A home in the 100 block Minnie Drive in Itasca destroyed by fire Saturday night, March 27. The Hill **County** Sheriff's Office received the initial 9-1-1 call 9:45 p.m. at



Firefighters arrived to find the home heavily involved in smoke and flames. Mutual aid was provided by fire units from Hillsboro, Covington and Grandview.

The home had been vacant for at least a year and there was no power to the building according to officials. The fire started in the northeast corner of the home but the investigation into the cause of the fire is still ongoing.

"Cans for Paw Pals" - Community Bringing Positive Change

Hundreds of conscientious Hill County citizens have leaned towards "green" by donating their aluminum cans to support the goals of Hill County Paw Pals. Paw Pals formed some six years ago with attainable goals to correct our community's horrific pet overpopulation issue by establishing an animal shelter in order to support a proactive county animal control program.

Credit for the success of this recycling project goes to Jean & JD Landis who named and manage "Cans for Paw Pals." This project, where eight loads weighing some 8,000 pounds have already been harvested, has generated over \$4,200 towards the goals of Paw Pals. 8,000 pounds of aluminum cans equate to some 224,000 cans. Interestingly, if one were to place 224,000 cans end to end, the cans would stretch 17.2 miles or from Hillsboro, past Malone, to nearly Penelope! To put this into symbolic perspective, each of these donated cans was handled by a person who consciously made a determination to place the empty can into a receptacle destined to "Cans for Paw Pals"—a seemingly slight but in reality a major contribution in correcting pet overpopulation since the success of our endeavors is based on a determined and positive mind-set. The Landis' selfless devotion and contribution to Paw Pals' undertaking bring great commendation and represents the warm and progressive spirit that exists in our community.

The 16' caged trailer used for this worthy project (valued at \$1,600) was graciously donated by Ronnie & Dana Fuchs, proprietors of Cen-Tex Trailers of Hillsboro.

Remember When ... "Easter Traditions"





The egg is one of the oldest symbols know to civilization. Some have said it stands for new life. As Christianity developed, the egg became more important as a symbol of life, and often it stood for the resurrection. In the distant past, eggs were dyed red to commemorate the passion of Christ, and for others it symbolized the stone that was rolled away from the tomb.

Eastern Orthodox people gave eggs on the morning of the resurrection as a renewed commitment of faith. Some early Christian graves were found to contain ostrich eggs. The custom of sending eggs on Easter is thought to have originated with the Persians. Eggs were scarce in

those days, and the gift of eggs was special.

As to the origin of the Easter Bunny as it is known today, it is said to have originated in Germany. There was a practice of delivering gifts to children. There is a story that has been told over the ages about the beginning of Easter egg hunting.

Once there was a princess who decided to reward children with eggs. In order to make them more attractive and exciting, they were brightly colored and placed in baskets and made to resemble nests. They were hidden in a wooded area for the children to find. As they were looking for the eggs, a rabbit ran through the group of children. This somehow led to the rabbit being linked to Easter Traditions, and that has led to chocolate rabbits and other candy animal creations and also live pets given as Easter gifts. People should give some thought to giving live pets. These pets have to be taken care of, especially as they grow. Small children often do not have the expertise for their

care.

In the older days as eggs became more plentiful, they began to color them. Some were even embellished with gold and precious stones. In recent years, we now use candy eggs, rather than colored real ones. When real ones were used they were boiled and then colored by hand painting or by being dipped into dye water. In order to use boiled eggs the best way is to use clean white eggs, let them set in room temperature for an hour, the shells will not crack when boiled like cold eggs. Do not use soft aluminum pots because the aluminum will cause a harmless chemical reaction and the color will not adhere as well. Let the eggs sit in the pot for 30 minutes, rinse in cold water and let them stand at room temperature for a few minutes, making sure they are dry. They can now be colored with a commercial color-



ing material or other methods or color. If you want eggs with no yellow or yoke inside, use a large needle or an ice pick to punch a hole gently at each end. After punching the holes the contents can be removed by blowing into the hole at one end.

Since the time of Abraham Lincoln the White House has hosted an Easter egg hunt on the lawn of children under twelve. The event was discontinued during World War II and resumed in 1953 by order of President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

I am sure many of us remember Easters past when everyone dressed in the finest for Easter Sunday morning services. There was the new hat, dress and gloves for mother, along with a corsage. There were the special little dresses for the younger girls; quite often they were home-made with great care. It was not usually possible to purchase them with limited funds. Special effort was put into the crinoline petticoats, full pastel skirts with tight bodices. This was the day when every girl wanted that special new dress. The girls also wore hats and gloves, and new patent leather shoes. The men wore top coats in brown, black, or gray, stiffly starched white shirts with ties. It would be quite a few years before colored shirts came into style. I remember a banker once who wore a colored shirt to work and was reprimanded for doing so.

An Easter story would not be complete without the story about the mother who wanted very much for her little girl to have a special Easter dress. She had no money to buy one. One of her friends had given her a brown dress that she had outgrown. The lady decided to cut the dress up and bleach it white, then dye it to make the little girl's dress, she wondered how she was going to color it since she did not have the dime to buy a package of Rit dye. She put the dress parts into the bleach solution and when it came out, behold! It was a beautiful green color. She made the dress for her little daughter, believing all the time that there was a divine intervention with her efforts.

As we go to Lawless Park this Easter for the sunrise service, let us also remember the wonderful experiences we have had during our Easters past.
