Accreditation Visit

Every five to six years, DCS goes through the accreditation process with the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI). When our school initially achieved accreditation in 2003, it was a landmark achievement accomplished by years of hard work by the DCS staff. Although accreditation does not ensure a successful school, it does provide a catalyst for documenting and implementing actions, which do improve the school. In short, when a school is accredited, it is held to higher standards than schools without accreditation.



There are plenty of benefits for parents and for students who attend an accredited school. First, ACSI accreditation ensures that DCS students upon graduation can attend any university or college they gain admittance to.


Second, ACSI accreditation also ensures our staff and school programs meet certain standards of professionalism, accountability, student achievement, and most importantly Biblical integration.




for the final 8 at Baker City. Who would have thought Baker City was in the plans? Congratulations on a great season lady eagles.
