Dear LHS Students and Parents:

On behalf of our entire staff, welcome back, Berries! I hope you and your family are enjoying the summer break. Now, it is time to get ready for the challenges and rewards of another school year, our 149th and my 9th as principal. This is sure to be another wonderful year at LHS, and I look forward to sharing it with you. I am honored to serve as your principal. It is truly a privilege to be part of a school community where parents, staff, and students care for each other and strive to build positive relationships that foster academic and social growth.

In collaboration with the Century Career Center on the new Graduation Pathways, LHS students have every opportunity to individualize their graduation plans to align with post-secondary goals. In fact, over 90% of our students take courses at the Career Center—the highest in the state. Combined with our dual credits and comprehensive program of studies, pathways give our students a major advantage compared to their peers when it comes to preparation for college and career readiness.

Speaking of college and career readiness, Wednesday is now known as IMPACT Day (formerly Felix) where students will meet for thirty minutes between 2nd and 3rd period with a homeroom teacher. The point of emphasis will be on Naviance, a web-based planning and advising system that helps students and parents navigate through high school and explore post high school options.

Research shows that good student attendance is critical to student success. I encourage you to sit down with your student and go over the attendance policy on page 11 of the online newsletter, as well as other handbook information. One change to note is that we have moved to no backpacks/personal bags in classrooms. Backpacks/personal bags may be carried to and from school, but need kept in school assigned lockers during the day. The rationale is for school safety, the size of the backpacks/bags (so heavy on those backs!) and the room they take up in the aisles, around classrooms, and the need for safe egress in case of an emergency. Students will continue to be able to take a gym bag to PE/weights for a change of clothes.

We thank you for the support with this year's schedule change with school beginning at 8:35 A.M. and concluding at 3:25 P.M. Students may be dropped off beginning at 8:10 A.M. Just like employees of other careers, teachers' professional growth is important for future success. We believe this dedicated morning staff learning time will directly impact student achievement by improving teaching and learning. Plus, a little later start time can be beneficial to teenagers who are frequently sleep deprived.

If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us. Enjoy the last few days of break, and I look forward to seeing our students on Wednesday, August 7th and then everybody at Open House on Wednesday, August 14th at 6:30 P.M.

# LHS REGISTRATION

## Online Registration

July 16-29

All students must register for the 2019-2020 school year BEFORE attending classes on August 7th!

You will access the registration site through your PowerSchool Parent Portal account. To get started, please go to <https://www.lcsc.k12.in.us> and click on Explore. Then click on the Student Registration link. Click on New or Returning Student and begin completing the registration.

New and returning students can begin registering on or after July 16. **Registration must be completed by July 29th.** New students are not enrolled in school until they come to LHS with the completed paperwork to finish the registration process. **Once new students complete the online registration, they must make an appointment with the guidance office to complete the enrollment process.**

## On Campus Registration

July 22-26

Student schedules will be available online beginning Friday, August 2nd. Freshmen will receive their schedules at Berry Kick-Off.

## What do I do if I get sick?



For medical questions, call LHS Nurse, Kathy Rozzi at 753-0441, ext.

Students who are ill should report to the nurse's office during passing period unless an urgent health issue requires interrupting class. Students should call parents regarding health issues only from the nurse's office, as calling from elsewhere causes

much confusion for the nurse and the dean's office.

## Medications at School

The purpose of administering medication in school is to help each student maintain an optimal state of health to enhance his/her educational plans. Medication should be given at home whenever possible. Medications given during school hours should be only those necessary to provide the student access to his/her educational program. Please do not hesitate to call the nurse's office with questions or clarification when your student needs to take medication at school. Changes in medication must be documented by written authorization from a licensed physician.

## Over the Counter Medications (OTC)

Nonprescription medications may be given at school. The school nurse must be aware of the purpose for which a student is to receive the medication. Medicines shall be brought in the original container with the student's name on it.

For all medications administered, the school shall keep on file the written permission from the student's parent for the medicines.

## Herbal Supplement Policy

Herbal supplements may not be dispensed at school per corporation guidelines.

## Physician Slips

Students should have physician slips to return to school for:

- A. Extended illness
- B. Surgery
- C. Fracture (with cast, crutches, etc.)
- D. Pregnancy (need due date, list of restrictions, etc.)
- E. Bathroom Privileges

## Required Vaccines For All Seniors

All incoming seniors require vaccines. Your student must have these vaccine in order to start back to school. The Cass Co. ## TEST DATES

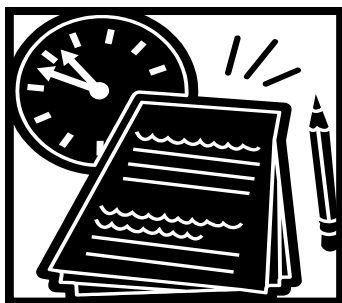
### SAT Dates

The SAT, or Scholastic Assessment Test, is a college admissions exam. Students can take the SAT multiple times in the attempt to achieve their greatest score. SAT scores are used for scholarship purposes as well! Some colleges require SAT scores for their applicants.

### PSAT

### (Sophomores and Juniors)

The PSAT is an important national test taken by college-bound students and will be given October 30th. All current 10th graders and any Junior who has registered for the test will take it. Research shows that students who have taken the PSAT will earn better scores on college admission tests. The PSAT is also used as the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying exam. PSAT test scores are used to qualify students for dual credit enrollment classes at LHS. The PSAT test fee for sophomores and juniors is funded by the Indiana Department of Education. Juniors who wish to take the test must register with Mrs. Lundy in the guidance office.



### ACT

The ACT is a standardized test designed to assess high school students' general educational development and their ability to begin college-level work.

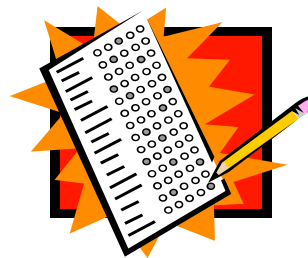

### ASVAB Test (Juniors and Seniors)

This is a free test given in mid-April to any junior or senior who wishes to sign up in the Guidance office. The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery is the most widely used multiple-aptitude test battery in the world. The ASVAB measures your strengths, weaknesses and potential for future success. The ASVAB also provides you with career information for various civilian and military occupations and is an indicator for success in future endeavors whether you choose to go to college, vocational school, or a military career.



### SAT and ACT Fee Waiver

Juniors and seniors who qualify for either Free/Reduced Lunches or 21<sup>st</sup> Century Scholars will qualify for a fee waiver for the SAT and ACT tests. ACT and SAT allow two fee waivers during a student's high school career beginning in the junior year. Please see your counselor for details.

### WHICH TEST SHOULD I TAKE?

Before signing up for the SAT or ACT, please see your counselor to assist you in deciding which test to take as one test might be more beneficial than another for you.

## SENIORS... CLASS OF 2020!

### College Applications

It is imperative that you check deadline dates on all applications for college and technical school admissions! Some applications may have deadlines as early as October, 2019. Make sure to check your college or university website.

### Transcripts

Parchment Exchange is a free, secure website for colleges to receive your transcript. Seniors— it is your responsibility to register on Parchment to order college and NCAA transcripts. It only takes 5-10 minutes to register. If you have trouble registering, please see Mrs. Lundy or your counselor for assistance.

### Scholarships

Opportunities for scholarships will be announced throughout the year via the Guidance Department's Website. Further, seniors should check in the guidance office at least every week for scholarship applications for which they may qualify. **IT IS THE STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY** to submit scholarship applications by the deadline.

### FAFSA

The Federal Application for Federal/State Aid is a free form and should be filled out by all who plan to attend post-secondary education. FAFSA forms are available online ([www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov)) after **October 1, 2019**. You will use your 2018 tax information to complete the form for the 2020-2021 application. FAFSA applications **must** be submitted online! **LHS will sponsor a Financial Aid Night on October 9, 2019 @6 p.m. in the McHale Performing Arts Center.** Watch for more details. **DO NOT submit a FAFSA Form before October 1, 2019!!!**

### Senior Awards Program

The Senior Awards Program will be held on **Monday, May 11, 2019**. This program is designed to recognize Seniors for the scholarships and awards they have earned. The Senior Awards Program will be held at McHale Performing Arts Center.

### Graduation

The 149th LHS Graduation will be **Sunday, May 31, 2019 at 2 p.m. in the Berry Bowl**. Students are not required to participate in the ceremony; however, **STUDENTS MUST ATTEND GRADUATION REHEARSAL IN ORDER TO TAKE PART IN THE GRADUATION CEREMONY**. Students are required to have a cap and gown for participation in commencement ceremonies.

### Transcripts

Transcripts are distributed to all students shortly after the beginning of the first and second semesters. This allows students to review their credits to see what

# LHS Absence Policy

In collaboration among school officials, probation, and Judge Kitts, LHS is partnering with the courts on these interventions.

At 5 (five) unexcused absences:

A family meeting will be scheduled that may include Cass County Juvenile Probation. If included in the meeting, the juvenile probation officer will complete an intake report based on the content of the meeting. This may also include a recommendation for an Informal Adjustment, if indicated.

At 8 (eight) unexcused absences:

The school may refer the student to Cass County Juvenile Probation for a delinquency petition. This referral will include a recommendation for a Parental Participation Order, if indicated.

Cass County Juvenile Probation will submit the referral to the Prosecutor's Office, including any recommendation for a Parental Participation Order.

The Court may hold an expedited Initial hearing within 2 (two) business days of the filing of a formal petition upon request.

The Cass County Circuit Court will notify all parties of the date and time of the Initial Hearing.

A juvenile subject to Formal Probation for the delinquent act of truancy will be expected to participate in the Cass County Juvenile Probation Department's truancy supervision, separate and apart from any further involvement by the school or any service provider.

At 10 (ten) unexcused absences:

Once the child has accumulated 10 (ten) or more unexcused absences, the school shall refer the matter to Cass County Juvenile Probation for a delinquency petition, or to the Department of Child Services, pursuant to IC 20-33-2-25.

A juvenile subject to Formal Probation who has been expelled may nonetheless be expected to continue with supervision by the Cass County Juvenile Probation with respect to further unexcused absences From school, separate and apart from any further involvement by the school or any service provider.

A juvenile who has been expelled from school but remains on probation may be enrolled in the Family Opportunity Center Education Center.

## **BACKPACK POLICY**

All backpacks, bags, athletic bags, duffle bags, and purses should be kept in the students' lockers. No bags, of any nature, will be permitted in the classroom.

# LHS Drug Testing Policy

## DRUG TESTING OF ATHLETES, CHEERLEADERS, AND STUDENT DRIVERS

For the safety, welfare and best interests of the students of LHS, and to promote drug-free lives both during and following high school, the LCSC has adopted a drug education and testing program for use by all high school interscholastic athletic and cheerleading teams and student drivers. Drug usage is incompatible with participation in inter-scholastic athletics and driving. Such usage is forbidden by training rules, and increases the risk of injury to the user as well as others. Consent to testing is a condition of practice for and participation in all inter-scholastic athletics, cheerleading activities and driving privileges. The purposes of the program are to prevent drug and alcohol usage; to educate students as to the serious physical, mental and emotional harm caused by drug and alcohol abuse; to prevent injury, illness and harm as a result of drug and alcohol abuse; and to maintain an environment free of alcohol and drug use. Students will receive instruction in the dangers of drug and alcohol use as a part of the health program. The elimination of drug and alcohol use shall be part of this program. This education and testing program is intended to be a helpful part of the overall physical and social education and conditioning programs at LHS. Its purpose is not strictly disciplinary in nature, but is intended as a medical diagnostic tool to disclose possible drug related problems, and as an extension of our drug education programs. The drug testing policy shall be distributed to all students and parents. Selection of persons to be tested shall be done in a confidential manner to protect the identity of those being tested. Collection of urine samples shall be done in an inoffensive way that insures the integrity and identity of the sample. The school official who supervises the sample collection will not physically observe giving of the sample. Samples shall be tested by a reliable laboratory and reliable tests shall be performed before any sample is labeled "positive" for any particular drug. Confidentiality shall be maintained so that the identity of anyone testing positive is made known only to the student, his or her parents or guardian, and those persons in the athletic department that need to know. If there is a suspension from practice or team participation, team members shall not be told the reason unless the student chooses to do so. This program shall not affect other LCSC policies, practices or rights in dealing with drug or alcohol use or possession where there is reasonable suspicion of use or possession obtained by means other than the random sampling provided for in this program. A "positive" test under this program shall not be cause for automatic suspension or expulsion from regular school activities. If a student is unable to provide a sample during the two-hour testing window, the student will then need to provide a test result, at a licensed medical facility that provides evidence of a passed drug screen. Until this test result is provided to the school, the driver will not be allowed to drive to school, and the athlete will be deemed temporarily ineligible from participating in the school's athletics program. The student will provide the drug screen to the school within the next 24 hours.

# LHS Dress Code

At the end of the summer many parents will begin buying school clothes for their children. Student dress is an extremely critical factor in creating a positive school climate and learning atmosphere. Besides providing students with the guidelines of school dress included in the high school handbook, as we talk with our students, we strive to emphasize that if you look good, you tend to feel good and that leads to a readiness to learn and achieve. Please help us encourage our students to look their best everyday and let "common sense" be their guideline in choosing what to wear to school each day. We reserve the right to contact parents if a student comes to school dressed in any way that will pose a potential disruption to a positive school climate. Therefore, we encourage parents to help their student select the appropriate school clothes.

**Here are some guidelines from our Student Handbook:**

## Dress Code

If a teacher or staff member determines a student is dressed inappropriately for LHS, he or she will refer the student to the Dean's Office immediately. Dress Code violators will receive consequences as outlined in the Consequence Matrix. The following will be strictly adhered to:

- No tank tops or spaghetti straps are permitted.
- No strapless tops are permitted.
- There must be no visible cleavage or midriffs.
- Skirts, dresses and shorts must be at least finger-tip length.
- No holes in pants above the finger tips.
- Backs must be covered.
- No see-through apparel or fishnet garments are permitted.
- No sagging pants are permitted. All pants and slacks must have belts and be worn at the waist.
- Belts must be fastened.
- No hats, caps, sunglasses, any other head coverings or gloves are permitted. However, at the discretion of teacher, coach, administrator, or other school official, students may be required to wear hairnets and/or other hair restraints in technology classes, laboratory, swimming, and comparable activities.
- No attire that may damage LHS property or cause personal injury to others (such as chains or studded items) is permitted.
- No clothing that advertises, promotes, or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or other illegal substances, is permitted.
- No clothing that is suggestive, has a double meaning or innuendo, or suggests inappropriate ideas, is permitted.
- Students on in-home detention who wear ankle-bracelets shall keep them covered at all times.
- No apparel, jewelry, cosmetic, make-up accessory, notebook, or manner of grooming which, by virtue of its color arrangement, trademark, or any other attribute denoting membership in a gang or advocating drug use, violence or clothing bearing racially or sexually offensive messages is permitted.
- No lounging or sleeping apparel is permitted. This includes, but is not limited to, pajamas, robes, and slippers.

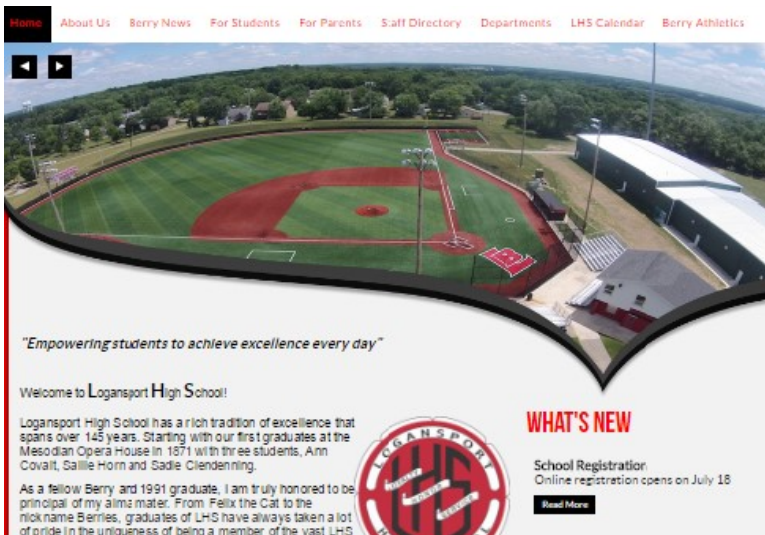
