## Do You Remember...?-"A Soliloquy"

There have been stories, poems and articles about living in the country and small towns as opposed to city living. Our customs and ways of doing things may be a little different now-adays than in the past. But essentially they run along the same lines as they did back when. I am thinking about the way we handle our dead then and now.

This particular start happened around 1930. I was around ten years old at the time; they said it was one of the saddest sights they had seen. I remember it being talked about for years. It was a story, however true or exaggerated, about how lonesome it is in the city.
A hearse was going down the street followed by one Model "T" Ford. There was the father and three small children all crying. The small procession traveled down the streets as cars sped by with laughing, happy, carefree people. They looked at the hearse and car with a passive interest, a father and three small children going to bury the mother. Something like that would never happen in a small town or community, no matter what your social status, on wealth or any other circumstance. Some kindly people would follow you to the grave and most would weep along with those who loved you. Those small town folks may be nosy, prying, or judgmental, but when trouble comes and the chips are down, those people will always be there for you. Some could be small souled and petty, but they would be ready to help if needed, such as neighbors plowing a field for a farmer who was sick, or injured. When a baby was born the ladies came to assist afterwards with the chores. They had big hearts.

It is said that the city is a fine place to live, but a lonesome place to die. What with the pursuit of employment, pleasure and other pursuits, that they have no time to stop or the inclination to, when the hearse passes. When it does happen, they rush off to the cemetery and put them away as quickly as possible. They send the little floral offering and let it go at that. We say it with flowers in the city and say it with tears in the country. It is not that city dwellers are uncaring. I guess they are accustomed to so much tragedy in the environment that they ignore it. Death is their neighbor so often that they become accustomed to it. They have allowed funeral homes to do for the dead what was one done by friends.

Thinking about that suffering man and the small children and their devastation, we would have wished that their mother could have died in a small town like Itasca. In the world we were accustomed to in the past when a situation occurred when small children was left they were taken in by relations, or even close friends.

I remember in our family circle there were four young boys in that situation. Family members raised them with a family until they graduated from high school. Those families were Turner and Sweeneys. There was a man named Stubblefield who left his young son and his land in trust to Joe Turner until the boy was twenty-one. At that time the trust was honored.

There was another gesture of caring and friendship that we practiced in the past that young people under fifty may not even be aware of. That was when we "sat up" with the dead before burial. Depending on what church the person was affiliated with, there was one person responsible for getting people to sit. Usually two people at a time for usually two hours. I remember we were glad when we were asked to take a turn, before midnight.

We noticed now that this practice is no longer done. One day they may do away with pallbearers. As the saying goes, "The only thing constant is change." Let's hope the change don't get too radical.
***Note from editor - The practice of "sitting with the body" was to be sure they were really dead before burying them.
