The bonds, and the tax rate necessary to pay those bonds, were approved by the voters of this district.

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.435000. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.435000.

City Hall Soon to Release List of Tardy Taxpayers

The City of Itasca is once again shining the spotlight on businesses and individuals who owe delinquent taxes. According to information received from the city's Tax Collector, Sue Comer, the city of Itasca is once again owed a large amount of back taxes. The names of the delinquent taxpayers will be listed in the *Paw Print Press* following this notification. These names are being posted under a state law that allows the exposure of tardy taxpayers. To avoid exposure taxpayers should pay their outstanding tax debt or set up an installment plan.

An installment plan is an agreement that is arranged by the city tax collector. The installment plan is paid monthly based upon the agreement between the taxpayer and the tax collector. Besides the unwanted publicity that being on the list can create, the interest and penalties make avoiding payments an unattractive option. That means even when a taxpayer is making monthly payments, the amount that's unpaid gets interest and penalties tacked onto it every month. Sawyer, Roy Leslie – Roy Sawyer was born on December 12, 1934 in Corsicana, Texas to Dave and Essie Sawyer. He graduated from Itasca High School in 1953, where he was a 4-year letterman in football, basketball, baseball and track. He attended Tarleton State Junior College on a football scholarship, leading the Plowboys to a championship title. He then attended Trinity University in San Antonio, again on a football scholarship, where he met his college sweetheart, Dorothy Bellos. In January of 1958, he graduated from Trinity and went on to serve in the U.S. Army, where he was stationed at Fort Knox, Kentucky, and retired as a Captain. Upon his return, he married Dorothy on September 13, 1958. Roy taught and coached at Fox Tech High School and Olmos Elementary, before beginning a 22 year career at Robert E. Lee High School. His first year at Lee, he coached all of the freshman sport teams, where the

football team went undefeated, untied and un-scored upon. The basketball team won all except one game, and the track team won the district championship. Over the next several years, Roy served as assistant coach through several momentous occasions including the 1963 Lee vs. Brackenridge regional game dubbed, "The Greatest High School Football Game Ever Played," the 1965 state finalist team and 1969 state finalist team, who the week before the finals, played and won the first high school football game ever played in the Astrodome. He continued as assistant coach through the 1971 state championship title, in the first high school football game ever played in Texas Stadium and the 1972 state semi-finalist team. Roy also coached the THSCA South All-Star Teams in both 1967 and 1973. In 1971 Roy received a Master of Education in Administration from Our Lady of the Lake University. In 1974 Roy was named Head Football Coach and Athletic Coordinator at Lee. In 1975 and 1977 he led the Vols to the state semi-finals, and in 1975 he was named the Express- News Coach of the Year. The 1979 team was the last Lee team to win the district championship. In 1983, Roy was named Coordinator of Blossom Athletic Center in the North East Independent School District, and eventually assumed the duties of Elementary P.E. Coordinator and Assistant Athletic Director.

Roy was also an active member of St. Sophia Greek Orthodox Church, where he enjoyed cooking souvlaki at the annual Greek FUNstival. He retired in 1997 after a 40-year career in education. Through the years, Roy enjoyed hunting and fishing with his friends. Roy spent his retirement with his wife of 52 years, Dorothy, and enjoyed spending time with his children and grandchildren.

On August 7, 2010, Roy passed away peacefully due to complications from Parkinson's disease. Roy was preceded in death by his parents and four siblings. He is survived by his wife Dorothy; daughters, and sons-in-law, Cynthia and Greg Asvestas, and Patricia and Stacy Economides; five grandchildren, Stephanie and Matthew Asvestas and Anastasia, Nicolette and Alexandra Economides; a brother, Don L. Sawyer; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Remember When .. "J. W. Stufflebeme"

To continue our portrayals of prominent and important people who have lived in our area, today I am writing about a person who was a great asset to Itasca and the

whole community. Wallace Stufflebeme loved the people of Itasca and Files Valley. He helped people in many ways that were not known to the public. His benevolence extended to everyone, including the people who worked the crops, picking cotton and other jobs related to the farming industry. He loved agriculture and anything related to it.

J.W. (Wallace) Stufflebeme was born in Brandon, Texas, October 29, 1895. He was the son of Wiley and Ida Bell Stufflebeme, who were tenant farmers. Wallace and the others worked on the farm just like we all did in those days. His parents moved to Itasca when he was a small boy. He attended several schools in the area, and entered Itasca High School as a freshman. Upon graduation, he was Valedictorian of his class. A year later he married Miss Dewey Pritchett of Itasca. Dewey had a brother, Lamar Pritchett who lived next to our farm just south of Itasca. Kenneth Davis now owns the place.


His story is similar to many other young men who had humble beginnings and through diligence and perseverance was able to accomplish worthwhile projects and financial independence. He became interested in cotton seed breeding in the early twenties. He went to state and county fairs for one of the leading seed breeders of that period. In 1925 he studied the process by D.A. Sanders of Greenville, Texas, a famous plant breeder. He easily passed the exam to become a registered cotton seed breeder at Texas A&M. This was during the great depression. Most people thought it was a bad time to go into business because it was during the depression. But he and his brother Bert Stufflebeme went into partnership known as Stufflebeme Brothers Cotton Breeders, Itasca, Texas. Their success now is history.

Mr. Stufflebeme eventually was the owner of the Files Valley Cotton Gin as well as land in Files Valley and other areas around Itasca. Although he was a wealthy man, he was never too busy to listen to and administer to other people. Wallace was dedicated to serving his church, which was the Presbyterian Church in Itasca. He served as Sunday school teacher for a number of years, as well as deacon for several years. He was a Charter member of the Itasca Rotary Club, which formed in 1937, and faithfully practiced the 4-Way Test. Mr. Stufflebeme was elected mayor in 1956 and served eight years in that capacity. I happened to be in Itasca's City administrator at that time and worked with him those eight years. I found him to be dedicated to the betterment of Itasca, serving with honesty and integrity, and ethical management. He said to me many times, "Now we want everything on the up and up," and as us older people know, that means with that kind of dedicated service. We worked together for those eight years with never an argument or a cross word. This kind of management was reflected in the financial health of the city at the time. We bought a fire truck and gave a check for it. We had to dig out leaks with a shovel so a front-end-loader was purchased, also with a check. Then a tractor and mower, all paid for with cash from city funds. Don't you wish you could do that today?

The only vices I can think of Mr. Stufflebeme had was that he loved to go to South West Conference football games, especially to the A&M games. In addition, the yearly Cotton Bowl game was a tradition with him. He also was fond of going out to dinner. Wallace and Dewey Stufflebeme had one son; J.W. Stufflebeme Jr. He attended A&M and became a county agent. He wound up in Brenham, Texas where he married Ruby Lightsey and they also had one son, Kenneth Stufflebeme. Kenneth also attended Texas A&M and served in the military, he came to Itasca to assume operation of his grandfather's business and farms. Kenneth had married Edwina Klatte of Brenham. They still reside in Itasca today. They have two sons, Jim and Mike Stufflebeme. Mr. Wallace Stufflebeme passed away October 8, 1966 and is buried beside Dewey in the Itasca Cemetery. The community lost one of its most faithful boosters with his passing.

Sales Tax Holiday - August 20 – 22 School Clothes & Supplies

Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales taxes on August 20, 21 and 22. Lay-away plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday.

As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers



about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. Backpacks under \$100 and used by elementary and secondary students are also exempt. Last year the Legislature passed HB 1801 that expanded the list of items qualifying for tax exemption during the annual sales tax holiday. In addition to clothes, footwear and some backpacks, Texas families also get a sales tax break on most school supplies priced at less than \$100 purchased for use by a student in an elementary or secondary school. Remember items must be priced less than \$100.
