

UIL released the new district alignment for the 2010-2012 football and basketball seasons last week. With 185 students on census day, Itasca remains in conference 1-A. In the fall during football season Itasca is in Division 1, Region 2, District 7. They will be pitted against Bosqueville, De Leon, Santo, and Valley Mills.

Itasca's 2010-2012 basketball placing is also Division 1, Region 2 but they are in District 15-A teams matched against Bosqueville, Meridian, Valley Mills, Blum, and Moody.

The new districts and match ups will offer more of a challenge to the Wampus Cat teams. The students and coaches are already thinking about and mapping out strategies for next year.

Talented Art Students Bring Home 28 Ribbons from Fair

Itasca art students once again did a wonderful job with entries at the Hill County Fair. All upper level students (Art II and Art III) were required to enter at least one piece of art but several Art I students also decided to participate in the competition.

IHS had 28 pieces that placed. Vicktoria Hollifield brought home four 1^{st} place ribbons and two 2^{nd} place ribbons for her artwork. Itasca students also entered several photographs. In that category, they received two 1^{st} places, two 2^{nd} places and one 3^{rd} place ribbon.

Racial Profiling Policy Public Notice

The purpose of the policy is to reaffirm the Itasca Police Department's commitment to unbiased policing in all its encounters between officer and any person; to reinforce procedures that serve to ensure public confidence and mutual trust through the provision of services in a fair and equitable fashion; and to protect our officers from unwarranted accusations of misconduct when they act within the dictates of departmental policy and the law.

It is the policy of this department to police in a proactive manner and, to aggressively investigate suspected violations of law. Officers shall actively enforce state and federal laws in a responsible and professional manner, without regard to race, ethnicity or national origin. Officers are strictly prohibited from engaging in racial profiling as defined in this policy. This policy shall be applicable to all person, whether drivers, passenger or pedestrians.

The department shall accept complaints from any person who believes he or she has been stopped or searched based on racial, ethnic, or national origin profiling. No person shall be discouraged, intimidated or coerced from filing a complaint, or discriminated against because he or she filed such a complaint.

Any employee who receives an allegation of racial profiling, including the officer who initiated the stop, shall record the person's name, address, and telephone number, and forward the complaint through the appropriate channel or direct the individual(s). Any employee contacted shall provide to that person a copy of a complaint form or the department process for filing a complaint. All employees will report any allegation of racial profiling to their superior before the end of their shift.

Maintenance of Aerobic Systems Issue In County Permits Required For All OSSF Systems

Properly maintaining aerobic systems in the county is becoming more and more of an issue as additional units are installed. What are termed as on-site sewage facilities (OSSF) by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) are commonly known to residents by their old name, septic systems. Hill County Public Works Director Mike Watson, who is charged with inspecting systems in the

county, said that maintenance can be a problem with all OSSFs, but more especially aerobic systems.

The options for OSSFs include the standard system with lateral lines. Falling under the non-standard category are aerobic, low-pressure dose (LPD), drip emitters, ET (evapotranspiration) beds and holding tanks. Watson said that soil type in the county, which has a high concentration of clay in most areas, or lot size usually necessitates the installation of an aerobic system.

"If you take moist dirt in your yard and can make a ball, there is too much clay, which requires an aerobic system," the public works director explained. The maintenance issue has become an ever-increasing problem since state lawmakers eliminated mandatory-maintenance contracts for residents with aerobic systems in 2007. "Many people don't even know they have an aerobic system or if they do, they don't know how to maintain it," Watson explained.

Without a properly maintained system, residents are basically operating a small wastewater treatment plant with no treatment. Aerobic systems require that chlorine tablets be installed and aerator filters cleaned periodically in order to produce affluent that is safe when it comes from sprinkler heads in the yard. Watson presented a scenario where a neighbor who hasn't maintained their system is spraying raw sewage on the yard. The neighbor's dog comes to visit and then returns home, tracking raw sewage into its owner's house.

"You can have a serious health issue quickly," he added.

The change in the maintenance-contract law was re-addressed in last spring's legislative session. The revision still doesn't mandate a maintenance contract, but requires property owners to be properly trained on how to maintain their aerobic system and keep or submit maintenance records to the county. That raises another problem because the TCEQ hasn't come up with the training classes for property owners. They are expected to be in place by the end of the year.

The issue of maintenance contracts came before Hill County Commissioners' Court late last year. The state gave counties the authority to mandate maintenance contracts, but voluntary compliance with the state regulations is being attempted first. There are surrounding counties that have implemented the law and mandate the contracts. Watson pointed out that if two complaints are filed over an aerobic system that is not properly maintained, the county can force the owner to enter into a maintenance contract.

The contracts normally range from \$150 to \$200 annually and generally include quarterly inspections, according to the official. In general, Watson said that he wanted to remind the public that a permit is required through his office on any OSSF system installed in the county, no matter the size of the tract of land. The fee is \$325 for standard systems and \$475 for non-standard systems. All fees are non-refundable and must be paid by check or money order to Hill County Public Works.

Watson's office is located at 201 East Franklin Street across from the John Erwin Courthouse Annex in Hillsboro. Among the items that must accompany an application is a site evaluation by a licensed evaluator. Planning materials are also necessary. Standard-system plans may be prepared by the owner or an installer, but non-standard and proprietary-system plans must be prepared by a professional engineer or a professional sanitarian. If approved, a permit to construct will be issued by Watson's office, which is good for one year. Installers must notify the public works director at least five working days before the date of the construction inspection. Watson's office has seven days to issue a notice of approval to the owner if the system passes inspection. Additional fees are required if a second or third inspection is required.


