The Jim Cullum Jazz Band plays jazz in the classic manner, the style of small, hot ensembles prior to WWII. The band's repertoire covers a lot of ground - from 19th century cakewalks to the small pre-war Benny Goodman ensembles. The core of the band's music consists of the sounds of Jelly Roll Morton, Original Dixieland Jazz Band, New Orleans Rhythm Kings, King Oliver Creole Jazz Band, Louis Armstrong, and Sidney Bechet, as well as a heavy emphasis on Bix Beiderbecke and Hoagy Carmichael. In keeping with the band's historical point of view, period instruments and performance practices are often used and each member of the band is a specialist in historically informed jazz styles.

The Jim Cullum Jazz Band has appeared in such major venues as Carnegie Hall, Kennedy Center, Wolf Trap, major worldwide jazz festivals, and stars in its own public radio series, Riverwalk Jazz, broadcasting since 1987, heard on over 150 Public Radio stations nationwide and on the internet. From 1993-2005, the Jim Cullum Jazz Band was on the faculty of the Stanford Summer Jazz Workshop and, in April 2007, completed an epic tour of Russia that took them from Moscow to eastern Siberia and back west to the Baltic Sea.

This will be an outstanding evening of classic jazz, appealing to audiences of all ages. Even those who have heard this group before will be treated to a fresh evening of music as, true to the improvisatory spirit of jazz, this group never plays their repertoire the same twice. Wampus Cats Go 2-0 with 40-13 Win over Rice

The Wampus Cats kicked off on Patton Field to the Rice Bulldogs to start their first home game of the season last Friday night. The Cats had come out of last week's win over Ranger with confidence, but also with areas that needed improvement. They worked hard all week on squelching the turnovers that had plagued them against Ranger.

Quarterback #15 Opie Mayberry led his offense during the first quarter to an 8-0 lead. Carrying the ball in for the touchdown was #22 Jonathan "Fantastic" Frederick, followed by #2 Shakeal "Speedy" Mozon's two-point conversion.

The second quarter started off exciting for the Itasca fans as Mozon returned a punt for a TD, but they were disappointed as it was called back on a penalty. The crowd did not stay down long as Mozon quickly came back with 44-yard touchdown run.

"Fantastic" Frederick lived up to his nickname as he crossed the goal line two more times for TDs. One of the scores was 80 yards of spectacular agility, broken tackles and incredible speed. The Cats' defense led by BJ :the Bruiser" Jackson held strong, preventing a field goal attempt and ending the half with the only interception of the game, made by Mozon. The Cats went into the locker room up 28-0 over the Dogs.

Frederick and Mozon both added another TD each to the scoreboard in the second half. Although the Dogs were down 40-0 they did not quit, they ran the ball back 75 yards for a touchdown from a kickoff and then scored again with the point after good to put the score: 40-13.

The Wampus Cat defense very near dominated the field. The entire game was filled with big hits and tackles all around, sacks made by #62 Jack Panting and #9 Martel Wallace and a forced fumble by Wallace. The Cats' defense held the Dogs to 156 rushing yards and zero passing yards.

They will meet the Tolar Rattlers on Patton Field next Friday night (September 10) after a bye week.

2010 Property Tax Rates in City of Itasca

This notice concerns 2010 property tax rates for City of Itasca. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's *effective* tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's *rollback* tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

Remember When .. "The Coffee Break"

The coffee bean goes back as far as the 13th century. There are conflicting stories about its origin. Some think that Ethiopian ancestors of today's Aromo people were the first to discover the energizing effect of the coffee bean plant. Some think it was not known about prior to the 17th century. Another story tells of an Ethiopian goat herder who noticed his goats eating the berry. He tried it and coffee came from that. There is credible evidence however, that coffee drinking appeared in the middle of the 15th century in



the Sufi monasteries of Yemen. It is said that it was here that the first coffee beans where roasted and brewed. By then it had reached the rest of the Middle East, Persia, Turkey, Northern Africa, then spread to Italy, the rest of Europe and then to Indonesia and America.

It is believed that the word coffee entered the English language in 1598 via the Dutch word, koffie. This word was created from the Turkish word, kabue. Another possible origin of the name is the Kingdom of Kaffa in Ethiopia where some said the coffee plant originated. Some refer to it as Java because of the plants expansion to Brazil and the Island of Java.

During World War I, the Americans had been accustomed to drinking the brew at home so they had coffee in the mess halls and in their ration packs. The term "Cup of Joe" came from G.I. Joe who always had to have his cup of coffee. Coffee is important to the world economy. It is one of the most valuable primary products in world trade. In many years, it was only secondary to oil as a source of foreign exchange for producing countries. Coffee is a traded commodity on major futures and commodity exchanges; most important in London and New York.

The coffee filter was invented by a German housewife. She first used her son's school blotting papers, but later she and her husband Hugo came up with the coffee filter in 1908. In 1901, a Japanese American chemist developed instant coffee. In 1938, Nescafe, a freeze-dried coffee came along. The Maxwell House slogan "Good to the Last Drop" was a registered trademark.

Coffee drinking has not always had smooth sailing in its history. In earlier days, there was some controversy about it. In some places, women were banned from drinking coffee such as in Europe and England. In Germany, they had free access to coffee and places that served it. In 1674, an anonymous "women's petition" against coffee was declared. It stated, "the excessive use of abominable, heathenish liquor called coffee has eunuched our husbands and crippled our kind gallants," I doubt that petition had much success.

The practice of so-called "Coffee Breaks" is claimed by many sources or business, but actually it was started more or less simultaneously by more than one. In 1901, a Buffalo, New York company shows a ledger entry for free coffee for its employees. In 1902, the Barcolo Mfg. Co. negotiated a short break with its employees. One source states that in the late 19th century in Stoughton, Wisconsin the wives of Norwegian immigrants originated a coffee break. The city celebrates this every year with the Stoughton Coffee Break Festival.


Today a coffee break is written into some Union contracts. Most companies have come to realize that the coffee break with free coffee is a valuable low cost benefit. The break practice has many descriptions over the globe. In England it is called the "Elevenses," morning tea; not to be confused with "High Tea" which is a social event for them. In Australia and New Zealand they call it the "Smoko."

There is another ritual connected to coffee that is not considered a coffee break, but a social gathering of mostly retired men. Each morning, and sometimes again in the afternoon, we gather at a café, convenient store or other place to socialize, discuss politics, religion and other subjects. These men really look forward to the meetings and to most, it is the highlight of the day, something to look forward to each day. It is especially valuable to retired men who might not have anything else. In many cases, it eliminates boredom and depression. Sometimes the discussions might become rather heated, but a difference of opinion is universal wherever you are.

Here in Itasca the guys gather at Jimmy's Corner Store. When we leave the house we tell the spouse, "we're going to coffee, or simply I am going to Jimmy's."
