NCKL. Next year we'll have to expect we'll move up and compete in the upper half."








"This was a beautiful bunch of girls to work with and I'm glad they worked together sharing their experience with each other," Smith said.













"This has been a very good track season. The squad has worked hard and competed well," he said.


The coaching staff divided responsibilities so that members of the team got quite a bit of individual attention.

There were many positive events that occurred during the season. The girls track team placed in the top three at all of their meets. Also, the girls freshman team won the NCKL meet for the second year in a row.





"My personal highlight was to award every member of our varsity team a medal at our own Invitational," he said.






















