Congress Delivers Largest College Aid Increase since 1944 GI Bill

A Column by Congressman Chet Edwards

Hard-working families in Texas are facing fast rising costs for health care, home utility bills and college tuition, which has skyrocketed by nearly 40% since 2001. Soaring college costs strain the budgets of millions of students and their families, dash the hopes of attending college altogether for others, and threaten America's ability to maintain a well-educated workforce that can compete in the global marketplace.

To address this issue, Congress has sent to the president's desk historic legislation that will boost college financial assistance by \$20 billion, the single largest investment in college aid since the 1944 GI Bill. This new investment in college aid, the College Cost Reduction and Access Act, will help millions of students and families pay for college – and do so at no new cost to U.S. taxpayers.

Under the new law, 6.8 million students, 205,508 in Texas alone, will see their interest rates on subsidized loans cut from 6.8 percent to 3.4 percent by 2011. Once fully phased-in, this would save the typical student borrower in Texas – with \$14,233 in need-based student loan debt – \$4,550 over the life of their loan. For the first time in five years, the maximum Pell grant will increase by \$1090 from \$4,310 to \$5,400 by 2012, \$500 alone in 2008. This will help 427,159 Texas students, 5.5 million students nationwide.

More than ever, the health of our economy depends on having a highly skilled and well-educated workforce. It was projected last year that, by the year 2020, the U.S. would face a shortage of up to 12 million college-educated workers without action. It is unacceptable that some 200,000 American students do not go to college every year simply because they can't afford the cost. Keeping America competitive in the global economy means keeping the doors of our colleges and universities open to bright, hard-working students. It is not only important for their future, it is critical for the future of our nation.

The legislation would also prevent student borrowers from facing unmanageable levels of federal student debt by guaranteeing that borrowers will never have to spend more than 15 percent of their yearly income on loan repayments, and eliminate a three-year limit for deferment of loan payment for members of the armed forces. Students who pursue careers as public school teachers would receive pre-paid tuition assistance of \$4,000 per year — with a maximum of \$16,000 — if they commit to teaching a high-need subject in a high-need school for four years.

As a member of the House Budget Committee, Edwards strongly believes it is vital that Congress invest in our nation's highest priorities while maintaining our commitment to fiscal responsibility. This legislation pays for itself by reducing excessive federal subsidies paid to lenders in the college loan industry by nearly \$20.9 billion and reinvesting that money back into student financial aid, resulting in a \$750 million reduction in the federal deficit.

In short, this new law is one of the most critical bills the 110th Congress has enacted this year- making college more affordable and accessible for millions of American students, strengthening our workforce, and stimulating our economy. Rep. Edwards represents District 17 in Congress.

Last week marked the turning point for the Itasca Wampus Cats. They moved from preseason to district play. The team used the open week between games to make any last minute adjustments and fine-tune both the offense and defense. The use of team work continues to be stressed.

The Cats had a great pre-season and are entering district with an impressive 5-0 record. They have scored 182 points while allowing only 47 points to the opposition.

The big offensive players have been Mikey Marshall, Desmond Guy, and Tralyn Harden. M. Marshall has passed for 425 yards and has 2 touchdowns.

Desmond Guy has an impressive 747 yards rushing in 76 attempts, an average of 9.8 yards per carry (a figure any pro would love to brag about). He has scored 6 touchdowns.

Tralyn Harden has nine receptions for 266 yards and 5 touchdowns. He also ran a kickoff return back for 60 yards.

On the defensive side, the stats are just as impressive. Frank Sanchez, De'Veon Mayberry, Zech O'Rarden and Josh Huff are standouts on a hard hitting defense.

Sanchez has 34 tackles and 3 sacks, Mayberry has 32, O'Rarden has 20 tackles and 1 sack and Huff is credited with 16 tackles and 2 sacks.

With the number of quarterback sacks at 6, Cat fans can hope the ratio continues and the defense makes at least one quarterback sack every game.

The Cats will kick off district play Friday night in Maypearl against the Panthers.

According to Hill County Elections Administrator Patsy Damschen, if the state or county is conducting an election, all other entities are required to use the same polling places so voters only have to go to one location to cast ballots.

Voters in Hill County and across the state will be going to the polls November 6 to decide 16 constitutional amendments passed by the legislature this past spring.

The problem with the law, as far as school districts and cities are concerned, is boundary lines for ISDs and cities aren't contiguous with the county voting-precinct lines.

Since school district and voting-precinct boundaries are not the same, all school districts holding elections will have to provide ballots and voting machines at locations other than county polling places in their communities.

Itasca ISD's polling places are Itasca Rotary Room, Covington Street Courthouse Annex and First Presbyterian Church-Hillsboro.

Early voting in the elections will still be conducted at the respective school offices weekdays Monday, October 22, through Friday, November 2. Polls Election Day will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.
