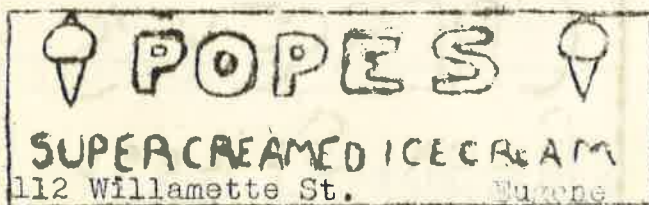
WEDDING BELLS
