Officers Recover Firearm after Shot Fired

On Sunday morning, August 5, 2007 at approximately 1:50 a.m., three Itasca officers and a DPS Trooper were clearing out a parking lot after a dance at the "Warehouse" in Itasca when the officers and Trooper heard a gun shot from the area of the Itasca Fire Department on West Monroe Street. As the officers and trooper went to investigate, two subjects were seen walking from the dark area on the west side of the fire hall. When the officers and trooper approached the fire hall, the subjects began running and threw an object to the ground by the fire hall. A "MAC-10" pistol and a fully loaded magazine were recovered.

Chief Griscavage said that gang members of the Crips and Bloods had been at the dance but was unable to say whether they were involved in the shooting or if the firearm belonged to either gang.

Assisting Chief Griscavage in the search were Sergeant Ted Walton and Officer Jimmy Smitherman of Itasca PD and Department of Public Safety Trooper Donald Mills, along with deputies from the Hill County Sheriff's Department and Covington police.

Our precipitation this year is as follows: January 4.71", February 1.14", March 9.93", April 2.62", May 6.66", June 10.24", July 3.70" and August to date 3.11." For a total of 38.41," which is about 13 inches above normal. The most precipitation we have received in a year was 55.82" in 2004. The least amount was 18.95" in 1963. This is a 50-year record for Itasca. During that period, we have had only 2 summers with no 100° days.


Bratton and Middleton were excited to see over 85 students show up for band camp to participate in this year's band program.

Music from the first Star Wars movie is the theme of the marching perform-


ance. It was chosen to celebrate the movie, which was filmed in 1977, making this year its 30th anniversary.

This article came from the Texas Department of State Health Services web site. It is in reference to Family Preparedness. I talked about this a while ago and some citizens have asked me about ICE.



"If you are injured because of an accident or disaster, you may be unable to speak with emergency medical technicians. In these cases, paramedics and other emergency response personnel often turn to a victim's cell phone for clues to his or her identity and emergency contact. You can make their job much easier by adding an entry in the contact list of your cell phone: ICE

ICE stands for "In Case of Emergency". Add an entry, label it "ICE", and enter the name and phone number of the person the emergency services should call on your behalf. Paremedics know what ICE means, and they look for it immediately."


Do You Remember ... ?- "Hill County Fox & Wolf Hunters Association"

The sport of foxhunting originated in England, and naturally progress to the colonies in America. It was pursued in the fields and woodlands until recent times. At the present the sport has about played out in many areas.

In our area I first remember the sport in the early 1930s when our story begins.





east of Itasca, riding his horse in pursuit of the Walker Foxhounds. Some of his fellow hunters were R.D. Bailey, Wid Mead, Otho Mahurin, Charlie Ellison and later his sons, Malvin and Manton Turner. I remember Mannie's wife, Aunt Clara cooking cornbread every day for the hounds. There must have been three square feet of it in the big pans. There were a couple of local boys who hunted, too. They were Herman and Johnny Owens. These two will be in another story.

Uncle Mannie was responsible for importing red foxes to our area. There were none here before. In fact gray and red foxes are not very compatible. They also hunted what they called wolves, but I think they were coyotes. According to the Texas Game Department, there haven't been any gray or lobo wolves in our area for 75 years. Most people call a coyote a wolf. The foxes were hunted at night and the men followed the race by the sound of the hounds. Each owner could tell his hounds by their voices and the other hunters could, too. They could also tell when the hounds were close to the fox. They could tell when they sighted him, when he was treed and also when they lost the trail. They did not kill the fox and became very upset when someone's action caused it to be killed, by not controlling their dogs.

Sometimes they quit for the night when it was treed and occasionally the fox jumped out of the tree. Given a head start the race was on again. The red fox seldom treed, he usually ran until he became tired, then simply went into his den under ground.

A good Walker Hound was a prized animal, and each year the association held a bench show and box supper. That was when the club officially organized. They called it the "Hill County Fox and Wolf Hunting Assn." Joe Martin Jr. was president of the association for several years, until they ceased to be active with the shows.

Some of the hunters who came on the scene in later years were Wayne (Skipper) Laird, Otho Mahurin, Billy Jo Mahurin and Jim Mahurin hunted with them some, although Jim was not as avid a hunter as his dad and brother. It was told that when Wayne was young his dad gave him a Walker Hound they had named, "Skipper" and that is why we call him that today. He said he started going out with the hunters when he was 9 years old.

When the bench shows were held, there were as many as 80 dogs in competition and 500 people attended. The events were held on the Itasca Football field and people and dogs came from all over Texas and even out of state. I remember one year a dog owned by R. B. Beard of Taft, Texas won grand champion. There were usually different judges from time to time. Some of the judges were Charlie Dubose and J. W. Elliot from Mexia, Si Perkins from Brownwood and Allen Staller as secretary, from Brandon, Texas.

There was an article in the *Itasca Item* in 1946 pertaining to hound hunting. It is as follows;

"A wolf hunt was in the making, when Rev. Barnes and his brother of Valley Mills brought their pack of Walker Hounds. Rain and high winds prevented the hunters from running the wolves which had been molesting livestock in the Iverson community. The hunters gathered at the Ted Lewis Ranch on the mountain and spent the night hoping the weather would clear. The wind however refused to quit, so the hunters engaged in a bull session, talking about

old times and hunts from the past. Charlie Ellison took the lead by bragging on his favorite hound "ole Calhoun."

There were many hunts and bench shows we could tell about, but space is limited. One other thing - There was a movie several years ago about a young man with a foxhound, he entered in competition. The story has wonderful human interest. It is titled, "Where the Red Fern Grows."
