## City Council Votes to Increase Water Fees, Fines

Council members passed a City Ordinance (waived  $2^{nd}$  &  $3^{rd}$  readings) at the November meeting raising the late fine for a water bill to \$10.00 from the previous \$5.00 charge. This increase is effective with the bills mailed out on December 30, due January 10. Also included in the Ordinance were increases in deposits, reconnect fees and a special fee for reconnect after hours and on holidays.

These increases were part of an effort to follow the recommendations of the auditors, who pointed out that Itasca's rates are barely and sometimes are not meeting the cost of expenses. Itasca has been exploring avenues for funds to repair and replace the city's infrastructure and in many cases, the grants show that the city's rates are not keeping up with the cost of doing business.

#### Abandoning Dog or Cat Can Cost One Up to \$4,000 and/or Year in Jail **Press Release**

Dog and cat abandonment is a criminal act. Texas criminal law under section 42.09 of the Texas Penal Code levies fines up to \$4,000 and/or a year in jail. If convicted the third time it becomes a felony penalty with punishment up to \$10,000 and/or two years in jail. Abandonment includes moving from a home or visiting our beautiful lakes and conveniently leaving one's pet behind. "Dumping" a dog or cat on the side of the road is also abandonment. Besides breaking the law, abandonment is the most despicable act one can do to a companion animal (dog or cat) because they cannot fend for themselves because of their domesticated nature.

Statistically, over 80% will die horrific deaths from starvation, thirst, disease, road kill, or eaten alive by predatory animals such as coyotes. The "lucky" survivors will find refuge but die early because of the absence of professional veterinarian care. The great majority of these survivors will never be sterilized thus fueling our present pet overpopulation issue. Without basic animal control, our pet overpopulation problem will continue to worsen. Presently, individual and "packs/colonies" of stray dogs and cats exists in our county - creating health, economic, legal, and safety (HELS) liabilities to our citizens and communities. Communicate with your elected representatives and tell them you want change. If you don't know what to say, go to our website hcpawpals.org and link to "letter writing campaign" for information. Pet overpopulation is simply solvable with basic animal control - a core service that taxpayers expect along with police, fire and ambulance service—you pay taxes with your hard-earned money—you should determine how it's spent. Animal control expense should simply be prioritized into the existing budget.

If you live in an area without animal control (which is the majority of Hill County), and you know of abandonment cases, call the County Sheriff Office at 582-5313 - it is the Sheriff's duty to enforce criminal state law and your civic duty to report it. Hill County will prosecute offenders of this law but it has to be reported. Enforcement of the existing "abandonment" law (Penal Code 42.09) is necessary to deter people from performing this vile act. "Dumpers" force their problems on innocent others while fueling our existing pet overpopulation issue which continues to go unchecked without needed basic animal control.

If would like to become involved in correcting pet overpopulation, consider volunteering with Hill County Paw Pals. We are a group of over 1,200 concerned voting citizens and over 110 businesses who have been working for nearly four years to facilitate the installation of a county animal control program that will include an animal shelter.
