# Edwards Accepting U. S. Academy Applications

U.S. Representative Chet Edwards (TX17) announced that the deadline is fast approaching for students to apply for a congressional nomination to one of the four U.S. Service Academies.

Those interested in seeking nominations to the U.S. Air Force, Merchant Marine, Military and Naval academies should have all application materials postmarked by November 15, 2007 for the class entering in June.

Candidates must be United States citizens, legal residents of the 17th Congressional District of Texas, unmarried and have no children. Candidates must be at least 17 years of age but not past their 22<sup>nd</sup> birthday on July 1 of the year of admission. All applicants must take the SAT or ACT examinations. The SAT administered in October is the last date the test can be taken if the results are to be received prior to the selection of nominees.

Candidates are selected through a rigorous process that includes screening by a Service Academy Selection board, which evaluates and recommends applicants from congressional District 17 schools and families. Congressman Edwards appoints the Service Academy Nominations Board to assist him in making appointment recommendations.

The selection process is very competitive and is based on scholastic and athletic records, involvement in community activities, and leadership potential.

The Itasca Wampus Cats add another "W" to their column as they took on the Wortham Bulldogs on Patton Field Friday night.

The game began differently from the others when Itasca lost the coin toss and was forced to receive the ball. Once again, it was a back and forth turnover game until Wortham's third drive. The Bulldogs gained a first down after a forty yard pass and were on a roll when the Wampus Cats caused a fumble and #2 Tralyn Harden picked the ball up and ran all the way back for a TD. After a penalty on the extra point, the Cats scored a two point conversion, making the score 8-0 The Bulldogs answered right back with a touchdown merely thirty seconds later. They also went for two and tied it up eight to eight. Then the score changed again when Dee Marshall scored and a penalty resulted in another two-point conversion. The first quarter ended with the Cats 16 – Bulldogs - 8.

The second quarter was just as exciting. Shortly after changing processions, the Wampus Cats forced the football back far enough for a safety. This tacked on another 2 points for the home team. The ball was back in the Cats' hands and #4 Dee Marshall scored on a fifty-yard pass from #5 Mikey Marshall. The Cats converted for two more points.

Desmond Guy did the scoring the next time bringing the score to 38-8. The Cats then sabotaged themselves as two penalties brought two first downs and the opportunity for Wortham to stretch out their arm and put one in with absolutely no time left in the half. The half ended with the Cats on top 38-15.

The second half was all Cats. They scored twice more and finished the game by kneeling twice and leaving the final score at Itasca 52 - Wortham - 15. Next week will

be the final pre-district game. The Cats will face off against the Scurry Rosser Wildcats.
