As a winner of the 2018 STEM Coalition Challenge, the Team was awarded funding to support local STEM mentoring programs; here's where DIG comes in.

DIG will be working to align existing STEM outreach programs with the Allendale County School System programs to meet long-term strategic goals. The annual DIG STEM Festival, held in Williston, South Carolina, is the brainchild of the organization.

The Team was formed by leaders in the South Carolina Promise Zone and the Savannah River Site Community Reuse Organization (SRSCRO) to help students build proficiency in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).



The undisputed most entertaining parts of the celebration were the cultural dance presentations done by the students including the Macarena by the 2nd graders!



Centropa, an organization whose goal is to provide teachers with support, professional development and tools to teach the Holocaust in an authentic and creative way to not only tell the horror stories of that time in history, but to highlight the beauiful and heartfelt stories also.

Walker stated one of the most beneficial aspects of the trip was taking tours through the city. He called it "learning on the move." Being able to visit historical sites and locations that made the content he studies much more meaningful.

Mr. Walker says he can't wait to use the information he gathered and his experiences in Berlin to teach the Holocaust to his students this year.

The Superintendent's Corner

Dear Allendale County Schools Parents and Community,

ACSD educators work each day to give our children the gift of a free, high-quality, public education. A huge part of this task is providing our children with the academic language, instructional rigor and stamina they need for success in school. We can't do this work alone. There is no partnership more formidable than that between parents and teachers. Research shows that when families are active in their children's school activities and learning, students are more likely to attend school regularly, earn better grades, enroll in higher-level courses and graduate from high school. Further, research denotes that family engagement is also essential for school turnarounds. When it comes to school improvement efforts, active families are just as important as having great principals and teachers, strong curriculum and a positive school climate.



During this 1st nine weeks, we have tried to facilitate a welcoming school environment and foster clear communication between schools and parents. I would like to encourage you to get more involved in your child's school life. When you talk to your children about what they are learning in school, ask them to talk like a mathematician when they are talking about math (use words like subtraction rather than take-away) or talk like a scientist when talking about science (plants provide their own nourishment through the process of photosynthesis rather than plants make their own food). Praise them for using the words of a scientist or mathematician or historian. Finally, I encourage you to talk, in length, with your children about their behavior in the classroom, in the hallway and on the bus. It is important that teachers are not using time and energy repeating instructions and trying to redirect students whose behavior is disruptive. We will not tolerate with disruptive student behavior that inhibits others from learning. We are committed to ensuring all students have successful and positive learning experiences each day.
