Over the last several years city officials have worked hard to organize a number of citizen committees that have suggested ordinances and plans that have improved Itasca.

After adopting a Zoning Ordinance several years ago and implementing a Planning and Zoning Committee the city is



starting to see results, since all construction and additions require a permit. The Building Standard Commission is working to make sure that the buildings that are used as habitations are livable. Both of these committees come under the umbrella of the Office of Code Enforcement. One of their biggest contributions to date is making sure that buildings that are uninhabitable are either repaired or torn down and the lot cleaned. That was the case during the last "clean-up" and "free dumping" week when a burned-out home on Minnie Dr. was cleared by the owner and a substandard building on N. King St. was demolished and the lot cleaned.

In the summer, Carter BloodCare also feels the loss of the blood supply normally obtained through high school blood drives. Students who participate in blood drives during the school session can contribute from 12 to 25 percent of the blood collections for Carter BloodCare. When schools are not hosting drives, students can give at a community blood drive like this one or at one of the 27 donor centers located throughout the 56-county collection area for Carter BloodCare.

Potential donors can be 16 years old with a parent's consent; 17-year-olds may donate independently and there is no upper age limit for donating blood. All donors must weigh at least 110 pounds, be in good general health and present a photo ID. Ideally, a donor should also eat a good meal and drink plenty of fluids before giving blood. For more information about donor eligibility, call Carter BloodCare at 1-800-DONATE-4 or visit carterbloodcare.org.

Carter BloodCare's volunteer donors provide lifesaving blood for patients at over 200 health care facilities in 56 counties in North, Central and East Texas. Carter BloodCare is the largest not-for-profit 501(c) (3) community blood center in Texas and is accredited by the American Association of Blood Banks, licensed by the Food and Drug Administration and is a member of America's Blood Centers.

Remember When . . . "The Orphan's Herald" News Items of Yesteryear #2

The following news items were taken from the Presbyterian Children's Home publication "The Orphan's Herald."

April 1934 - All of the seniors, intermediates and staff walked to the top of the hill for an Easter Sunrise Service last Sunday morning. The service was conducted just as the sun came up.

June 12, 1934 - The hay barn on campus was destroyed by fire. We had just finished filling the barn with hay. They said the cause was spontaneous combustion.

June 1934 - The Homes' five senior graduates were entertained with a dinner party at the Johnson Hotel in Hillsboro; also with a picture show party at the Majestic Theater in Dallas.

September 1934 - On the second grade honor roll were Louis Ivey; third grade, Mary Ohler and Dorothy Burke; Sixth grade was Arthur Strickland, Mary Kathryne Strickland, and Mary Sampler

February 1935 - For the last two months we have been killing and canning beef. We killed two of our oldest cows and two steers, we made chili and stew meat of the cows, and roasts from the steers.

June 1935 - The senior class attended the Pastime Theater in Itasca, and saw the movie, "The Little Colonel," with Shirley Temple.

1935, June - Letter to the Editor of the Orphan's Herald.

Dear friends; School will be out tomorrow and we hope we will have some fun this summer. We are always glad when school starts and also when it stops at the end of the school year. The church in the valley is nearly finished but we are out of money. The part that is finished is very pretty. Yours Truly, Arthur Strickland.

Also another letter in the same issue;

Dear Friends; I am in the second grade. I made 100 in spelling today. I have made the honor roll every month so far, and I hope I will next month too. I an eight years old, I have lots of fun out here. My work is churning and dusting the hall. Some of the children got the measles. I had it before I came here. Your Friend, Louis Ivey.

1936 - The sixth graders are going to give a centennial program the 21st. We have drawn the six flags of Texas also the state tree, flower, bird and the Texas nickname, "Tejas," also the Texas emblem texts. We are going to sing; "Beautiful Texas" and "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You." We hope everybody enjoys it, Mollie Wilson.

***I found nothing in the paper that the home kids attended the State Fair in Dallas during the centennial year.

February 1937 - At last! We have a bus. We have always had to travel o places in our farm trucks with no top on them. We were remembered in a will by Mrs. Adie Sloan of San Saba, Texas. Mr. Hawkins contacted Mr. M.J. Neely of the Hobbs MFG. CO. and purchased the bus at wholesale cost. Just before the bus was delivered, Mr. Wimbish, Superintendent of the Itasca Schools picked us up in the Itasca bus and took us to the picture show in town, his treat. We really appreciated that. By Christine Briley.

October 1937 - We have just completed a new milking barn, now we can do the milking out of the weather.

October 1937 - Well trouble! Our well went out yesterday and we had a hard time getting parts and repairing it. We had to go to Fort Worth and also to Waco for parts. We were out of water for a couple or three days. Mr. Tom Jenkins of Files Valley hauled water to us during the repairs. We spent over a hundred for parts; we really needed a bath by the time we got water again. Marvin Alley.

August 1937 - A condensed letter from a visitor to the home;

It was my privilege to spend a recent weekend at the Presbyterian Children's Home in Itasca. I visited Miss Julia Strove with whom I used to teach at the K of P Home. I found the Home in a beautiful place on a hill overlooking a peaceful valley. The breeze is wonderful. Better still to speak of the spiritual breeze of the Home. It is now under the capable management of Nelson and Clara Hawkins who seem wholeheartedly interested in the work and welfare of the children. One cannot help but be impressed with their family life there, which will no doubt be reflected in the lives of the children who seem to be a happy group. If any Texas Presbyterian had an opportunity to visit the Home there, I sincerely believe they would be very happy to have a greater part in contributing to its maintenance; Ruth Edwards - Laredo, Texas.
