The number of faculty has struck a new high. This year we have four to get under foot in


stead of the usual three.


Girls Sports

The girls are looking forward to a very happy beneficial year.








Boy's Competitive Sports




SOPHOMORE CLASS MEETING


The first metting as held for election of officers, and to make plans for Freshman initiation.
