Here we are....the 4th quarter of the 2021-2022 has kicked off which means the end of another school year is getting ready to wrap up. Over the past couple years we have endured and overcome many challenges, challenges which taught us much about ourselves not only as a school district but also as individuals in our own lives. The challenges and obstacles presented by the COVID-19 pandemic that we faced as a school community could not have been overcome without the support, encouragement, and patience extended by our Viking Family. As we move forward there will be more challenges, more obstacles, more tough decisions to make, etc..., and to successfully meet these challenges we must continue to plan for the future.

At the April Board of Education meeting, the board will be taking action on a bond resolution to officially move forward with facility and athletic upgrades and new construction. The USD 330 Mission Valley Mission Statement says, the "*Mission Valley School District is dedicated to providing a safe, orderly learning environment in which to direct and assist students as they prepare for a fulfilling and productive life.*" The upgrades and new construction found in the proposed bond project will address the key components of the mission statement.

Major facility upgrades have been discussed since September 2021 when Piper-Sandler Financial met with the board and informed them that there was an opportunity to do approximately \$10 million of facility projects with no increase in the current mill levy. In October we then began to gather information about facility needs from patrons, parents, and staff. After being selected by the board, HTK Architects then began the process of designing a scope of work using information they gathered from meeting with parents, patrons, staff, board members, and administration. After a series of meetings with a community facility group and work sessions with the board, a project scope was developed and recommended to the board at the March BOE meeting.

The facility group recommended and the BOE will be moving forward with the previous mentioned bond resolution that includes the following:

Although it will not be official until approved by the BOE, the current plan is to have both recommendations as proposals on the bond ballot. Patrons will have the option to vote Yes or No for each one of the recommendations. The projected costs provided include all construction costs, associated fees, surveys, planning, design, contingency, etc...

If both recommendations are approved, then for an additional 3.081 mills a \$11.785 million dollar project would be started.

*61% of the total project would be for new and remodeled classroom areas, security upgrades, office expansion & upgrades

*39% of the total project would be for new softball, baseball, and track construction. Along with new lighting at the football field.

Since the 2014-15 school year the total mill levy assessed by USD 330 Mission Valley has decreased 2.939 mills from 61.414 mills to the current mill levy of 58.475 mills. The additional 3.081 mills needed to finance the \$11.785 million project is .142 mills greater than the mill levy in 2014-2015. The following financial data provided by Piper-Sandler Financial explains the impact that an additional 3.081 mills would have on district tax payers

Throughout this process the goal of the BOE was to keep the cost of the project at a point with as little impact to the mill levy as possible. From the above information you can see that \$9.09 million dollars worth of new construction and upgrades can be done with zero mill levy increase, and for 3.081 mills then an additional \$2.695 million worth of new athletic construction could be completed. The \$2.695 million for softball & baseball fields/parking represents 22.8% of the entire \$11.785 million project.

As mentioned before, the USD 330 Board of Education does plan to take action to adopt a bond resolution to move the process forward. If approved, then the project will be reviewed for approval by the Kansas State Department of Education, with the bond project to be voted upon in August.

The Cost of Special Education in Kansas

Special Education Is

- Federally Mandated under IDEA for students with disabilities
- Specially Designed Instruction and Related Services to meet IEP Goals in the student's Least Restrictive Environment
- Due Process protecting student rights to Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) for children age 3-21 according to an individualized education program (IEP)


Special Education is not

- At-Risk
- ADA/Section 504

- Kansas Statute outlines 92% of excess costs to be funded by the state leaving 8% of excess costs to the local school districts. K.S.A. 72-978.
- Special education excess cost for the past 5 years has ranged from 74.3% to 81.4%. For 2021-2022, it is estimated to be 76.4% thanks to increased federal COVID relief funds.
- The Legislative Post Audit found during the 2017-18 school year alone, this underfunding totaled \$77 million. The Kansas Dept of Education indicates special education is currently underfunded by \$140 million. This places a strain on school district budgets and reduces available funds for all other school programs.

Special Education Kansas Facts

- Over one in six students receive special ed services.
- Since 2001, special ed enrollment up 20%, four times total enrollment.
- Since 1998, special education teachers up 25%; paraprofessionals up 93%
- Three-to-five-year-olds receiving special education up 52.3 percent since 2001
- Biggest challenges are growing numbers of students with aggressive behaviors, who can't regulate themselves, can't interact with other students and may be dangerous to themselves and others and destroy school property; and those lacking in speech and language skills.

Jacob Durkes called the regular meeting of the Board of Education of Mission Valley USD #330 to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Elementary Cafeteria at Mission Valley Schools. Board members present were Tuff Stephenson, Jon Deters, Nick Beasterfeld and Mistina Kraus. Clipper Goodrich joined via Zoom. Chris Campbell was absent. The superintendent and board clerk also attended.

Tuff Stephenson moved, seconded by Nick Beasterfeld, to adopt the agenda as presented. Motion passed 6 to 0.

Preparation for Enrollment for Fall 2022

The upcoming seniors, juniors, and sophomores have been diligently working on their Course Planners within the Xello College/Career Readiness platform. The students can access their course planner from school or home using their chromebook or a home device. If given the opportunity, it would be very helpful if the parents/guardians could have the student sit down with them and review the upcoming requests for courses. The student's interests are the primary driving force on course selection and number of sections available, so this is a very important function in master schedule development.

After they have completed the course planning components the students will be provided with an pre-enrollment 'Google' Form to finalize their enrollments for the next academic year that list each course and the hours they will be available. These forms will be emailed to the students directly.

A copy of any scheduling can be handed to you (from your child) or emailed to you. There will be a 'physical' enrollment at MVHS in August (date to be determined) to assist with class scheduling and enrollment for the fall semester.

A copy of the students course planner will be mailed out to the parents/guardians for you to sign/approve. If you do not submit a signed copy of the student's course planner back to the school, it will be assumed that you agree with the schedule as it is.



The Mission Valley High School Lady Vikings made their first trip to state since 1981. They started sub-state with a 63-14 win over Kansas City Christian. Following that game, Mission Valley matched up with Central Heights in the semifinals. After a rough first half, they pulled away to win 44-28 to set up a championship game with Northern Heights. Earlier in the season, Mission Valley had lost to Northern Heights by 24 points. That night, however, the Lady Vikes would not be denied and avenged that loss with a 41-35 win to clinch a trip to state. They finished the season with a record of 14-9, including finishing 3rd in the league regular season and 3rd at the league tournament. Thanks to all the students and patrons who came out and supported them this year. It was truly a memorable season!

Mission Valley Jr/Sr High School Has Two Compete at the 2A State Powerlifting Meet at Conway Springs

On Saturday, March 26th 2022, Mission Valley Jr/Sr High School had two young ladies travel to Conway Springs High School to compete in the 2A State Powerlifting Meet. Junior, Emma Slade, competed in the women's PWR Weight division and Senior, Carley Wagner, competed in the 114 pound weight division. There were a total of 312 lifters between the men's and women's weight divisions at the powerlifting meet and a total of 17 different schools that competed.

Carley Wagner had an impressive day of competition earning 4 medals. She brought home 3rd place in the squat with a lift of 185 lbs and 3rd place in the power clean with a lift of 130 lbs. Then Carley had an aggressive bench press of 110 lbs earning herself a 2nd place medal! This gave her a total weight lifted of 420lbs, earning her another bronze medal.

Emma Slade did two big things at this state meet, she earned a new personal best squatting 275 lbs and earning a 2nd place medal! Then she dominated the bench press in her weight division with a lift of 165 lbs earning her a 1st place gold medal and earning the respect of breaking the 2A State Powerlifting record in the bench press of the women's PWR weight division! This is quite the big deal at these meets as it is an honor to be recognized for such an accomplishment. Emma finished off power cleans with a lift of 135 lbs earning her 6th place out of the eleven ladies competing in that weight class. Between the three lifts, Emma lifted a total weight of 575 lbs, earning her a 3rd place medal for overall weight lifted.

It was such a fun experience getting the powerlifting program back in action at Mission Valley Jr/Sr High School. Now that kids understand how powerlifting meets work and how much success they can find in it, we hope more kids commit to the program next winter. Mission Valley hopes to host a powerlifting meet in the near future as it can be a way to get more area kids to want to compete in powerlifting. It can also be a great fundraising opportunity for improving the school's weight room equipment.
