A man, not much older than our oldest players, was held in high esteem and awe by all of the players. Coach Grinnell never raised his voice at us, but when he spoke, we heard every word he said. A couple times, on returning home from games, he had to admonish us on the bus by saying, "All right men, let's settle down!" that was it, you could hear a pin drop.

From the largest – Sam Baker or Bunky Davis – to the smallest – Buddy Fields at 135 lbs. or myself at 140 lbs. (almost) – they would have gone through Hell or High Water for Coach Grinnell.

He never criticized, just explained what he wanted done and taught us how to do just that. He did say though, at the end of a play, whether in a game or practice, he did not want to see <u>one</u> man standing!

"Average only two and one half yards per play and you will win every game," was his philosophy. He was so right, we did, and we won.

Thank you, God, for Coach Grinnell.

As I (Joanna Barnes) was sitting in the back row in the General Business Class at Itasca High School when a good looking young football player who was sitting on the front row, turned around, looked at me and "winked". To this very day, I remember that "wink" and how embarrassed I was, blushing all the time. Time passed by, and now I am in the 10th grade and I began to notice him more and more as we met while passing from class to class.

Then it happened - he asked me for a date and I agreed. On that first date, we doubled dated with Elmo Kemp, another IHS young man. I never dated another young man from our first date since Buddy was one of the nicest young men I ever dated and too, I had more fun with him than any guy I ever dated.

Although I was very young, I "fell for this guy." We dated several months, when he asked me to marry him and I replied "yes." My dear husband tells it a little differently. He says I answered him "yes and thank you."

I remained in school, graduated in 1942. We had an apartment in the home of Mrs. Vernon. WWII had begun and with Buddy's lame leg (the one he broke playing football), he knew he could not "march", therefore he joined the U.S. Navy and was stationed in Corpus Christi, California and Guam where spent the duration of the War. Do You Remember...?-"Itasca Football - The Early Years"

The Itasca school has been involved with football for over a hundred years. Our first team was in 1902 with only twelve players and a coach, Mack Denton. There is not much information available about teams in the interim until 1921. It had been three or four years since they had attempted to establish a team, but in 1921 Mr. Jim Ince of Itasca offered to coach a team free of charge. That year they played Hubbard, Milford, West Station, Covington (twice) and Cleburne. They won some and lost some. When they played Milford they experienced something new, the forward pass.

Some of the players on the 1921 team were Joe Davis, John Patton, Neil Kinard, Roy Burks, Virgil Gilliland and mascot Sid Pruitt. It was said that Virgil Gilliland was the best running back that Itasca has ever had. Be that as it may, Wendell Jordon gained over 2,000 yards one year as a half back.

Itasca had some really good teams in the 1920's. They called it the Golden Era. The 1922 team was also part of the Golden Era. J. W. Winstead was coach and John Patton assisted. Some of the players during that time were R. J. Green and Preacher Calloway. Others were Sid Pruitt, Rudolph Shelton, Bryan Wilson, Harsh Ince and Aaron Timinens was mascot in 1922.

In 1925 the team's coach was listed as Sid Pruitt. Sid must have a busy boy, I have accounts where he was mascot, coach, and player. Some 1923 players were Weeks Winn, Virgil Gilliland, Audie Adwell, Gerald Pruitt, Buster Moore, Rotan Sumner was mascot. Rotan later played for Itasca.

In 1925 Mr. W. C. "Heinie" Wier came to Itasca as a coach. He proved to be one of Itasca's best coaches. We continued our winning ways with him. In 1974 at Homecoming, Mr. Wier along with members of these teams including 1925 were honored. They were R. J. Green, Sid Pruitt, Rotan Sumner, Weeks Wynn, Gerald Pruitt, Odel Davis, Ocie Gilliland, John Patton, Parham "Preacher" Calloway, Joe Davis, Morris "Took" Gilliland, and Rudy Shelton.

The 1928 team coach was a Mr. Hill and some of the players were Clay Chiles, Olin Webb, Howard Upchurch, Timmins, and Loyal Puckett. Olin Webb played only part of the season that year because he was injured in a motor-cycle accident. Not much information except they beat Walnut Springs by a score of 104 to 0.

We will conclude our early years of Itasca Football with the 1929 teams. The coach was Howard Wade. The mascot was Hollis Davis and Loyal Puckett was manager. I have no information on their record at this time. Some of the players were Cleddy Crouch, Took Gilliland, Wayne Evans, Toby Burks, Ralph Bailey, Joe Bush, Jack Martin, Armin "Beans" Curlee, Jim Moon Cowan and Ray Leatherwood who went on to play in Les Brown's Band of Renown. Also playing were John R. Sanderson, Laman Meador, J. T. Whitfield, who played for A & M during their good years in the mid thirties, Audaree Blissit, Clay Chiles, and others.


Travis "Toby" Burks was credited with naming the "Wampus Cats." One night after a hard fought game, he made the statement "We were really Wampus Cats tonight!" At that moment, everyone knew we had a name for our

team. Not too long after that Toby was killed in an accident. I remember that his jersey hung in the "Bath House" trophy rooms. I have no idea where it is today.

We have had many versions of the Wampus Cat logos over the years. I personally prefer the black and gold one we had at one time. The one we have now does not have our school colors and looks like a lion, not a Wampus Cat back. The next column will be on subsequent years of football.

In conclusion, I thought our young folks might like to know a "yell" as we called it back then:
