The Rose Bud Elementary Parent Advisory Committee includes the following teachers, staff members, and parents: Christy English, Elementary Counselor; Amanda Tharp, Library Media Specialist; Becky Acock, Parent; Shila Kurck, parent; Katy Davis, parent.
 - Work cooperatively with the Parent/Teacher Organization to solicit parental input during the development and implementation of the parent involvement plan
 - Disseminate information pertaining to meetings, workshops, and planning sessions during which the district-wide parental involvement plan will be developed
 - Formulate a building-level parental involvement committee that will work cooperatively to implement parental involvement activities designed to increase parental involvement in both the school environment and the student learning process, as outlined in the 2016-2017 ACSIP plans.  - A subcommittee formed from the existing building level pare advisory committees and led by the District Parent Involvement Facilitator will conduct ongoing site visits on both campuses to observe current parental involvement practices and make recommendations for improvement. Corinna Strain will be in charge of conducting the ongoing site visits.
- 2. The **Rose Bud School District** will take the following actions to involve parents in the process of school review and improvement under section 1116 of the ESEA:
 - Conduct the Annual Report to the Public on September 2016
 - Distribute parent surveys to collect information and data pertaining to identified school improvement areas; the building principals shall be responsible for including the Annual Parent Survey in the handbook. Mrs. Melissa Kirkpatrick, elementary principal, and Mr. Tyler Reed, high school principal, will be responsible for including the survey in our handbook each year. The results can be used to decide how Parent Involvement Funds will be spent.
 - Schedule parent workshops and parent nights during which an open forum will be held to discuss parent views and concerns relating to school improvement
 - A parent advisory committee, including teachers, administrators, and parents will be organized to recommend new parent involvement policies and activities.
- coordination, technical assistance, and 3. The **Rose Bud School District** will provide the following necessary other support to assist Title I, Part A schools in planning and implementing effective parental involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance:

- Develop parental involvement policies for each school and make sure that each one is posted on our school website. Ms. Corinna Strain will be responsible for making sure that each school does this.
- Schedule Parent Workshops and Parent Nights at each school campus throughout the 2016-2017 school year.
- Letters will be sent to parents whose students has five absences in a semester, in an attempt to reduce truancy, keep the parents informed of their students' activities, and reduce the number of students who fail to receive credit due to excessive absences. Mr. Reed, the high school principal, and Mrs. Kirkpatrick, the elementary principal, will be responsible for sending these letters.
- 4. The **Rose Bud School District** will coordinate and integrate parental involvement strategies in Part A with parental involvement strategies under the following other programs; Mr. Christopher Nail, our superintendent, and Ms. Strain, our district parental involvement coordinator will be responsible for making sure this is done. Ms. Corinna Strain will conduct ongoing site visits to actively observe parental involvement practices for these programs.

- 5. The **Rose Bud School District** will take the following actions to conduct, with the involvement of parents, an annual evaluation of the content and effectiveness of this parental involvement policy in improving the quality of its Title I, Part A schools.  - Information distributed to parents will be available in multiple language formats to accommodate the diverse student population
 - Building and district-level Parent Involvement Committees will meet regularly to review evaluation data
 and formulate a strategic plan for addressing targeted areas of improvement and the programs/services that
 will be implemented for each area. Ms. Corinna Strain, the parent involvement coordinator will conduct
 this meeting for the district; Ms. Christy English will conduct the elementary policy review meeting; Ms.
 Corinna Strain will conduct the high school policy review meeting. The meetings will be conducted by
 May 31, 2017.
 - Building and district-level Parent Involvement Committees will meet regularly to review evaluation data and formulate a strategic plan for addressing targeted areas of improvement and the programs/services that

- will be implemented for each area. Information will be provided to both the district staff and parents by May 2017.
- Rose Bud School District will conduct and annual meeting in the spring to update policy for next year's
 Title I Part A program. Mr. Christopher Nail, the superintendent, and Corinna Strain, the parental
 involvement coordinator, will conduct this meeting.
- 1. The **Rose Bud School District** will build the schools' and parent's capacity for strong parental involvement, in order to ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school involved, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement, through the following activities specifically described below:

 - Information pertaining to on-line grade reporting system that parents can access to monitor student grades, assignments, as well as communicate to their child's teacher
 - Longitudinal assessment data that will reflect district, region, and state comparisons in grade level assessment data and trends in areas of improvement and deficiencies for each core area assessed. Strategies for addressing the areas of deficiencies will be presented
 - Information pertaining to the remediation programs at each school campus that will be implemented to address identified areas of deficiency in each core area of the curriculum
 - O The parents of each child enrolled in the school will promptly receive an explanation of what the identification means, the reason (s) the school was identified for improvement, and how parents can become involved in addressing the academic issues that led to the identification. This letter will be distributed before the first day of school and posted on the school's web site
 - Parents will be informed of student progress in comprehension. Parents will engage in activities to support comprehension at Parent Night. A list of suggested activities will be provided to parents
 - Parents will receive information pertaining to the implementation of educational technology that will be integrated into the instructional process in each classroom. The technology will assist teachers in presenting grade level concepts through various mediums, all of which are designed to meet individual student learning styles, with a focus on the visual presentation that will reduce language barriers and help to close the achievement gap between minority and non-minority students and in order to meet the educational needs of low achieving and limited English proficient students.
 - Parents will be informed of student progress quarterly and a list of suggested activities to support student achievement at home will be provided

- o Parents will be encouraged to participate on Parent Advisory Committees that will be formed at the building level
- B. The school district will, with the assistance of its schools, provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training, and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement, by:
 - Parent Night at Rose Bud Elementary
 - Rose Bud High School will hold an annual parent meeting to inform parents about course selections, career planning, and preparation for post-secondary opportunities.
 - School-Parent Compacts will be sent home at each school campus. The compacts will include each components outlined in the Title I, Part A section of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001
 - Each school campus will maintain a Parent Resource Center that will be accessible to parents. Informational materials relating to curriculum, study skills, drug and alcohol awareness, and volunteer programs within the school will be available for parents through a library check-out process

 integrated into the instructional process in each classroom. The technology will assist teachers in

 student learning styles, with a focus on the visual presentation that will reduce language barriers and help to
 close the achievement gap between minority and non-minority students and in order to meet the educational
 needs of low achieving and limited English proficient students.
- C. The school district will, with the assistance of its schools and parents, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by:
 - Provide information to parents pertaining to the Volunteer Program and the various projects for which parents and community members can volunteer to assist building faculty and staff at each school campus
 - Provide information to parents relating to the local Parent/Teacher Organization and their sponsored activities throughout the school year

 - Extracurricular activities that will be scheduled for Pre-K students, such as field trips, presentations, Parent Nights, etc.

- o Provide Parent Workshops, sponsored by the Center for Effective Parenting, on topics relating to parental involvement, student achievement, and parenting skills
- o Provide age-appropriate resources in the Parent Resource Center
- Schedule Pre-K Program Parent Nights throughout the 2016-2017 school year
- Present the school-wide discipline plan that will provide the framework behavior for all students in the elementary building
- E. The school district will take the following actions to ensure that information related to the school and parent- programs, meetings, and other activities, is sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and, to the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand:
