## Second Itasca Home Destroyed by Fire in as many Weeks



A home in the 800 block of Weave St. was destroyed by fire early Saturday morning, April 3. The 9-1-1 fire call was received by the Hill County Sheriff's Office at 12:27 a.m. The home was totally engulfed in flames when fire fighters arrived. The fire started in the southeast area of the home but the cause of the fire is still under investigation. Itasca VFD received mutual aid from Hillsboro FD, Grandview VFD and Covington VFD.

This is the second structure fire in Itasca in the last two weeks. Last weekend a home in the 100 block of Minnie Dr was also destroyed and that cause is also still under investigation.

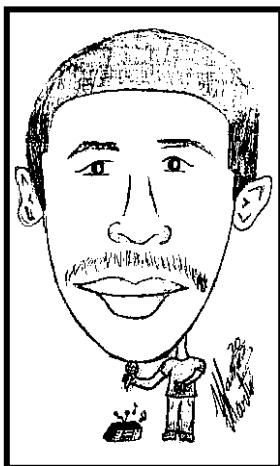
Corey transferred back to Itasca this year from Hillsboro, after being away for a year and a half.

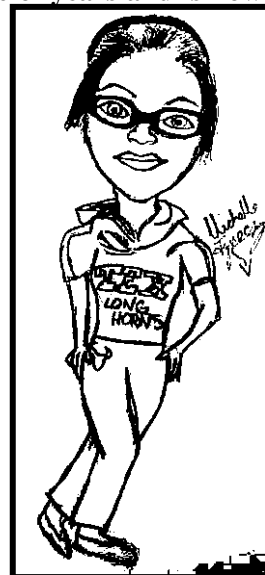
Katherine is looking forward to the future. She has been from school to school in the past couple of years and is now making up credits so she can graduate.

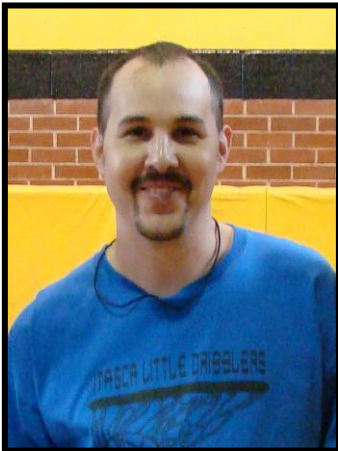
