# **Trustees Focus on Education IISD Board Attends TASB Institute**

Approximately 2,500 school leaders received training on every facet of effective board governance, heard keynote addresses from noted speakers, and gathered valuable ideas for programs that work.

Topics addressed during the institute included effective community collaborations, college and career readiness, technology trends, dropout prevention, and special education law. Breakout sessions examined social networking, school finance, bullying and gang prevention, facilities management, and the changing face of the Texas labor market.

Thursday's general session featured Manny Medrano, a reporter for KTLA News in Los Angeles and former trial lawyer. He delved into the themes of personal obstacles, the irrepressible human spirit, and the invaluable role of educators and mentors in his own personal and professional growth. Jonathan Kozol, Friday's general session speaker, shared his view on how teachers, given support and encouragement, can help students meet state standards without turning their classrooms into test-prep factories. Kozol is a writer, educator, and activist, best known for his books on public education.

Sessions for newly elected trustees and board presidents offered a combination of both breakout and in-depth formats. New board members focused on basics in district planning and budget, school law, boardsmanship, district policy, teamwork and an introduction to the Texas Open Meetings Act. Board presidents explored meeting preparation, parliamentary procedure, key legal duties, team building and facilitation skills. Not pictured is Angelia Orr who also attended the institute.





## City Hall Soon to Release List of Tardy Taxpayers

The City of Itasca is once again shining the spotlight on businesses and individuals who owe delinquent taxes. According to information received from the city's Tax Collector, Sue Comer, the city of Itasca is once again owed a large amount of back taxes. The names of the delinquent taxpayers will be listed in the Paw Print Press following this notification. These names are being posted under a state law that allows the exposure of tardy taxpayers. To avoid exposure taxpayers should pay their outstanding tax debt or set up an installment plan.

An installment plan is an agreement that is arranged by the city tax collector. The installment plan is paid monthly based upon the agreement between the taxpayer and the tax collector. Besides the unwanted publicity that being on the list can create, the interest and penalties make avoiding payments an unattractive option. That means even when a taxpayer is making monthly payments, the amount that's unpaid gets interest and penalties tacked onto it every month. 

A phrase we hear quite often now that is connected with an object that is thousands of years old, we call it the Irish Potato, when in fact it did not originate with the Irish. It is sometimes referred to as the "Lowly" potato. It is anything but lowly. As a food source on our planet it is the fourth leading food source after corn, wheat and rice.

The potato originated in Peru with the Incas. Besides the potato the land of Peru was responsible for many other food plants such as corn, sweet potato, wild arraches, wild ocas, the allucu, all tubers. Also the yacon, similar to the artichoke. The Peruvians grew many variations of the potato. It is not uncommon for them to have sixteen varieties in the same field. They also have the coco plant and another that we are familiar with is the cotton plant. The tomato with several varieties including the cherry tomato also came from there, and the list goes on.

Gold and silver were not the most valuable product the Spaniards took from Peru. It was the potato and its other plants. Archaeologists have found evidence that the earliest



forms of the potato plant cultivated by humans dates back at least 7000 years. The western world became aware of the potato around the 1540s when the Spanish Conquistadors brought it back with them. They thought it was a kind of truffle, and called it a Tartuffo. The Spanish did not use it much for food. They considered it food for the under classes.

It took nearly four decades for the potato to spread to the rest of Europe. It was introduced in England in 1580 by the adventurer Francis Drake. It was used in Italy around 1600 for human and also for animal consumption. Around 1750 France and Germany promoted the conversion of fallow fields into potato fields. French physician Antoine Parmentier told the nutritional value of the potatoes. Even King Louis XVI promoted the new crop. Queen Marie Antoinette wore a headdress of potato flowers at a fancy dress ball. The potato became widely used in Europe by 1800. In Russia it became a favorite food and today Russians consume more per capita then any other country, an astonishing two pounds per day.

The potato was introduced to Ireland as a garden crop in the late seventeenth century. Ireland had been used to raising cattle started by the British, as they were lovers of beef, which had an impact on the poor people of Ireland. The Irish then turned to the potato. The population became dependent on the potato for survival. Just before 1845 the potato blight hit the crops in Ireland, and from 1845 through 1849 there was a catastrophic failure of the potato crops. About a million Irish people died from famine. The blight spore was carried by the wind and could spread rapidly over wide areas. As a result of the famine vast number of them immigrated to other countries, Britain, Canada and the United States in particular. It was estimated that a million died and million emigrated. In 1883 French botanist Alexander Millardet developed an effective fungicide against the blight.

Although potatoes had been introduced to the United States several times in the 1600s it was not widely known until 1719 when it was planted in Londonderry, New Hampshire by Scottish-Irish emigrants. Potatoes were planted in Idaho as early as 1838 and by 1900 the state's production was one million bushels. The potato is also grown in Texas, Washington, Oregon, Colorado and Maine. The potato is a tuber of solanum tuberosum and is also known as "spud" or just plain "Tater." It comes in several colors, brown, purple, red and white. And as we know it can be cooked in many ways. Frying, boiling, baking, mashed and in many other ways such as from frozen like hash browns. It is high in carbohydrates and vitamin C. Following is a list of the dishes and their origin; AuGratin (France,) Champ (Ireland,) Groshi (Italy,) Potato Pancakes (Hungary,) Potato Chips, Tater Tots (USA,) Rosti (Switzerland) and French Fries, or "Chips" as the British call them.

The United Nations declared 2008 as the "International Year of the Potato." It hoped that greater awareness of the merits of the potato will contribute to the achievement of its millennium development goals by helping to alleviate poverty, improve food security and promote economic development. Now! Do you want fries with that?
