This stellar ensemble is part of a band program serving approximately 800 students per academic semester. Under the leadership of Dr. Timothy Rhea, today's instrumental music program at Texas A&M University includes the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, Symphonic Band, Concert Band, the nationally famous "Fightin' Texas Aggie Band", a jazz ensemble program, the Aggieland Dance Orchestra, the Dukes of Aggieland Combo and the University Orchestra.

By the attraction of players of extremely high quality, the bands strive to program the best in both traditional and contemporary wind band literature. In recent years, the TAMU Wind Symphony has performed concerts for the memberships of the Texas Music Educators Association, the College Band Directors National Association, and the American Bandmasters Association. The ensemble regularly tours during the spring semester and continues to release its compact disc recording series with Mark Records. Past Texas performances have included the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas, and both the Wortham Center and Music Hall in Houston. The Wind Symphony toured Europe in 1999, 2001, 2004, and 2007 with concert performances in England, Ireland, Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic. The crowning achievement of their stellar touring schedule was their Carnegie Hall debut in February of 2008.

Dr. Rhea grew up in the music programs of the Texas public schools. He earned the Bachelor of Music Education with honors from the University of Arkansas, the Master of Music in Wind Conducting from Texas Tech University and the Doctor of Musical Arts in Wind Conducting and Composition from the University of Houston.

He was named conductor of the TAMU Wind Symphony in 1995. In July of 1999, he was awarded the Outstanding Young Bandmaster of the Year for the state of Texas from Phi Beta Mu. In December of 2000, Dr. Ray Bowen, former President of Texas A&M University, presented Dr. Rhea with the President's Meritorious Service Award to Texas A&M University.

In addition to conducting, Rhea has enjoyed a successful career as an arranger and composer with an output of compositions and arrangements numbering over 300. He maintains a nationally active schedule as conductor, clinician, and adjudicator and is a member of several regional and national bandmasters associations as well as ASCAP.

As with all Performing Arts Series events, this program will be presented in the Governor Bill Daniel Auditorium located in the Vara Martin Daniel Performing Arts Center and is free and open to the public. The steering committee appreciates the North Texas Airstream Community Women's Club hosting a reception immediately following the performance. With the recent purchase of property at 1500 South Abbott Avenue in Hillsboro building plans are underway to develop a state-of-the-art animal shelter facility that will include 48 kennels, cattery, and a rabies quarantine area. Initially, the facility will be operated as a limited pet adoption center totally relying on donated funds until perpetuating operating expenses are established for a county animal control program.

Our community must clearly understand that Paw Pals is not animal control but dedicated volunteers that have been working for the past six years towards the mentioned goals. Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month Observed

February has been designated as Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month. Throughout the week of February 1-5, the junior high students had theme days to raise awareness of the problem. In conjunction with the other activities a blood drive was held by Carter BloodCare where IHS students donated 44 units of whole blood and 4 double red cell donations. The district under the direction of Counselor Grace Hennig held a meeting for students and parents to raise the awareness of dating violence and to learn about Sexting and Bullying. The speakers present wanted to make sure parents were aware of the signs of dating violence and to give them options for helping their children.

Amy Karr, BSW, spoke to 7-12 grade students and their parents about the signs of an abusive relationship and what to do once you have identified it. She also explained what a healthy relationship is supposed to be like.

Joy Borjes, LMSW addressed the parents of elementary age students on bullying and gave tips to help parents recognize when their student is being bullied or doing the bullying.

Mrs. Hennig held a workshop for pre-kindergarten through 6th graders. They watched the video, "Bullies are a Pain in the Brain," made a plan for standing up to bullies, learned what to do instead of bottling up their feelings, and wrote a poem to encourage them about themselves.

"One of the worksheets I gave them says, 'By having a plan, positive choices are easier to make and put into action.' I think this is very true, so it is important to me for these children to have a plan to prevent bullying."

For the meeting, students were able to enter a poster or a video to win prizes. Dima Nayda won first place with his poster and received \$40. Runners up were Cory Cervantes, Rebecca Durham and Raven Nickell. Each received \$20. The winners of the video contest (pictured right) were a team of Ellen Stuart, Colton Sullins, Stephanie Ignacz (missing from photo), and Kristen Worth. They received a \$25 Wal-Mart gift card donated by HILCO.

"We are hoping that through awareness and the warning signs, we will create a non-violent atmosphere at school," counselor Grace Hennig said. "I want to make sure everyone knows that I am proud of them and want to help them live better lives."

In a recent statement OSDFS Assistant Deputy Secretary Kevin Jennings acknowledged Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month and praised schools' efforts to inform students and parents.

"The U.S. Department of Education's Office of Safe and Drug-Free Schools is committed to raising awareness about teen dating violence and sending the message to every student that he/she is valuable and deserves to be treated with respect. We know that one in three teenagers experiences violence in a dating relationship and that this violence





crosses all racial, economic, and social lines. We believe we can empower teenagers through education and outreach to identify warning signs, recognize they have choices, and choose healthy, caring relationships. We applaud Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month as an important effort to raise awareness around this issue and support everyone who is working to make sure that teen dating violence is brought to an end."


Remember When ... "Columbus Johnson"



Itasca has been blessed with many colorful characters over the years, not the least of which was Columbus Johnson.

Columbus was born February 14, 1876 in Columbia, Texas near Houston. His parents were Columbus Johnson, Sr. and Melinda. He came to Itasca in 1900 and lived here until his death. He was married three times. His last wife died in 1955.

Columbus was always young for his age, he worked on the farm most of his life. He said he had worked for Sam Slay, Jake Davis, Jim Bush, Charlie Roten and others. He worked during the days of mules and horse and never learned to operate a tractor. They came along late in his life anyways. He said, "I quit just before the Farmall and John Deere.



In time, Columbus became well known in the area for his fine barbecue. We could smell the delicious aroma all over town. His pit was filled with juicy steaks, ribs, briskets, sausage and chicken halves. He also had his own recipe for barbecue sauce, which was outstanding. With all that meat and the smell of hickory, oak and mesquite burning, it was irresistible. The aroma alone drew customers from all over town.

There was another Johnson that was famous for its restaurants and good barbecue. That was the Howard Johnson Chain, but they did not measure up to our Columbus Johnson's culinary efforts. Columbus, with his soft southern drawl, gentle ways, philosophy about the "Old Timey Ways" and "Old Timey Attitudes" about life would captivate anyone who came in contact with him. He always had visitors on what he called "Barbecue Day" just to visit and listen to his views on things.

He always enjoyed Columbus Day on October 12 each year. He would tell his friends, "Well this is my day, Columbus Day." Also being born on Valentine's Day was great as he had fun with that also.

Columbus loved to fish and he often went to the Nolan River with Dr. Ritchey to "woim" fish as he called it. He also fished from the bank and was afraid to go out in the water in Dr. Ritchey's homemade boat. It seems that Columbus went a couple of times with Itasca's "Hickley" Fishing Club as a cook and also to fish.

I remember one time when we lived on the mountain, the Soil Conservation Service had built a lake on the place and Columbus wanted to come out and fish. I hated to tell him no, but they didn't want fishing to get out of hand. I said, "Okay Columbus, you can come out and fish, but watch out for the alligators."

"Alligators!" he exclaimed. "I don't believes I want to go fishing there."

I have felt guilty ever since about telling the old gentleman that. However, we were not plagued with fisherman after that.

Columbus was a long time member of AME Methodist Church in Itasca. He served as Deacon for a long time. I remember the saying he use to say about his religious beliefs and about life in general.

"A man has got to do more than just act like he is following the rules," he said. "Iffen he don't believe, and he ain't right in his heart, He ain't likely to go to heaven.

Columbus had four children, Effie Kate, Columbus III, Ola Lee and Christian. Effie Kate lived in Fort Worth at one time and the others were in Oakland, California. Columbus visited them out there several times over the years.

Those of us who knew Columbus will remember his soft voice, down home Philosophy and gentle ways, but probably equally as well we will remember his wonderful barbecue.
