City Council Passes Ordinance Banning Sales of "K-2" items to under 21 Year Olds

At the August City Council meeting the Council passed an ordinance banning the sale or delivery of smoking materials know as synthetic cannabinoids or salvia divinorum which are frequently known as or marketed as "K-2," "K-2 Summit," "K-2 Sex," "Genie," "Dascents," "Zohai," "Sage," "Spice," "Ko Knock-Out 2," "Spice Gold," "Spice Diamond," "Yucatan Fire," "Solar Flare," "Pep Spice," and "Fire N' Ice" to all individuals below 21 years of age. Many of these items are marketed as incense or herbs, but with a price tag of \$25+ for an ounce, one can quickly see why the items should be questioned for that purpose. These items contain some of the substances or chemicals known as salvia divinorum (plant), CP 47, 497, HU-211, JWH-018, JWH-073 and JWH-081.

The ordinance also banned the sale and possession of items known as "smoking material paraphernalia." The definition of smoking material paraphernalia is an item that is used for or intended to be used in ingesting, inhaling or otherwise introducing an illegal smoking product into the human body. This list includes any type of pipe (with or without a screen) and carburetion tube or mask, among other listed items.



The penalty for the violation of this ordinance is \$500 for each offense. Although the substances listed in the ordinance have not been designated as controlled under the State of Texas or under the laws of the United States, many cities have passed or are in the process of passing ordinances banning their sale, especially to those under the age to purchase alcohol.

The ordinance was passed by an unanimous vote and a motion to waive the second and third readings which puts it into law immediately.

JV Wins Season Opener 18-6



July City Council Minutes

The Itasca City council met in a regular session on Monday, July 19, 2010 in the Council Chambers, 136 N. Hill St., Itasca, Texas. Mayor Pro-tem James Bouldin called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. Members present were Susie Davis, Denis Heyse, Doug Farquhar and John Laird; City Administrator Mark Gropp and City Attorney Stephanie Johnson. Mayor Matthew Fehnel was absent.

City Administrator presented a donation from the city that was accepted by Barbara Petrash for the *Paw Print Press*.

Motions were made and passed to accept the minutes from June 21, 2010 meeting and to approve the payment of the bills as presented.

Monthly department and committee reports were given as by Wayland Price (IVFD), Chief John Griscavage (IPD), Wayne Upchurch (Water/Sewer Operation), Wayland Price (Planning and Zoning Committee, Office of Code Enforcement and Building Standard Commission).

Tony Slider addressed the Council to consider a request regarding holding the 4th Annual Itasca Homecoming Celebration at the Mamie Crouch Park on August 6-7, 2010 from 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. He informed the Council that he needed to make a correction that this is the 4th instead of the 5th Annual Itasca Homecoming Celebration, which was stated on the agenda request form. The request was approved with a unanimous vote.

The Council considered the contract agreement with Hill County Emergency Services District No. 1 (ESD #1) that that the City of Itasca would provide fire department services. The City Attorney stated she was going to suggest making changes to the contract. Fire Chief Wayland Price explained that he attended a meeting with other fire departments in Malone regarding the contract agreement and the County Judge is helping with a new contract. The motion to pass was tabled to wait for the new contract.

The Council discussed approving Resolution No. 071910 that established the Policy and Procedures included in the General Orders Manual for the City of Itasca Police Department. The City Attorney informed the Council that all changes have been made to the draft copy, which she gave to Police Chief John Griscavage in order for him to make the changes. The Council's vote was tabled until the August meeting.

The Council voted to raise the water rates by two percent to cover the cost of production. The meeting was open for general Mayor, Council and City administrator discussion and reports. There was a discussion about the sale of K-2 in the city. The City Administrator was instructed by the Council to get with the City Attorney to create an ordinance that controlled the age limit of sales of K-2 incense and similar products to persons under 21 years of age.

The meeting adjourned at 6:31 p.m.

The board entered executive session at 7:25 p.m. and reconvened into open session at 7:40 p.m. a motion was passed to hire Rachel Dyer, Garrett Dyer, and Krista Weaver for 2010-11. The meeting adjourned at 7:41 p.m.


