biggest difference in my life. They went though so much it is hard for me to even imagine."


A fire recently destroyed the Bell's home.

October City Council Meeting

The Itasca City Council met for its regular session October 16, 2006. Present were Mayor David Heald, Steve Solis, James Bouldin, Susie Davis, John Laird and Harvey Wilson. Motions were made and passed to approve the minutes of the September 18, 2006 meeting & for payment of bills.

Giving their monthly reports were Fire Chief Chris Shuffield, Water & Sewer Operations Manager Todd Williams, Zoning Committee President Matt Fehnel (approved applications for 104, 105, 110, 112 Grayson, 608 Milford & 106 Weaver – denied application at 815 Shuttle), Chief of Police John Griscavage and Code Enforcement Officer Felicia Mayberry.

The Council discussed a loan of \$60,000 for maintenance and or improvements to the sewer plant with Todd Williams. He reported that a wheel is down at the sewer plant (it has had extensive repair work done on it in the past three years). He suggested purchasing new aerators instead of putting more money into the repair of the wheel. A motion was made and passed to purchase two installed 25 HP House Units for \$63,930 and to give the City Administrator the authority to negotiate a bank loan for the project.

City Administrator Mark Gropp requested that the committee appointed to decide on a schedule of fees for the Zoning Ordinance could have only one council member. Motion was passed to keep Susie Davis on the committee and drop John Laird. Fehnel addressed the Council concerning the denial of the application at 815 Shuttle. The application did not meet Zoning guidelines on a technicality; it recommended approving the application. Council voted to approve the building of a Jim Walters' Home at that location. Barbara Petrash's resignation from the Planning and Zoning Committee was accepted & the Council thanked Ms. Petrash for her service. An application to fill the vacancy was accept (Martin Carranza).

Gandolf Burrus reported on the proposals received in connection with the City's 2006 Community Development Block Grant #726281 for sewer system improvements. The Council passed a motion to accept Grant Development Services Letter of Agreement for Administration Management Services for the grant. Frank Rasor gave the engineering firm proposals in connection with the grant. A motion was passed to accept Rasor & Associates, LLC Letter of Agreement for Engineering Services.

In the open meeting discussion by the Mayor, Council and City Administrator the need to repair Spurgeon Street and the replacing of the stop/yield sign at the intersection of S. College and E. Adams was addressed. The meeting adjourned at 6:51 p.m.

November City Council Meeting

The Itasca City Council met for its regular session November 20 16, 2006. Present were Mayor David Heald, Steve Solis, James Bouldin, Susie Davis, John Laird, Harvey Wilson, City Attorney Stephanie Johnson and City Administrator Mark Gropp. Motions were made and passed to approve the minutes of the October 16, 2006 meeting & for payment of bills.

Giving their monthly reports were Fire Chief Chris Shuffield, Water & Sewer Operations Manager Todd Williams, Zoning Committee President Matt Fehnel (approved applications for 3900 FM 934, 903 S. Hill, 211 Jones, 1500 E. Main, 200 S. Park, 815 Shuttle and Grayson) turned over chairmanship to Bettye Lewis. Chief of Police John Griscavage (the Department has received \$500 in seized money) and Code Enforcement Officer Felicia Mayberry.

The official canvass of return votes from the November 7, 2006 Municipal Election were: Mayor-Raymond Arellano 137, Mayor-Matt Fehnel 210, Alderman-John Wayne Laird "Skipper" 235, Alderman-Harvey Wilson 242.

Mayor Matt Fehnel, incumbent council members John Wayne Laird "Skipper" and Harvey Wilson were sworn in and Susie Davis was elected Mayor Pro-Tem.

A motion was made and passed to open a Special Revenue Fund in the Municipal Treasury to be known as the Seizure and Forfeiture Fund.

A motion was passed to scheduling the Regular Council Meeting in December to December 11, 2006.

The Council entered executive session at 6:28 p.m. and returned to open session at 6:39 p.m. with no action taken.

In the open meeting discussion by the Mayor, Council and City Administrator the question arose on why the election had been moved to November from May. It was explained that having the City election at the same time as the National election was more cost effective than having separate elections.

The meeting adjourned at 6:47 p.m.

Do You Remember . . . ? – "Smoking: Past & Present"




People have been using tobacco in one form or another for hundreds of years. Some say for thousands of years. It is said that Columbus carried tobacco back to Europe when he found it growing and used in Cuba. When the pilgrims came to America, they discovered that the Native Americans were using tobacco, and that states such as North Carolina and Virginia were good areas for its production.

In the late twenties and thirties, we began to take notice that tobacco might be detrimental to one's health, but it was not taken seriously then. Most people smoked, dipped or chewed. Our grandmothers dipped snuff such as Copenhagen or Levi Garrett. Young people were forbidden to use tobacco, but we did it anyway. It was ironic that the people that forbade us to use it were users themselves. We used innovative ways to indulge smoking: discarded butts, coffee grounds, cotton leaves, seeds from a plant called sour dock and even sections of dried cornstalks that were smoked like a cigar. Usually the first time we smoked, we became ill but this was seldom a deterrent.

Some of us preferred a pipe and again we had to improvise. The corncob made a very good pipe. We cut it to the desire of length, hollowed out the center with a pocketknife and for the stem; we got a small twig from the Box Elder tree. It had pith in the center so we ran a wire through, and Presto! We had a stem. Here again we used substitute tobacco such as cedar bark and coffee, but avoid the drip grind because it will go through and be sucked down your throat.



One of the most popular tobaccos was "Bull Durham." It was a dry granular tobacco you had to roll by hand. We pinched the ends after licking the paper to make it stick, because the paper was not gummed. Some could roll with



one hand and myth has it that a real cowboy could roll it with one hand while riding a bucking horse. Bull Durham came in a tightly packed muslin bag about the size of a cigarette package with a black label. There were two red packets of cigarette papers underneath the label. Printed on the label was a picture of a Durham Bull. It stated, "Genuine Durham Smoking Tobacco, W.T. Blackwell & Co. Durham, N.C." Attached to one of the yellow drawstrings was a paper disc about the size of a quarter with a bull on it. A common practice was to let the tag hang out as a sort of status symbol.

About this time, someone, I think it was "Bugler," invented a cigarette-rolling machine. Now we country boys could have our own ready rolls. The tobacco was shredded to make it easier to roll. There were other brands beside Bugler, such as Kite Mentholated. The self-rolling practice went out of style somewhat just before World War II and then came back for a short period after the war.

The popular brands went to war. There was Lucky Strike, Camels, Chesterfield and Phillip Morris. They were replaced at home with Viceroy, Winston and Kent. Most of us remember the old saying "Lucky Strike green has gone to war!" They said the paint was needed for camouflage, when in fact I think they decided it was time to change the package and white was more attractive.

About the time of the Korean War, Bull Durham somehow became less popular, and it was hard to find. Eventually it faded out of the picture and Bull Durham lovers had to find other brands such as Golden Grain, R.J.R or other types such as Bugler. We seldom see anyone rolling their own cigarettes today. Everything now is easy, instant or disposable. It was said that leisurely rolling a smoke had a calming effect and helped cut down on chain smoking.

Getting back to the earlier days before World War II. There was very little opposition to smoking; most everyone used tobacco in one form or another. When we watched movies or "picture shows" as we called it, we saw that most of the stars almost invariably had a cigarette in their hand. I remember only one woman who smoked when I was young. She was the mother of a friend of mine; she smoked Bull Durham. She was Mrs. Tom Tidwell whose husband delivered ice in Itasca.

As stated before as young folks we were forbidden to use tobacco. The only time I can remember my father administering corporal punishment to me was when someone told him I was smoking. He said he did not whip me for smoking, but for lying about it (yeah, right).

Soldiers were issued cigarettes during World War II. As we know, smoking is forbidden in lots of place and the practice is growing. It looks like tobacco might be a thing of the past, and then older folks will have something else to be nostalgic about. I wonder how many of us remember Franklin Roosevelt with his long cigarette holder or General Douglas Macarthur with his big corn cob pipe or Phil Harris' song "Smoke, Smoke, Smoke That Cigarette"
