Early Voting begins October 18 Adams Pulls out of JP Race

Voters can cast their ballots in the 2010 election beginning Monday, October 18. Early voting polls are located in the basement of the Hill County Courthouse in Hillsboro. They are open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday until October 29.

With the cancelation of both the City of Itasca and IISD 2010 elections, citizens of Itasca are focusing on the Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace race which pitted Republican Rodney Adams against Democrat Karen Farquhar and the District Clerk race where Itascan Angelia Orr is challenging incumbent Charlotte Barr for the position.

In a surprising announcement to *The Hillsboro Reporter* last week, Rodney Adams said that he was pulling out of the JP race and would stop all campaigning. His name will still appear on the ballot as he made the decision after the August 24 deadline for removing it, and if he receives the majority of votes, a replacement will be appointed by the Hill County Commissioners Court.

Democrat candidate Karon Farquhar has continued to campaign vigorously after being approached by the party following JP Tanya Seaman's disqualification.

The Itasca city election was canceled after no one filed to oppose James Bouldin for the mayor position and Denis Heyse and John "Skipper" Laird for their council seats. Three seats were up for grabs on the HSD Board of Trustees. Filling those seats will be incumbents Angelia Orr and Oscar Castillo, and newcomer Brian Payne.







My goal is to microfilm the records from 1870's to 1969, which are currently in the archives. I have also implemented Idocket.com to research the case indexes from 1991 to present. I embrace all advancements in technology that the county provides to better serve me, the attorneys, and court system. I am passionate about my duties to this office.
