## Go Texan/Cotton Pickin' Fair

This year's edition of the Go Texan/Cotton Pickin' Fair will be held this weekend in Hillsboro. The 100 and 200 blocks of East Franklin Street will be the location for the activities. Included at this year's event are a state-championship barbecue cook-off, washers, arts and crafts, Go Texan and open horseshoes, flea market, special entertainment, antique farm equipment, doubles' dominoes and motorcycle ride.

Being sanctioned as a Go Texan county automatically qualifies a Hill County senior for a $\mathbf{\$ 1 5 , 0 0 0}$ scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Association (HLSRA). Scholarships to local seniors have totaled over $\mathbf{\$ 2 0 0 , 0 0 0}$ since the county was sanctioned by HLSRA 19 years ago. All proceeds from this year's event benefit the Go Texan Scholarship Fund.

Setup for the barbecue cook-off starts at 3 p.m. Friday, September 24, in the 200 block of East Franklin Street.
A kids' pork chop cook-off will be held Friday evening. Pork chops will be provided at $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and turn in will be at $7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Winners will be announced prior to the cooks' meeting and Calcutta at 8 p.m. in Historic City Hall.
Judging Saturday in the cook-off will be as follows: chicken-noon, pork spareribs-1:30 p.m., brisket-3 p.m. and Go Texan division-chicken-3:30 p.m. Awards will be presented through 10 places in each of the cook-off categories.

## American Red Cross Helping <br> American Red Cross <br> Rear Cl Tenss Nous Cher <br> Flood Victims

In an effort to survey the destruction left behind by Tropical Storm Hermine, American Red Cross Damage Assessment teams have fanned out across Bell and Hill counties for the past several days. With Damage Assessment 90\% complete, the results are that 184 homes were affected in Bell and Hill Counties.
"Of the 184 affected, 48 were destroyed or rendered uninhabitable for an extended period of time," said Sandra Henderson, chief executive officer, American Red Cross Heart of Texas Chapter. "That's nearly $\mathbf{1 5 0}$ people who have no place to call home now and that's why the Red Cross is doing all we can to help. An additional 20 homes had not been assessed because of high water and dangerous road conditions at the release of this article. Displaced families in Red Cross shelters are guaranteed a safe place to stay and daily meals until a safe place to stay has been found."

Clean-up kits that contain squeegees, mops, buckets, rubber gloves and bleach are being distributed in the affected neighborhoods so that families can salvage what was left behind. Many times we do not realize that a flood carries away everything you own, including what you need to begin clearing away the debris. The distribution of supplies will continue.

American Red Cross caseworkers have begun the task of meeting one-on-one with affected families. The Red Cross will help the family with the means to purchase groceries, new clothing, new shoes and also help them find a new place to call home. Continued on page 6.

## Domino Tourney - Go Texan/Fair

A doubles' domino tournament will be part of the 2010 Go Texan/Cotton Pickin' Fair. It will get underway at 10 a.m. Saturday, September 25, at Historic City Hall in the $\mathbf{1 0 0}$ block of East Franklin Street. Top-finishing Hill County participants will advance, along with washer and horseshoe winners, to Houston once again.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Association will host the horseshoe, washer and domino tournaments and team-penning event at the Katy Equestrian Center in February.

Entry fee for the tournament will be $\mathbf{\$ 1 0}$ per team.


Recently there have been several inquires about the Files Valley Presbyterian Church. Some did not know that the church burned once and that the church is no longer in existence, or what happened to it. So this seems to be a good time for a column on the church.
In 1846, David Files, his brother and their families came to Hill
 County and settled in Files Valley. But at that time the place was called Eureka Valley. In November, 1879 the name of Files Valley was established. David and his family were Presbyterian and it wasn't long before they decided to establish a church there. So in 1848, a church was organized. They started a fundraising campaign. They were holding services in the school building at that time, and did so again later while another church was being built. I have no record of just when the building was constructed but it must have been around 1850. Records show that another and larger church was built in 1878 and another in 1898.

On December 25, 1933 the church burned. It started from a house fire nearby, spread to the tabernacle at the back of the church and then to the church. The piano, a few pews and the pulpit were saved. Its destruction was a hard blow to the Valley community and the Presbyterian Children's Home, who attended services there. The insurance amounted to $\$ 2,425$ and they estimated a new building would cost about $\$ 10,000$. The people in the valley could not contribute much since it was during the great depression. So it was necessary that friends over the Synod help with re-building. The building committee consisted of Rev. H.W. Allen, Pat E. Hooks, Mrs. J.E. Watts, Julia Stallworth, Rev. C.B. Yeargan, W.D. Wood, W.P. McEver, Roy McKey, L.S. Files and H. Westberry. The church seemed to prosper for almost twenty years and then attendance began to fall off. Sensing that the church would fail, the Presbyterian Home wanted to come to the Itasca Church.

The Itasca Cumberland Presbyterian Church was organized in 1884 by Rev. J.W. Lackey. On November 14, 1886, Rev. Lackey was hired for one fourth of his time for $\$ 125$ a year. At first they met in the Itasca school for worship while the church was being built. A bell was purchased which is still in use today. At that time the building cost $\mathbf{\$ 8 , 0 0 0}$. There was also a Eureka Presbyterian Church and one at Osceola; they gradually assimilated into the Itasca Church.

In 1954, the subject was broached that the Files Valley Church unite with the Itasca Church. It was decided at the time to try to continue in Files Valley. Mr. A.C. Bridges was called as a pastor at the time. Rev. Wilson Keenan was serving the Itasca Church. Sometime later Mr. Bridges resigned to take a church in Mississippi. The union matter was again brought before the bodies concerned. After several meeting of the official boards a request was made to Central Texas Presbyterian resulting in the union of the two churches.

Rev. Wilson Keenan and Sidney J. Files represented the session of the First Church and elders Delford Williamson and Jim Gillespie represented the Session of the Files Valley Church. By mutual agreement the Files Valley Church was to convey to the First Presbyterian Church of Itasca all properties and records to dissolve the Files Valley Presbyterian Church, effective March 21, 1958. The request was granted and as of midnight March 21, 1958 the Files Valley Presbyterian Church will go out of existence as a separate body.

It was sad to see the church cease to be because of its great influence on the community. Part of the glue that holds a community together is its churches. The other churches in the Valley had gone long before. Although the two church groups had worshipped together many times, now for the first time they would worship together as one body. Leaders from both churches were elected to carry on the program of the now united church body.

With the demise of the church, the only businesses left in the Valley were the Stufflebeme Gin and the general store operated by Sue Files, daughter of Malcolm Files.
