



With the combination of irresponsible pet owners and the absence of a county animal shelter, there is no place to take these unwanted "strays." This results in the dumping of puppies and dogs in rural areas, which fuels our county's pet overpopulation issue-worsening the existing health, economic, legal and safety liabilities. The "dumper" simply makes his problem someone else's problem. The question I can't seem to answer after hours of thinking about it is, what kind of person can take a litter of puppies that are barely weaned and drop them off on a country road and really expect them to survive? This question burns in my head daily and I will truly never understand it. Even if the person tries to explain it to me, I will never waiver because they are taking the cowards way out and not accepting responsibility that they are the source of the problem we have in Hill County. I can't stress enough to the "dumper" that until this stops and people get their pets spaved and neutered and everyone pitches in and helps Hill County Paw Pals raise more money to get this county animal shelter built, the problem is only going to get worse. Please, help us stop this neglect and abuse and do everything you can to make a change for Hill County. I am proud of this county and it is my home and I would not want to live any where else, but I think we all can do a better job of caring and taking responsibility. It is up to all of us and the time has come to make a change and we can do it with everyone pitching in. We need this animal shelter desperately and we can make the hard work we have all done over the past three years a reality, but it will take everyone to make it happen. Please, help us in our endeavors of raising this money to go towards this muchneeded shelter for Hill County. I do believe we will see a big difference in the numbers of dumped and unwanted dogs if there is a place to be able to take unwanted dogs, instead of dumping them like unwanted trash in the country.

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Do You Remember ...? – "A Stroll Back in Time"

For a moment let's think back in time before the internet, Sega, Super Nintendo, crack, meth, or weed. Way back like sitting on the curb or front porches, playing hide and seek, "Simon Says" or red light-green light. So let's remember . . . when it was considered a real treat to be taken out to dinner with your parents at a real restaurant, when the worst thing you did at school was play hooky, chew gum or flunk a test. When they threatened to keep a kid back a grade if they failed and did! The prom was in the gym or lunchroom with a real live orchestra, when being sent to the principal's office was second to what you would receive at

home.

We feared for our lives, but it wasn't from drive by shootings, drugs or gangs, our parents and grandparents were a much greater threat. But we survived because their love was much greater than the threat. Remember our lunch boxes and thermoses or going home for lunch or a hamburger at Mrs. Morris' little store on campus, or our lunch carried in a brown paper bag, also penny candy, butterscotch, or a Black Cow or Eskimo Pie? Cracker Jacks with a prize inside, wax lips and mustaches, hula-hoops and coke bottles with the names of cities on the bottom. Then there were saddle shoes and penny loafers, and poodle skirts.

Also we remember that mom was home when we came home from school, most times she had a snack for us, if not we punched a hole in a biscuit with a finger and filled to with Mary Jane syrup. Then there was our allowance usually a quarter for the week; however, we could buy a hamburger and coke and attend the picture show all for that quarter. Then we would reach down in the gutter for a penny. I still do.

It was about this time that mom wore nylons that came in two pieces. The male teachers wore neckties and the female teachers wore high heels. A little further back, the female teachers were not allowed to marry and had to live in the town where they taught. Then most teachers were women and almost always boarded with a family in the community.

What about bobby pins, Mickey Mouse clubs, Rocky and Bullwinkle, Kookla Faun and Ollie, Spin and Marty. Dick Clark's American Band Stand and don't forget Ready Kilowatt. When we turned on the black and white TV, it took five minutes to warm up so we could see Fibber McGee and Molly, the first soap, Stella Dallas, Amos and Andy, Bing Crosby, Jackie Gleason, and Perry Como.

We also had kids with lemonade stands, played Cowboys and Indians with cap pistols, made forts and tree houses, had pillow fights, ribbon candy and hung angel hair on the Christmas tree. When ladies wore white glove and hats to church or to the Ladies Aid Society. We went to the "picture show" on Saturday and there was a serial that always ended with a cliffhanger so we would want to see it next week to see if the train ran over the heroine. After the show we might have a nickel for a coke at Barney Martins' Canteen in the old Pastime Theater.

The movies bring memories of popcorn, then popcorn balls we made at home with syrup or caramel. Christmas trees decorated with popcorn strings. Then came the sock hops, Keds and PF flyers, the sneakers we wore for the gym and those awful outfits the girls wore for P.E. It was about then that they started putting prizes in stuff such as oatmeal and other products. There were dishes mostly; we still have a set of green drinking glasses. Some of them are valued by collectors today.

What about when we drove our 34 Ford up to the Petrified Station and W. A. Johnson put in the gas for us, checked the tire and battery and washed the windshield, all for sixteen cents a gallon. Then he gave us trading stamps to boot. Thinking of the "filling station" brings to mind when there were fourteen of them in Itasca at one time, and Chris Waglay had the "Old West Side Garage." It was across the tracks where the highway from Fort Worth to Waco made a ninety degree turn. The road went down Main Street after making a ninety-degree turn under the light. That was also when Chris Waglay's daughter, Doris, drove her dad's Model "A" around town with Marie Taylor, Louise Sumner, Julia Ann Hooks and a few others. That was the time when ink bottles were rolled down the isle at the study hall to tease Mr. Shelby, and the boys dipped the girls hair in the ink bottle, we used pen staffs then, no retractable pens.

It was around 1936 when Mr. JG Stanley had a high school band, and Betty Jean Clinkscales was the designated singer. The kids would drive to Files Valley at night and give the signal with their lights, then the signal was interpreted by the kids at the home and the boy attended Sunday night services so they could sit with the girls from the home. We also remember everyone's dream car -- the 57 Chevy. Some terms come to mind that were used then such as peel rubber, cruise, scratch off, do a donut and watch the submarine races. The boys' date wore their class ring with tape or string wrapped around it coated with "Pastel Frost' nail polish so it would fit her finger. This brings us to the late fifties and sixties, which could be another story.
