If you are going to follow the tradition, be sure to order them at least a week ahead of time, and that they coordinate with your ensemble. Formally, boutonnieres should be placed on the left lapel on the guy's jacket and the corsage on the girl's left wrist. Be sure to pick them up at least the day before, and keep them refrigerated.
**Prom Tip \#6: If you do decide to get them, be sure to order and pick up boutonnieres and corsages on time.
**Prom Tip \#7: Keep them refrigerated until prom.
