Itasca ISD employees, IISD Trustees, citizens of Itasca, daughter Julie Freeman and Representative Diane Patrick (District 94) joined to celebrate the retirement of Dr. E. Ray Freeman and Mrs. Roma Freeman. Rep Patrick presented Dr. Freeman with a resolution on behalf of the State, honoring him for his years of service to the schoolchildren of Texas and in particular those of

IISD. The resolution read:

Whereas, Dr. E. Ray Freeman is stepping down from his position as superintendent of the Itasca Independent District in 2007, bringing to a close a distinguished career in education that has spanned more than three decades; and (remainder of resolution on page 3)

Dr. Patrick has a strong background in education - she not only taught school, she served as a board member of Arlington ISD for 11 years. (including board president). She was also on the State Board of Education for 4 years. Until becoming an elected official for the state last year, she taught graduate education courses at The University of Texas at Arlington for many years. The courses she taught provided training for graduate education students seeking to become administrators. Her dedication to public education is evident and she takes great pride in



serving on both the House Committees on Public Education and Higher Education. She helped pass several bills this session to improve school safety and ensure that unfunded mandates were not passed down to the school districts. Public Education is a priority of Representative Patrick and she is proud to help honor others who dedicate their lives to this common goal.

The Freemans received a number of gifts from the faculty including two yard loungers and a gift card to spend on their trip to England this summer. The Board of Trustees presented Dr. and Mrs. Freeman with an engraved clock praising and thanking them for their hard work and dedication to the district.

Under Freeman's leadership, the district has seen many educational and physical improvements. During the last ten years, the district and its campuses have earned and maintained the ratings of either "exemplary" or "recognized." This was accomplished while having to meet all criterions (no exemptions for low percentage) of the worksheets. He also secured or helped to secure funding for the Special Events Center, the Wilson Education and Technology Center and the Itasca Depot Heritage Education Center. After passing a bond the first phase of the Middle School was build but the second phase was built without incurring any additional debt.

"I am honored to finish my education career at Itasca," Freeman said. "The formula for Itasca's success was simple. Hire and keep the best staff possible and then allow them to do their job. I must say, thank you staff, for always making me look good."

Many citizens and employees wrote letters and verbally thanked the Freemans for their work at Itasca.

"Itasca parents can be proud," Revitalization President Betty Sumner said, "that their school measures up to and in most cases surpasses any district in the state, regardless of their financial situation. It has been Dr, Freeman's dedication to this community that is responsible for many improvements including the establishment of a newspaper."

Whereas, Passionate in his belief that all children are deserving of equal opportunities to learn, Dr. Freeman serves as regional director of the board of the Equity Center and was chair of the Alvarado Plaintiffs, a group of school districts, parents, and students championing the cause of equitable school finance; he also helped to establish the Texas Association of Rural Schools and has served as the organization's president; and

Whereas, Young people are the Lone Star State's most precious resource, and those Texans who devote themselves to their education are truly deserving of our profound gratitude and admiration; Dr. Freeman has served Itasca ISD with integrity and dedication, earning the lasting respect of his staff and students, and it is a pleasure to commend him for his outstanding career; now, therefore, be it

Honor Our Nation This Flag Day

"A thoughtful mind, when it sees a nation's flag, sees not the flag only, but the nation itself..."

-Henry Ward Beecher, The National Flag, 1861

On June 14, 1777, in order to establish an official flag for a new nation, the Continental Congress passed the Flag Act stating: "Resolved that the flag of the United States be made of thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." Flag Day, on June 14, the anniversary of that Flag Resolution of 1777, was officially established by the Proclamation of President Woodrow Wilson on May 30, 1916. And on August 3, 1949, President Truman signed an Act of Congress designating June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.

In my view, it is appropriate that the House of Representatives amend the Constitution of the United States to prohibit the desecration of the American flag. In this session of Congress, I am proud to have co-sponsored legislation, House Joint Resolution 12, which would achieve this goal. A constitutional amendment must be passed by two thirds of both Houses of Congress and then be ratified by three quarters of the states.

My reverence for the First Amendment to the Constitution and the freedom of speech that it guarantees is second to none and I believe very strongly in a citizen's right to express his or her beliefs and opinions, no matter how unpopular. This right sets America apart from most other countries on earth. However, I do not believe that burning or otherwise desecrating our national symbol is a legitimate expression of free speech. I think individuals must consider the adverse impact of their actions on their fellow citizens and society as a whole.

I have the honor and responsibility to represent tens of thousands of veterans, service men and women and their families who have devoted themselves to serving our nation during peacetime and wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Vietnam, Korea, and World War II. When America's liberty, national security or national interests have been threatened, I have seen these brave men and women leave their homes and families to fight in foreign lands. And, I have seen them come home, some in coffins draped with our flag. Having seen this, I cannot condone any behavior that shows disrespect to our flag and all it represents. The U.S. Supreme Court may equate flag desecration with free speech. I respectfully disagree. The American flag is a symbol of what we are and who we are. It deserves to be honored and protected from desecration.
