

Itasca City Council November 21, 2016 Regular Meeting

The Itasca City Council met in a regular session on Monday, November 21, 2016.

Prior to the Council Meeting Mayor James Bouldin called Public Meeting/Hearing #2 to discuss Ordinance #011717 at 6:00 p.m. Speaking from the community were Tobe Arellano and Lisa Hernandez expressing their concerns about Ordinance #011717. The Mayor closed the Public Meeting at 6:12 p.m.

Mayor James Bouldin then called the regular Council Meeting to order at 6:13 p.m. Present were: Council Members Kathryn Guy, Patty Miller and Doug White. Absent were Council Members Susie Davis and Dora Hernandez. Present also representing the City were City Administrator George Bolling, City Secretary CinDee Garrett and City Attorney Stephanie Johnson.

Motions were made and passed unanimously to approve the minutes of the October 17, 2016 meeting and to approve the payment of bills as presented.

Monthly Department and Committee reports were given: Police-Police Chief Winson Brewer, Fire-Chief Cameron Offutt, Water Department-Kevin LoSciuto, Office of Code Enforcement/Animal Control-Kat McDaniel Offutt, and Planning and Zoning Committee-Barbara Petrash. Council approved the applications that had been passed by the Planning and Zoning Committee at their November meeting.

City Administrator George Bolling swore in James Bouldin as Mayor for another term. Council members Susie Davis and Dora Hernandez were both absent and their Swearing In was scheduled for the December Council Meeting.

Gandolf Burns gave an updated report (with maps) on the new grant that will provide the much-needed improvements to the old Water Well behind City Hall.

Danny Strunc with Yeldell, Wilson, Wood & Reeve P.C./ Certified Public Accountants gave the July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016 City's Audit Report. City Secretary CinDee Garrett also stated that upon her request that they will be working with her to help with next year's budget.

A motion was made and passed to approve the Fire department borrowing \$15,000.00 for air packs, which will be reimbursed by a Grant that has already been approved.

A motion was made and passed to approve the removal of Matt Fehnel, Rochelle Hardin and Jamie Rodriguez from all City of Itasca bank accounts with the Citizens State Bank of Itasca

Barbara Petrash continued her discussion on the possibility of amending zoning of the area known as the "Mill Block" from Single Family 1 (SF1) as it is currently zoned to Manufactured Housing 1 (MH1). A motion was made and passed to Table action on Ordinance #011717 until the December Council Meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 7:02 p.m.

Do You Remember When...? Mother's Apron

This is the story about the versatility of the apron worn by our wives, mothers and grandmothers. Of course, the apron is still used today, but it obviously does not have as many functions as in days past. It was made of several materials from gingham, denim, cotton and other materials. The most popular in the time of our mothers and

grandmothers was cotton made from flour and feed sacks, usually with a floral design. Most of them had a full length with a bib. The strings were usually made by cutting two narrow strips from the material, doubling and sewing it. It was about a half inch wide. Some aprons had buttons. The strings and buttons fastened in the back. Some were decorated with bias tape and rickrack.

As stated above the apron had many uses. They used it most often like a basket to carry things in. The bottom was simply pulled up to form the cup. When mother or grandmother gathered eggs, she carried them to the house in the apron. She also carried feed to the chickens in this manner and also to wave it and shoo the chickens from the garden or to herd them and also, to shoo flies from the dinner table. When the men were working in the fields, she summoned them to dinner by waving the apron out in the yard, as the men would be watching for it. It would be used to lift hot pans from the old wood cook stove. It was used to wipe sweat from her brow while she was cooking during the summer time, and she probably wiped her nose as well with the apron during allergy season.

Wherever they went around the house, or farm she had the ever present apron. If she happened to be walking around the place and discovered peaches or other fruit that had fallen, the ever present apron came into play again to carry it to the house. Late in the afternoon when she went to the woodpile for wood to cook breakfast, she again used her apron to carry it to the kitchen wood box. She also used it to wipe the tears of a young one who might have stumped his toe or cut a finger and that shy young girl might have hidden behind the apron if a stranger came by. When mother sat in the porch swing for a moment to rest and it happened to be a little cool, she simply pulled up the bottom over her chest and arms for warmth.

The apron was used to cover various things, to keep flies off the pies cooling on the windowsill, or over the food on the dinner table. We usually left the food on the table from dinner until suppertime. We did not have a refrigerator to put it in anyway. It is a wonder we did not get food poisoning, but I don't remember that we ever did.

If we looked down the road and saw visitors coming mother hurriedly dusted things with the apron, put on a clean one, fluffed her hair and just like that she was ready to greet them, with all the charm she could display in those days.

Sometimes the apron was used instead of being worn. It might be used as a cover when the baby took its nap. Even at the end of the day, it was usually put to some use, such as to cover the birdcage. And so it ends, a busy day for a very useful article of clothing, if it can be called such. Surely, that apron was at the top of her list, a valuable tool used around the home and farm. Oh! And last, but not least, let's not forget about the phrase, "Tied to mama's apron strings!"
