
belt buckle. The girls had to memorize a speech about who they are and what their role in the Hill County Fair is.

### Hill County Day in Austin

The Texas Legislature got its 85th session underway last month and now local residents have the opportunity to be a part of the Austin scene during Hill County Day at the state capitol.

Chartered buses will leave Historic City Hall at 127 East Franklin Street in Hillsboro at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday, February 22, for the day trip.

Activities will kick off with opening ceremonies in the House of Representatives and Senate.

This year's Dutch-treat luncheon will once again be held in the underground extension of the capitol in the Legislative Conference Center, which is E2.002.

Scheduled to speak at the luncheon are State Senator Brian Birdwell, R-Granbury, and state Representative Byron Cook, R-Corsicana.

The speakers' line up for the afternoon is being finalized, but will include Russell Devorsky, current executive director of the Heart of Texas Council of Governments and former chief of staff of state Representative Jim Dunnam of Waco.

He will dicuss his time working at the Capitol and some of the interesting characters he dealt with, including Hillsboro's own Bob Bullock.

The trip gives local residents an opportunity to see their legislators at work on the floors of the House and Senate and in committee hearings.

The lunch will be followed by afternoon speakers.

For those not wishing to hear the speakers, a capitol tour for local residents has been set up for 2 p.m.

A limited number of seats remain on the buses. The cost of the bus is being covered this year by the day's sponsors, HILCO, Atmos Energy, AT&T, Oncor and Hill County Farm Bureau.

The noon meal will be \$15 per person payable in advance to the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce.

The Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce, along with chambers from Lake Whitney, Hubbard and Itasca, is hosting the event.

To make reservations, contact the Hillsboro Area Chamber of Commerce at 254-582-2481.

Buses will return to Hillsboro at approximately 6:30 p.m.

# Do You Remember When...? Washday


Quite often we see an old black cast-iron wash pot in someone's yard, sometimes suspended on a tripod. Nowadays the pots are used for flowers and other decorations, also, as antiques.

There was a time when those old pots played an indispensable role when washday came around. During the summer when school was out, on a Monday or maybe a Saturday or a holiday, the day

started with the mother and children preparing for the washday ritual. The boys gathered wood and started fires under the pots; there were usually two of them. Water was carried from the well and dumped into the pots to boil. The sheets, pillow cases and other white clothes were boiled, after adding some of that good old lye soap and some Mrs. Stewart's blueing to make them whiter. I always wondered how blueing that looked like food coloring could make things white. When the whites had boiled, it took a couple of kids to wring out the water, this was done by folding the sheets in the middle, inserting a stick in the fold and twisting, the stick was usually an old cut off broom handle which was also used to punch and stir the wash while it boiled. After wringing, we hung the sheets and things on the clothes line to dry. This was a boring chore for us boys. We were usually thinking the fish might be biting down on the creek, or we could hear the hounds chasing a raccoon.

Of course, there could have been worse things than helping with the wash. We could have been picking cotton, hoeing cockleburs, or "heading" maize, which to me was the worst job on the farm. It was done in hot weather, and the chaff mixed with sweat was extremely uncomfortable.

After the white clothing came the colored clothing, blue jeans, aprons, flower sack dresses and drawers. We usually had to rub these on the old rub board as they were not boiled. The sheets took up all the clothes lines, so we hung the rest on the fence around the yard. This was in later years called our "solar dryer." If there were cattle or goats around we had to keep an eye out because they had a tendency to chew on the clothes. It must have been the clean smell and the taste that attracted them.



We made our own starch by adding two table spoons of Kingsford Starch to cold water. The mixture was boiled until it made a thick translucent paste. We dipped the clothes in this and hung them out. Of course this necessitated ironing, which was also a laborious chore. As you might guess, we had no perma-press clothes back then. Washdays of yesteryear left many treasured memories. As mother was scrubbing on the rub board, she no doubt was dreaming of automatic washers and dryers, water heaters, indoor plumbing, refrigerators and the many other modern appliances we take for granted today.

The Hillsboro Lions Club will host its annual chili lunch and food drive Sunday, February 26, at Historic City Hall, 127 East Franklin Street.


Serving will be from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., eat in or carry out. Luncheon tickets are \$7 and available from Lions Club members at the door.

The public's support will be appreciated.




