FEED THE NEED FUNDRAISER: Over 150 DCS and DCC families gathered together on March 17th to pack 300 homeless packs and 20,000 meals for refugees and those suffering from malnutrition. Volunteers, who ranged from 5 to 70+ years of age, worked in assembly lines and completed this monumental task in just a couple of hours. Our volunteers were also graciously provided a hearty breakfast by our DCEF Board.



Apart from raising funds for Feed the Need, additional funds raised by our students will be paired with a recent grant we wrote earlier this year. Among replacing 10-year old projectors and document cameras, we will continue to upgrade our infrastructure and procure more devices as directed by our STEM initiative.
