Recently State Report Cards were released and Allendale County Schools unquestionably has reason to celebrate.

Allendale-Fairfax Middle School and Allendale Elementary School met the requirement to exit State Priority Schools List as of January 31, 2019. A Priority School is defined as any school, differentiated by school type (elementary, middle or high), with a weighted point index at or below the 10th percentile.

Currently, Allendale-Fairfax High still falls in the category, District officials and school administrators are working diligently to ensure the high school has better results next year.

A Track for Champions

"Happy" doesn't begin to describe the emotion that the long time State-rank Allendale-Fairfax High School Track & Field team feels after finally getting their own track in the District. This \$1.2 million dollar investment from the state as well as grants has been several years in the making.

The groundbreaking for the event took place in December of 2017 and the project was completed in December 2018. The track and field was not only an investment for the school District, but members of the community are invited to use the facility as well.

"Our students have worked hard over the years and I'm glad they finally have their own track now," said Athletic Director, Coby Brandyburg.













Allendale Students Win First Place in Regional Science Fair

Two students from Allendale County Schools participated in the annual Savannah River Regional Science and Engineering Fair held at the University of South Carolina Aiken (USCA) and won first place in their individual categories.

Sixth grader at Allendale-Fairfax Middle School, Arianna Priester, won first place in the health science category with One hundred ninety-three projects from 52 schools and a project using eggshells to explore which beverages are most likely stain human tooth enamel. Priester was also nominated to compete in the 2019 Broadcom MASTERS. This nomination designates Priester's project among the top 10% of middle school science fair projects in the United States.

Kiarah McKnight won first place in the physical science category. McKnight's project, "Going Green as You Clean," challenged the claim that conventional detergents are more toxic than environmentally friendly detergents. The tenth grader from Allendale-Fairfax High also won second place prize overall for all high school projects.

7 counties in the Central Savannah River Area (CSRA) were judged in the Savannah River Regional Science and Engineering Fair. Savannah River Nuclear Solutions, LLC, partnered with the University of South Carolina Aiken and the Ruth Patrick Science Education Center to sponsor the event.

Partnership for Financial Literacy

The Allendale County School District has worked diligently to create partnerships with businesses, industries and churches as a goal of the District's 3 Year Strategic Plan; SRP Federal Credit Union has a similar goal.

As part of the partnership, SRP will provide a \$50 gift card each month to Allendale County Schools' District Teacher of the Month and has also partnered with the district to offer an Affinity Debit Card Program. The card has a custom design with the school district's logo and will be available to order soon. The school district receives a donation for each eligible transaction made with the card. All SRP members are eligible to apply for the card. Existing members can request to change their card design to the Allendale design at no cost. New members will be able to choose the Allendale design from a list when their accounts are opened.

SRP hopes the donated funds will help the school district meet a previously unfulfilled need that will benefit the students and begin to close the financial literacy gap.
