Itasca Garden Club August "Yard of the Month"

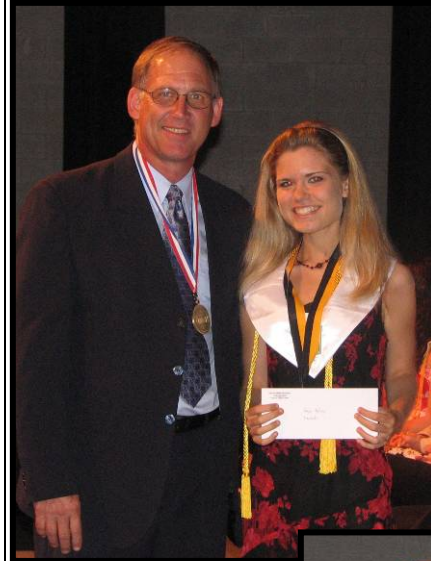

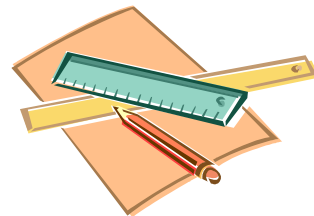

The need to be well hydrated takes on even greater importance in the summer heat; therefore, donors should drink at least eight extra glasses of water or fruit juice the day before donating and the day of donation. Caffeinated beverages like soft drinks, tea and coffee and alcoholic beverages should be avoided. People should also be well nourished, but shouldn't plan to donate right after a meal.

"During the summer months it's always difficult maintaining an adequate supply of blood," says Calvin Smith, Executive Director, American Red Cross, Texas. "But a patient needing a transfusion doesn't care if it's hot outside or schools are on summer vacation. There is only one way that patient will receive the blood they need - by someone caring enough to make a life-saving donation."

The Red Cross urges area residents to donate at the HILCO Building 115 East Main Street -Itasca, Texas on Thursday, August 16, 2007, from 12:00 pm to 6:00 pm. For more information to donate, call Bob Wilson at 1-800-338-6425 ext. 2210. Please invite a friend, co-worker or relative to donate with you. Remember each donor will receive a free American Red Cross T-shirt.

Eligible donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh 110 pounds or more and be in good health. The Red Cross reminds donors to bring a photo id when coming to donate.

House Passes 5 Year Reauthorization of Farm Programs

Press Release

(Washington, D.C.) -U.S. Representative Chet Edwards supported House passage of H.R. 2419, the 2007 Farm Bill, which extends Agriculture Department commodity and conservation programs, food stamps, rural development, agricultural trade through 2012 and provides the first reauthorization of farm programs since 2002.

"Because of the success of the programs under the Farm Bill, Americans spend the lowest percentage of their income in the world for food," said Edwards. "This bipartisan House Farm Bill makes real reforms that protect Texas family farmers and rural economies in a fiscally responsible way and will strengthen American agriculture to meet the 21st century needs of the United States and the world with a safe, stable food supply."

While the \$286 billion Farm bill extends many of the programs from the 2002 Farm Bill, some of the most significant changes to current farm policy will save more than half a billion dollars by preventing large, factory farm operations making more than \$1 million a year in adjusted gross income from receiving any federal subsidies, including price support and conservation payments. The current income limit for cutting off federal payments is \$2.5 million. Portions of the Farm bill will be paid for with revenue generated from cracking down on some foreign companies who use loopholes in the tax code to avoid paying taxes that every American-owned business must pay. This overseas tax haven loophole allows some to unfairly collect up to double the farm payment limits. The bill takes critical steps to expand renewable fuel production needed to encourage American energy independence and protect our environment. The measure boosts renewable energy programs by 600 percent, providing \$2 billion in loan guarantees for the development of refineries that process renewable fuels, a key step toward bringing more renewable fuels to market in America and \$1.5 billion for production incentives for ethanol and biodiesel made from agricultural, forest and waste plant materials.

"In today's world, it is important that we encourage the expansion of renewable fuel production that promotes American energy independence and protects our environment," said Edwards. "The bottom line is that many farmers and ranchers and their communities, the backbone of America, may not be able to stay in business without this legislation. Congress and the Administration should work together in good faith to do what is right for our farmers and ranchers and American families who benefit from low food prices."

The bill must still pass the Senate and be signed by the president. Edwards is a member of the House Rural Working Group.

Milestone Achieved in Effort to Correct Pet Overpopulation

Hill County Paw Pals, in collaboration with Texas Coalition for Animal Protection (TCAP), both non-profit organizations, reached a milestone this month during their 29th service day for Paw Pals sponsored Low Cost Sterilization and Vaccination Program—the 1,000th pet sterilization was performed! In addition, over 2,500 rabies vaccinations have been administered since the program inception date of February 15, 2005.

Our community is particularly proud of Kathy Moore, founder and director of this valuable and needed community service. “One only needs to grasp the impact of this milestone by determining the number of unwanted pets

being prevented,” says Moore. “Had each of these 1,000 pets produced a litter of eight, then 8,000 unwanted pets have been prevented. Had each of these offspring produced a litter then 64,000 potential unwanted pets have been prevented!” added Moore.

The volunteers who made this particular clinic another success while helping perform this milestone were Caitin Claybour (granddaughter of Diana Prince), Cleo Davis, Dana Fuchs, Randy Fuchs, Jane Green, Jean and JD Landis, Kathy Moore, Mary Lou Pearce, Diana Prince, Lea Slocum, and Lonnie Tilson. Also pictured are Dr. Shirita Bronston, DVM, Joyce Needum, Stacey Taylor, and Barry Williams, associates from TCAP. This low cost spay/neuter/vaccination program is an essential proactive program in Paw Pals’ efforts to correct the tragic situation of pet overpopulation in our great county. No community has ever solved its pet overpopulation issue without a low cost service being made available. Paw Pals provides this service on the first Tuesday each month. Appointments for surgeries are required by calling toll free: 1-866-310-PETS (7387). Vaccinations do not need appointments and are administered from 10 a.m. - 2p.m. Paw Pals encourages pet owners to seek local veterinarians for continued professional health care of their pets.

Paw Pals organized over three years ago with two stated goals: 1) Facilitate installation of a county animal control program and promote and contribute to building a county animal shelter; and 2) Organize to challenge the overpopulation of unwanted companion animals (dog and cats) with four programs working simultaneously—Education, Legislation, Spay/Neuter, and Adoption (Project ELSA). Delay the Game When Thunderstorms Approach

Public Service Announcement

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management warns the public that sports fields are dangerous during thunderstorms.

Sports fields are large, open areas where people are often the tallest objects. Metal bleachers, fences, light poles and goal posts attract lightning. When lightning hits these objects, the charge travels along the object, potentially injuring anyone in contact with the metal. Lightning can bounce off any of these objects and strike people nearby.

Schools, athletic programs, day care centers, and summer camps, as well as coaches, referees and parents participating in field events need to understand the dangers of lightning. They should be prepared to suspend games and move the players and spectators inside nearby buildings or into cars and buses until the storm threat passes.

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management offers the following safety tips"

****If you can hear thunder, you are close enough to be struck by lightning.**

****If you are outdoors with no shelter available, stay low.**

****Move away from hills and high places, and avoid tall, isolated trees.**

****Do not touch metal objects, such as tennis rackets, baseball bats or golf clubs.**

****Do not ride bicycles, or lean against fences or metal sheds.**

****Do not lean against a car or truck – get inside the vehicle quickly.**

****If you feel your hair suddenly stand on end, it means you may be a lightning target. Crouch low on the balls of your feet and try not to touch the ground with your knees or hands.**

****Avoid wet areas that can conduct the lightning charge.**

****Did you know that drinking 2 glasses of Gatorade can relieve the pain of a headache almost immediately, without the unpleasant side effects caused by traditional pain relievers?"**

****Colgate toothpaste makes an excellent salve for burns.**

****For a sore throat, mix a quarter cup of vinegar and a quarter cup of honey and take one teaspoon six times a day. The vinegar kills the bacteria.**

****For skin blemishes, cover the blemish with a dab of honey and place a band-aid over it. Honey kills the bacteria, keeps the skin sterile and speeds healing.**

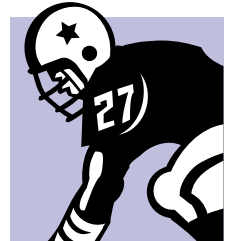
