The Board of Trustees of the Itasca Independent School District met in regular session on Monday, January 08, 2007 in the Itasca ISD Administration Building at 7:00 P.M., President Marquita Lloyd presiding. ## **Do You Remember . . . ? – "The Woodburning Cookstove"**



I guess nothing in history has been more closely associated with the home and family than the old-fashioned wood cook stove. One could even say that it was the heart of the home. In many cases it was the home heating system. In many homes the kitchen also served as the family room. The room was very large and was used as the dining room as well. It had a large pantry, where not only foodstuff was kept, but kitchen utensils and the butter churn. The churn in early days was

made of wood, like a barrel, later it was crock.

In some cases water was piped from the windmill to the kitchen and a homemade sink was installed, which also served as a bathroom. I remember my father shaving over the sink with a little round mirror hanging above. He used the old straight razor with the razor "strop" hanging



The kitchen table was made of 1x12 boards, and in earlier years the "chairs" may have been nail kegs which were preceded by the cane bottom chairs. There was an old oak icebox, also, and when we went to town on Saturday we bought a fifty-pound block of ice back, which usually lasted about three days.

Getting back to the cook stove, my grandmother had a "Home Comfort Range." There were other brands such as Heartland, the Canadian brand, The Enterprise, Elmira Appliances and others.

I had an uncle who traveled the western states selling the Home Comfort Range. He and my aunt loved to travel, so they enjoyed the work. Traveling salesmen in those days were called "drummers." I can remember when they were in Itasca late, they stayed at the old Watelsky hotel, Mrs. Vernon's or the Ross Hotel. We kids liked to listen to the tales they told us about the country they had traveled in and a few other stories that we knew were tall tales, but we enjoyed them anyway. After listening to them, some of the young men might have decided to become a drummer rather than a fireman or train engineer.

As the old saying goes "a person hasn't lived unless he has tasted food cooked in the old wood range." It had a large oven in the middle and a firebox with an ash unit underneath that. Many models had a hot water reservoir on one side. The hot water was used on Saturday when we took our bath before going to town. In summer we used a shower rigged underneath the windmill tank. Usually a large porcelain coffee pot was going with its whistling and other noises. It was speckled blue, like a robin's egg. There was a large box behind the stove for wood which seemed to be in constant need of filling, especially in winter when it was used as a family room where we all did our school lessons at night with the aid of a coal oil lamp. If you happen to have an old lamp, turn off your electric lights, use the old lamp and see how it was to study or read by it

The kerosene stove followed the old wood-burning stove. It was one of the worst cooking devices invented because, quite often the food tasted like kerosene. Next came the natural gas stove which was a vast improvement. Still, nothing compares to the food quality of the old wood range.

I can still smell the fresh loaves of yeast bread from the oven. I especially liked the golden crusty ends buttered with homemade peach preserves and the light flaky biscuits with Brer Rabbit syrup, or homemade sorghum molasses. My grandmother's specialty was what she called "tea cakes," a large soft cookie made with sorghum molasses. Therefore, the memory still lingers of the good food, the good times and the closeness of the family living as it was then.


