The Board of Trustees of the Itasca Independent School District met in regular session on Monday, April 12, 2010, in the Itasca ISD Library at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were President Susan Bason, Secretary Angelia Orr, Members Nancy Bowman, Brian Bassett, Kevin Cordell and Marquita Lloyd. Absent was Vice President Oscar Castillo, Jr. Administration members present were Superintendent Glenn Pittman, Principals Rickie Harris, Keith Hannah and Karon Farquhar, Special Programs Director Amy Reyna, Student Services Coordinator Kristi Sargent, Business Manager Kim Eaddy and Secretary Norma Merkel. Visitors present were Dr. Steve Johnson, Joanna Durham, Barbara Petrash, Scott Stephens, Cory Cole, Michelle Cole, Naomi West and Naomi Stephens.

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. All visitors were welcomed to the meeting and Karon Farquhar introduced the students that collected the top amounts of money for the St. Jude's Mathathon. The students were presented certificates of recognition.

Wayne Reynaud of PBK firm presented an overview of PBK and plans for the facility upgrades with a preliminary timeline.

Motions were made and passed to approve the amended board meeting minutes from March 1, 2010 and March 8, 2010, to approve the financial report for March and to approve the 5<sup>th</sup> 2009-10 budget amendment by moving already budgeted funds to different areas. The TASB policy update 87 which included CVB, CVA and CH local policies was approved along with the 2010-2011 district calendar.

Superintendent Pittman updated the board on the residential facilities tracker report from TEA. He reported that the district will question some of the findings. The district was notified that the 2008-09 accreditation status is warned and the district accepted that status since the 2009-10 district status is accredited. He also reported that the special education program is working on compensatory services and which students are eligible for services.

The board went into executive session at 8:26 p.m. and reconvened into open session at 8:30 p.m. A motion was passed to approve a probationary contract for Jared Bass for 2010-11. The meeting adjourned at 8:32 p.m.

# Families Instructed in DNA Collection for Child ID

Itasca PD and IISD students joined in sponsoring a Child ID program last month. Police Chief Griscavage urges parents that did not bring their children to collect DNA samples on their own and store them away.

To take a hair sample use a clean brush or comb used only by your child and brush or comb the child's hair. Remove from the brush or comb several strands of hair with a follicle at the end. Place the hair strands in a clean envelope and seal with tape. DO NOT LICK THE ENVELOPE!

To take a blood sample apply a clean band-aid to your child's scrape or cut. After one hour, replace the bandage with a clean one. Allow the bandage to dry for at least 2 hours. Place the bandage in a clean envelope and seal with tape. DO NOT LICK THE ENVELOPE!

Use a separate envelope for each sample. We will print the instructions for saliva sample at a later date.

### **Itasca City Council April Meeting**

The Itasca City Council met in a regular session on Monday, April 19, 2010 in the Council Chambers, 136 N. Hill St., Itasca, Texas. Mayor Matthew Fehnel called the meeting to order. Council members present were James Bouldin, Susie Davis, Denis Heyse, Doug Farquhar and John Laird. Also present were City Administrator Mark Gropp and City Attorney Stephanie Johnson.

Motions were made and passed to approve the minutes of the March 15, 2010 meeting and to approve the payment of bills. Monthly department and committee reports were given by Wayland Price (Fire Department), Chief John Griscavage (Police), Wayne Upchurch (Water/Sewer Operations), Holly Pelt (Planning and Zoning, Office of Code Enforcement and Building Standards Commission).

Barbara Petrash representing the Chamber of Commerce requested the 100 block of W. Main Street be closed for the annual Barbeque Cook-off on May 21-22, 2010. The hours of the activity will be from Friday at 12:00 noon May 21, 2010 to 6:00 p.m. Saturday May 22, 2010. Resolution #041510-1 for the request was approved unanimously.

Gandolf Burrus addressed the council to consider and possibly take action on Letter of Agreement with Grant Development Services to prepare CDBG grant application request for competition in 2011/2012 Texas Department of Rural Affairs TxCDP funding cycle. Burrus stated the only difference in the letter of agreement from previous contracts is the date. The application is for a \$250,000 grant, which will be for the construction of water and/or wastewater services and improvements. A motion to approve signing Letter of Agreement with Grant Development Services was passed.

The rezoning of Itasca OT Block 28 Lots 3-4 & Part of Lot 5 from SF-1 (Single Family Residential District-1) to MH-1 (Manufactured Home District) was considered. Holly Pelt explained to the council where the property is located in the city, which is currently a residential area. The property owner has requested a zone change. The rezoning would enable the property owner to place a manufactured home on the property. The first reading to adopt an Ordinance to amend the Zoning Ordinance Map of the City of Itasca by rezoning Itasca OT Block 28 Lots 3-4 & Part of Lot 5 from SF-1 (Single Family Residential District-1) to MH-1 (Manufactured Home District) was read by the Mayor. The City Attorney recommended adding an attachment describing the property more in detail with the ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance (Map). A motion to approve and adopt Ordinance No. 041910, rezone lots describe with the attachments was made and passed, waiving the second and third reading.

The Council discussed and considered taking action on Chapters 1-10 of the Policy and Procedures for the Police Department presented by City Administrator from March 2010 meeting. The City Attorney stated that she still had some things to go over with the Police Chief. After reviewing Chapters 1-10 the Council agreed to take action at a later meeting. The City Administrator asked the Council to review the next 10 chapters which he would like to discuss at the next meeting.

The Council discussed considering amendments to the Policy and Procedures regarding Vehicle Operator Standards. The Police Chief explained that a driver's license check would be run for all city employees who would be authorized to operate city vehicles. The police department record check goes thru TCLEOSE; the fire department and city employees will be checked thru DPS. A motion was made and passed to table the amendments until a future meeting.

A motion was approved to rescheduling the Regular Council Meeting from Monday, May 17, 2010 to Monday May 24, 2010. Mayor Matthew Fehnel called an executive session at 6:50 p.m. to take place pursuant to Section 551.074 of the Texas Government Code regarding personnel matters to discuss the appointment of candidate for Fire Chief. The Council changed venue to Police Station at 132 N. Hill St. Open session resumed at 7:02 p.m. and reconvened to Council Chambers, 136 N. Hill St., Itasca, Texas. The Mayor and City Administrator recommended appointing Wayland Price as the Fire Chief. A motion was made and approved by a 5-0 vote; unanimous vote.

The meeting adjourned at 7:04 p.m.

#### Letter to the Editor



# Remember When . . . "We Made Our Own"



Fifty to eighty years ago and beyond was when we used innovative ideas to aid in our daily lives, and also our amusement. We made our own toys and work related objects to aid in our pleasure and work.

The first work related object that comes to mind was what we called a "King Drag." We usually lived on mud-

dy roads and when it rained we had ruts that were extremely hard and rough when dry. The drag we made was pulled by mules and later tractors. It was constructed of heavy timbers and angle irons with single or double trees to be pulled by mules or a hitch for the tractor. It worked very well to smooth our dirt roads. I can remember that part of the in-



structions to get to our house was, "Turn off the main road!" There were many other innovations and gadgets to help us with the farm work, but let's get to the ones for play; they were more varied and interesting.

Skateboards are popular now, but we had them years ago; although perhaps of a little different construction, homemade of course. We went to the dump ground and found and old discarded pair of skates. Remember the ones that fit over your shoe and had a key, which was a problem if you lost it. We got a 2x4 or a 2x6 about 14 inches long separated the front skate rollers from the back and nailed them to the board, it was now a skate board. Those of us who lived in the country had to wait until we were in town to use them on the sidewalk.



Another popular invention was the skateboard car. It was made the same way except we attached a body to it, usually an apple box. We used tomato cans for headlights and a couple sardine cans painted red for the rear taillights. There were handles or a steering wheel, which was optional. Locomotion was the same as with a regular skateboard.

Another make-believe plaything was a movie camera. We used an old box, attached a crank on the side and used the old tomato cans again for the lens. Then along with the director, we pretended to make westerns like we saw on Saturday afternoon in town.

Another device we came up with that often got us into trouble was the peashooter. The elderberry limb made a good shooter when the pitch was removed. All sorts of "ammunition" was used such as black-eyed peas, pellets from shot gun shells, small round rocks or even ho-

memade darts. My personal favorite was a rubber band to shoot paper wads and paper clips, which was fun when we bounced them off the light reflectors that were in the study hall ceiling of the old three-story school. For that activity, I along with James Weaver and H.C. Baker, received a paddling administered by the then Coach Johnny Naylor. He had a vicious left hook with that paddle.

Another popular toy and weapon was the slingshot. We also hunted with that one. We did an article on the sling shot in a Paw Print Press article in the June 7, 2007 issue. There was a sport we often engaged in that I do not hear of today, and that was fighting bumblebees. We found a nest usually in an old lumber or trash pile and when disturbed they attacked us. We made paddles for the purpose of fighting them. My favorite tool for that purpose was a dry broom weed. We often got stung but it was not a deterrent. We did it again.



Another simple device, especially for younger boys was the tomato-can telephone. We fastened a can to each end of a wire, usually about 50 feet; the length was optional. We could tap on the can and hear the sound on the other end, and of course, we were close enough to converse and pretend it was coming through the line.

Homemade stilts were another plaything we built. It could be as tall as the maker desired. There were many other things we made ourselves such as seesaws, slides, sand beds and the inevitable automobile tire swing, pistols that shot rubber bands and a host of others.


