


Newly elected HILCO Board officers Bill Allen, president; George Thiess, vice president; and Margaret Hill, secretary/treasurer.

August City Council Meeting

The Itasca City Council met in a regular session on Monday, August 20, 2007 in the Council Chambers. Mayor Matthew Fehnel called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Present were Council Members Steve Solis, Susie Davis, James Bouldin, John Laird, and Harvey Wilson; City Administrator Mark Gropp and City Attorney Stephanie Johnson. Motions were passed to approve the July 16, 2007 minutes and the payment of the bills.

Giving reports for the month of June were Wayne Upchurch for Water and Sewer Operations. He reported that the pressure test of the fire hydrants has been completed and that the water system is at a capacity of 93% on its maximum well production and the production should not go over 85% of its capacity by TCEQ standards.

Bettye Lewis for the Planning and Zoning Committee (Approved applications included, corner of Henderson and Wesley for a sidewalk, fence and driveway, 403 N. King for a deck, 610 S. Files to repair and enlarge gateway, 600 Milford Street for a fence, 408 E. Spurgeon for a concrete sidewalk, and 214 S. Hill for a metal storage rental building. An application for a dog cage was approved and a picket fence was tabled at 210 W. Adams. Tabled applications included 3991 FM 934 for a metal storage building.) Police Chief John Griscavage explained the monthly police report and the Office of Code Enforcement report was given by Felicia Mayberry. Fire Chief Chris Shuffield reported on the activities of the Itasca Fire Department for the months of June and July 2007, and gave an update on the Bull Riding Fund Raiser that is scheduled for September 15, 2007.

Sedalia Scott's application for the Planning & Zoning Committee was brought before the Council. A discussion regarding applicants not having any ordinance violations or correcting an ordinance violation before submitting a permit application. An applicant needs knowledge of what the Planning & Zoning Committee is about and the procedures of the Zoning Ordinance. The application was denied.

Mayor Matthew Fehnel read a letter of appreciation received from the Itasca Senior Center for including them in the city's budget again this year.

The Council discussed a proposal to establish an Ad Valorem Tax Rate for the tax year 2007 of .50 cent per \$100 of valuation, which would allow the city to collect an estimate of \$6278 more in revenues.

The first reading to adopt the proposed tax rate Ordinance #082007 Fixing and Levying City Ad Valorem Taxes for the City of Itasca for the Year 2007: Directing the Assessment and Collection Thereof: and Declaring an Emergency was read by the Mayor. Susie Davis made a motion "I move that property taxes be increased by the adoption of a tax rate of \$.50/\$100", second by Harvey Wilson, waiving the second and third readings; unanimous vote.

The Council considered accepting the TML Intergovernmental Employee Benefits Pool Rerate Notice and Benefit Verification Form. The City Secretary presented medical plan options. She explained the cost difference between the Rx plans. A motion was made and passed to approve and accept Option 1 of the TML Intergovernmental Employee Benefits Pool Rerate Notice and Benefit Verification Form.

Mayor Matthew Fehnel ordered an election to be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2007 from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. to elect three (3) Council Members.

The Order of Appointment for Election Judge and Alternate for the election to be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2007 was discussed and considered. A motion was made and passed to approve and appoint Wayne Williams and Barbara Wilson as election judges.

Qualifications needed to teach Fire Department training courses were discussed. The Council was presented with a letter from the City Administrator regarding qualifications needed to teach training courses for our fire department. A Level I Instructor is certified to instruct within his/her fire department only. A Level II Instructor is certified to teach other fire department's personnel as well as within his/her fire department. Wayland Price certification is a Level II and does not need to be a member of our fire department to teach classes. The Council took no action.

Implementing rules and regulation for gatherings on public properties were discussed. The City Attorney Stephanie Johnson stated that she is working on information for an ordinance. She recommended scheduling a workshop meeting and for the Council to think about what they want in the ordinance. The Council scheduled a workshop meeting on Monday, August 27, 2007 at 6:00 p.m.

The meeting was open for general Mayor, Council and City Administrator discussion and reports. The City Administrator stated that on September 18, 2006 the Council approved creating an ordinance establishing permit fees and allows vendors to set-up on the old bank building property (new park). He explained that the construction for the new park by the EDC is not just for the beautification of the town but also to bring new vendors into town.

The meeting adjourned at 6:50 p.m.

City Council Workshop Meeting

The Itasca City Council met in a workshop session on Monday, August 27, 2007 in the Council Chambers. Mayor Matthew Fehnel called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. Present were Council Members Steve Solis, Susie Davis, James Bouldin, John Laird and Harvey Wilson; City Administrator Mark Gropp and City Attorney Stephanie Johnson.

The Council and City Attorney had an extensive discussion regarding an ordinance to implement rules and regulations for gatherings on properties. After discussing several options, the Council agreed to replace and install new signs at the city parks informing the public of the rules.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:39 p.m.

Do You Remember...?—"The Chief"



The recent series that Ken Burns provided about World War II reminds me of a story that made the rounds after the conflict was over. There were several stories about individuals who might have been more independent more colorful, or of unusual character than others. This story is about one of them. I will not reveal his real name, or the outfit he was in. He has been claimed by several units. Let us say his name was Robert Sentani but in the service he was simply known as "Chief" be-

cause of his Native American heritage. He is not to be confused with the Navajo "Code Talkers" who performed an invaluable service to our country in the war.

Chief was a rugged individualist, living on the reservation, free to come and go as he pleased, and enjoying life, when the letter came from the draft board saying that your friends and neighbors have selected you to help protect our country. Needless to say he was not happy with the situation. He was entirely satisfied with his life as it was, and consequently never adjusted to military life and the discipline.

After basic training, which he hated, he was sent to the European Theater. He had always had a fondness for the grape at home and it did not take him long to acquire a fondness for Schnapps, a German liquor. He would take a drink for almost any reason, the sun coming up or going down, a rainy day, or just plain unhappiness. When he drank fighting was not necessarily with the enemy. He spent much of his time in the "Brig" sobering up. Chief held the rank of "PP," Prospective Private. As soon as he earned a stripe he would be involved in unacceptable behavior and would be demoted. He would then have to removal his stripe. He finally got to where he would glue a stripe on one sleeve for easy removal, them he hung his uniform in the locker with that one stripe to the other side. The Inspector never looked at the other side.

His love for the wide-open spaces was enjoyed on the reservation, and therefore he hated fences. Of course the military installation always had them. They blocked his access to the bars and guesthouses, where he was a regular customer. The fence problem was quietly solved by the Chief. He drove a wrecker for his outfit on which was mounted a boom. He would get a buddy to hoist him over the fence with that and when he came back the buddy put him back inside. He usually got a pint from the chief for helping him. However, one night when he was lifted over the fence it was into the arms of the military police and into the brig again. He once again removed his stripe.

The Chief was a terror on the battlefield. I guess he took out his unhappiness and frustration on the Germans. He received several medals for his performance in battle, but he said he did not want the "damn metals" (sic) he just wanted to get it over with and go home. During the rest of the Chief's time in the service his career followed the same pattern of up and downs.

When the war was over and it was time to go home Chief Robert Sentani came down the ship's gangplank with his two full duffel bag. The bags were heavy and had a suspicious "clink." Evidently the Chief wasn't taking any chances on getting thirsty on the voyage home.

I suppose the service still has a few "characters" around and with individuals like that, perhaps the service will not be so dull after all.


